9. 2022 DOMINION MEMBER SPORTS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Dominion policy is to normally hold the Dominion Member Sports Championships in the following timeframes:

- i. Cribbage: Friday 22 April Monday 25 Apr 2022 (Friday and Monday being arrival and departure days respectively).
- ii. Darts: Friday 29 April Monday 2 May 2022 (Friday and Monday being arrival and departure days respectively).
- ii. Eight Ball: Friday 27 May Monday 30 May 2022 (Friday and Monday being arrival and departure days respectively).

MOTION: It was moved that the preceding dates for 2022 be approved for the member sports championships listed.

CARRIED

A call for hosting applications will go out from Dominion Command to all Provincial Commands in early 2020. The deadline for submissions to Dominion Command will be 31 August 2020.

10. DOMINION MEMBER SPORTS CHAMPIONSHIPS

The following items brought forward to the Dominion Command Sports Committee were discussed:

- a. The committee decided not to run singles and doubles at the same time for the Dominion Cribbage and Darts Championships. Since some Provincial Commands only send four players, players could be playing in both singles and doubles; therefore, those events could not occur simultaneously.
- b. The committee would like to encourage Local Organizing Committees to present a certificate for the Most Sportsmanlike participant at each Dominion Member Sports Championships to be voted by the other competitors at the event.
- c. Proposed Sports Guide Amendment Sports Guide 302

The intent of this amendment is to ensure that all competitors are treated equally, despite their place of residence in relation to a national airport. The Sports Committee discussed that funding should be provided to cover transportation from a participant's place of residence instead of from the national airport nearest their place of residence.

MOTION: It was moved that section 302b of the Sports Guide be amended to read: "Providing up to \$700 towards transportation and mileage, for four competitors per

member sport event from their place of residence to the national airport nearest the site of the Championship and return. For Provincial Command team members choosing to travel by car to Dominion Member Sport Championships, each member whose vehicle is utilized for this purpose is provided the equivalent of the lowest available fare-saver airfare and mileage up to \$700 (from their place of residence to the national airport nearest the site of the Championship and return) OR the distance in kilometres as calculated by Dominion Command, whichever is less."

It should be noted that this amendment has the potential to increase the 2020 Sports Committee budget by \$18,000 as each member sport participant travel total cost could increase to a maximum of \$28,000 (\$700 x 4 participants x 10 Provincial Commands).

d. The committee decided to undergo a comprehensive review of the Sports Guide and member sports rules ensuring that feedback is collected from experts in the field and every Provincial Command prior to proposing any major changes.

11. 2019 LEGION NATIONAL YOUTH TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 43rd Legion National Youth Track and Field Championships took place 7-13 August 2019 in Cape Breton, Nova Scotia. The total attendance was 721 athletes, including 314 Legion sponsored athletes, representing all 10 Provincial Commands, and 407 open category athletes. The athletes were supported by 38 Legion sponsored chaperones and 28 Legion sponsored coaches, as well as 120 open category coaches. There were approximately 2,000 spectators, officials and volunteers from all parts of Canada in attendance which included veterans, both retired and serving, covering all branches of service.

The program continued to consist of, for Legion athletes, instructional clinics, practice sessions, social activities and the actual meet. For 2019, a remembrance theme of the 75th anniversary of D-Day was prominent throughout. Legion Provincial Command athletes visited the Fortress of Louisbourg where two lucky athletes were given the opportunity to fire a ground-shaking canon at the top of the fortress.

The President of the Legion, Comrade Thomas D. Irvine, attended the opening ceremonies and was the official guest of honour. In attendance as well was Brian Weaver, Royal Canadian Legion Dominion Vice-President and Sports Committee Chair; Marion Fryday-Cook, Royal Canadian Legion NS/NU President; Jeff Ward, band member of Membertou Mi'kmaw community; Derek Mombourquette, MLA Sydney Whitney Pier - Provincial Minister of Nova Scotia; and Eldon MacDonald, Cape Breton Regional Municipality Councillor. The opening ceremony began with a parade led by Sergeant-at-Arms, Dave Piercy, and his Color Party, followed by the CBU Pipe and Drum Band. Legion teams representing all Provincial Commands followed by a group of open athletes made for a wonderful opening. Immediately following the ceremony, Dominion Command

hosted a reception on-site at Cape Breton University. Further receptions were held at Branch #138 Ashby for the chaperones and at Cape Breton University for the coaches on Saturday and Sunday respectively. The closing banquet was hosted at Cape Breton University in the Canada Games Complex on Monday evening. During the closing banquet, the President's Award, which recognizes individuals who have demonstrated exceptional dedication, support and service to the Legion Nationals program, was presented to Helen and John Ladouceur.

From the opening ceremony through to the closing banquet, Canada's contributions to freedom and the sacrifices of our veterans formed the cornerstone of this event. This was projected through the content of speeches, event publications, local and national media outlets and event paraphernalia sporting the 75th anniversary of D-Day logo (i.e. on volunteer t-shirts, event bags, hats, bibs, event booklets, etc.). The program also included formal recognition of veterans who were invited guests to the championships, acted as chaperones, volunteered their services, and formed part of the event medal presenters. Other areas of remembrance were the medals presented which featured silhouettes that paid tribute to a battle waged by sea, land and air, the laying of a wreath by the Dominion President, and the two minutes of silence during the opening ceremonies.

The meet was held from 9-11 August under perfect weather conditions. The facility at Cape Breton University was in excellent condition and enhanced the overall competition. The meet itself was carried out over a full three-day period under the excellent organization of the meet director, Jonathan Doucette, the officials director, Anitra Stevens, and the technical advisor, Serge Thibaudeau. Eight meet records and one national record were broken. The top Legion female athlete, receiving the LeRoy Washburn trophy, was Jaeland Cummings from British Columbia and the top male athlete, receiving the Jack Stenhouse trophy, was Ryan Jacklin from Ontario.

Logistically the caterer provided excellent meals on site with a nutritionally designed menu developed in concert with a nutritional sport expert. The quarters used to house the Legion teams were in great condition at Cape Breton University. Transportation for staff and Legion teams was great.

For 2019, an extensive digital media campaign was conducted which included Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, Snapchat and Google Ads. The digital media campaign was successful in reaching a large audience and bringing awareness to the Legion National Youth Track and Field Championships. Live coverage of the championships was also posted on social media, including a Facebook Live video broadcast of the field events.

Additional promotion prior to the event was provided through advertisements at high school track and field championships, radio spots on Cape Breton Stingray radio and billboards throughout the Cape Breton Regional Municipality. Extensive coverage of the event was provided by the Cape Breton Post prior to, during and post event. During the championships, the track events were broadcasted via live streaming on AthleticsCanada.TV. Athletics Canada switched to a subscription based model this year and 2,027 viewers signed up for the paid account.

The Cape Breton community led by the LAC Chair, Thomas Young, of Branch #138, went above and beyond to provide the best possible experience for the athletes, coaches, chaperones and guests. The entire Cape Breton community rallied around the program providing a volunteer base of over 300. CFB Halifax was a strong supporter as well, along with the Cape Breton Highlanders, providing logistical support in the form of setting up modular tents and providing communication radios. In addition to hosting a fantastic meet, Cape Breton University showcased their outstanding hospitality and amazing campus through live music, games, recreational sports, an Amazing Race scavenger hunt and an epic paint battle. The Cape Breton Regional Municipality, the Province of Nova Scotia, Athletics Canada, Athletics Nova Scotia, Seaboard Transport, Professional Institute Public Service Canada and Programmed Insurance Brokers Inc. were additional gold level sponsors, along side 50 other local sponsors, who made the event possible.

The message of Remembrance was summed up by Legion athlete, Mikayla Boucher, during her speech at the closing banquet. "The mission of the Royal Canadian Legion is to support Veterans, promote Remembrance and strengthen communities. We wear our poppies tonight to acknowledge the importance of remembrance," said Boucher. "Countless Canadian lives have been dedicated to serving our nation, and it is crucial that

we always remember and honour the Fallen. We are asking each athlete to show their respect by visiting their local Legion to share their experiences at Legion Nationals and sincerely thank them for this amazing opportunity and their dedication to our country."

12. 2020 LEGION NATIONAL YOUTH TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

a. <u>Event Dates/Location/Update</u> – Cape Breton, Nova Scotia will host the 2020 Legion Nationals from 5-11 August 2020. The competition dates are 7-9 August 2020. Based on the success of the 2019 Legion Nationals, there are no major concerns at this time. There is tremendous support locally and provincially (over the two years, \$100,000 from Cape Breton University, \$100,000 from Cape Breton Regional Municipality and \$90,000 from the Province of Nova Scotia) and the Local Organizing Committee has been wonderful to work with to date. A final site visit will occur in the spring – dates to be confirmed.

b. <u>Schedule</u> – The first draft of the schedule has been developed as follows:

c. <u>Sponsorship</u> – Programmed Insurance Brokers Inc. will continue its \$20,000 sponsorship for 2020. MBNA will again be solicited for sponsorship funding, as will an assortment of companies including BMO.

d. <u>**Remembrance Theme**</u> – The selected remembrance theme for 2020 is the 75th anniversary of the end of the Second World War. An accompanying theme will be Peacekeepers Day (9 August).



e. <u>Invitees</u> – The Lieutenant Governor of Nova Scotia will be invited to attend as the opening ceremony guest of honour. The invitation for a closing banquet guest of honour is still in the planning stages.

f. <u>Event Assistant</u> – Interviews for the event assistant will be conducted during the last week of November 2019 and an Algonquin College School of Sports Business Management student will be selected for a 2020 internship. The selected intern will begin the internship with the Legion during the first full week of January 2020.

g. <u>Athletics Canada</u> – As part of the Athletics Canada partnership, they will continue to provide merchandise and webcast support for 2020. In addition, Athletics Canada will provide a technical representative, as well as high performance athlete guest speakers.

h. <u>Head Chaperones</u> – It has been noted that there needs to be succession planning for when the current Head Chaperones are no longer in a position to volunteer. As such, consideration needs to be given to qualified replacements and those replacements must be exposed to the duties assigned to these positions during the next Legion Nationals.

13. 2021 & 2022 LEGION NATIONAL TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Dominion policy is to normally hold the Legion National Youth Track & Field Championships in the following timeframes which have been approved by the Dominion Command Sports Committee:

- i. 2021: 4-10 August 2021 (competition dates: 6-8 August)
- ii. 2022: 3-9 August 2022 (competition dates: 5-7 August)

The call for applications to host the 2021 & 2022 Legion National Youth Track and Field Championships was sent out 17 April 2019 as an all branch and email to Provincial Commands, as well as distributed to all members of the Canadian Sport Tourism Alliance.

As a result of an enhanced bid process and promotion of the event, multiple high-quality bids from various communities were received. Following a competitive review of the proposals, the Sports Committee selected Sherbrooke, Quebec to host the 2021 & 2022 Legion Nationals.

The chair instructed the committee coordinator to inform the selected host, as well as thank the municipalities that applied.

In addition, all competitors attending a national tournament must adhere to a mandatory dress code to include, as a minimum, collared shirts, slacks and closed shoes.

Provincial Commands will increase their communications surrounding hosting Dominion Member Sports Championships and will continue to develop strategies to enhance member engagement.

6. <u>2021 DOMINION MEMBER SPORTS CHAMPIONSHIPS</u>

The following dates for the 2021 Dominion Member Sport Championships are in accordance with article 306 of the Sports Guide:

- i. Cribbage: Friday 23 April Monday 26 Apr 2021 (Friday and Monday being arrival and departure days respectively).
- ii. Darts: Friday 30 April Monday 3 May 2021 (Friday and Monday being arrival and departure days respectively).
- ii. Eight Ball: Friday 28 May Monday 31 May 2021 (Friday and Monday being arrival and departure days respectively).

Submissions are to be made by individual branches and must be submitted through their respective Provincial Command by 31 July 2019. Provincial Commands are asked to prioritize the applications they receive before submitting them to the Dominion Command Sports Committee for consideration by 31 August 2019.

7. DOMINION EIGHT BALL PARTICIPATION

In 2018, there were three Provincial Commands that did not participate in the Dominion Eight Ball Championships. BC/YT did not have a Provincial Championships as they did not have 50% of their zones participating in eight ball. MB/NWO cancelled their Provincial Championships as they did not have a host for the event. QC only had 11 teams interested; therefore, decided not to run a Provincial Eight Ball Championships.

These three Provincial Commands are requested to develop new strategies to increase branch engagement and minimize restrictions and barriers to participation.

8. DOMINION MEMBER SPORTS CHAMPIONSHIPS ELIGIBILITY

The following items brought forward to the Dominion Command Sports Committee were discussed:

a. <u>Member in Good Standing</u>

Dominion Member Sports Championships are open to members as defined in the General By-Laws of The Royal Canadian Legion. To be eligible, members must be in good standing and should have their membership card for the year in which the championship is being held in their possession at the site of the championship. Member in good standing means a member who is not under suspension or is not in arrears in payment of dues.

It was discussed that a member becomes a member in good standing as soon as they pay their dues; therefore, it does not have to be before 31 January. January 31 is only applicable when a member transfers from another branch.

b. <u>Member Initiation</u>

The Membership Application states: "Congratulations you are now an initiated member of the Royal Canadian Legion subject to Branch policy. Further welcoming ceremony processes are at the discretion of your local Branch."

The will of the Membership Committee was to allow branches to maintain their autonomy and continue with the traditional swearing in ceremony if they so wished. That said, to expedite the process of new members joining the Legion, the traditional swearing in ceremony is now optional and not required by the Branch.

Committee Members discussed the need for consistency between branches as some branches require individuals to be accepted by the branch before they can become a member which can take a considerable amount of time.

c. Volunteer Hours

In response to a question from Nova Scotia/Nunavut Command, branches may opt to institute a required minimum number of volunteer hours in order to qualify for funding to participate at the National level. In addition, for general play at the branch level, the branch itself can dictate who is eligible and/or under what requirements are needed to participate. However, it should be noted that any member in good standing is eligible to participate in a branch sports activity that is a qualifier for a Dominion Sports championship. Therefore, if a branch is hosting a qualifier to progress to the Dominion level for Darts, Cribbage or Eight Ball, any member in good standing would be entitled to participate with no branch

imposed restrictions.

The committee concluded that these three eligibility concerns require input from the Membership Committee, C&L Committee and DEC as there are multiple aspects to consider and discuss.

Action: Committee Chair

9. 2019 LEGION NATIONAL YOUTH TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

a. <u>Event Dates/Location/Update</u>

Cape Breton, Nova Scotia will host the 2019 Legion Nationals from 7-13 August 2019. The competition dates are 9-11 August.

A preliminary site visit was conducted 3-6 November 2018 and there are no major concerns at this time. There is tremendous support locally and provincially (over the two years, \$100,000 from Cape Breton University, \$100,000 from Cape Breton Regional Municipality and \$90,000 from the Province of Nova Scotia) and the Local Arrangements Committee has been wonderful to work with to date. A follow up site visit will occur in the spring – dates to be confirmed.

b. <u>Schedule</u>

The overall schedule has been confirmed and the competition schedule is currently being developed.

c. <u>Athletics Canada</u>

The partnership between The Royal Canadian Legion and Athletics Canada has been reestablished, with Athletics Canada providing merchandise and webcast support. In addition, Athletics Canada will provide a technical representative, as well as high performance athlete guest speakers.

d. <u>Travel</u>

Flight group bookings have been made for ON, MB/NOW, SK, AB/NT and BC/YT through WestJet, Air Canada and Porter Airlines. The remaining Provincial teams will be travelling by bus.

e. <u>Remembrance Theme</u>

The selected remembrance theme for 2019 is the 75th anniversary of D-Day. An accompanying theme will be Peacekeepers Day (9 August). The remembrance theme event logo is below.



10. 2020 LEGION NATIONAL YOUTH TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Cape Breton, Nova Scotia will host the 2020 Legion Nationals from 5-11 August 2020. The competition dates are 7-9 August 2020.

11. 2021 & 2022 LEGION NATIONAL TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Dominion policy is to normally hold the Legion National Youth Track & Field Championships in the following timeframes which have been approved by the Dominion Command Sports Committee:

i. 2021: 4-10 August 2021 (competition dates: 6-8 August)

ii. 2022: 3-9 August 2022 (competition dates: 5-7 August)

A call for hosting applications will go out from Dominion Command to all Provincial Commands and interested municipalities. The document is currently being developed in conjunction with Athletics Canada and will be shared with the Dominion Command Sports Committee prior to general distribution.

12. LEGION NATIONALS GENERAL

The following items brought forward to the Dominion Command Sports Committee were discussed:

a. Best Practices

In order to share best practices and enhance the overall athlete experience, a Dropbox folder was set-up for Provincial Commands to share items such as selection criteria, welcome emails to the athletes, memos to the chaperones and coaches, roles and responsibilities, templates, etc.

Dominion Command requested that each Provincial Command share their Legion Team Selection Criteria through Dropbox.

Action: Provincial Commands

b. <u>Proposed Sports Guide Amendment – Sports Guide 707</u>

The intent of this amendment is to ensure that the Legion Nationals coaching criteria are consistent with the National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) standards and Athletics Canada requirements.

As per section 707 of the current Sports Guide, the criteria for coaches are as follows:

b. Each Provincial Command must name one coach as the Head Coach and that person should be fully certified at Level 3. All remaining team coaches should require a Level 2 certification. There may be exceptions to this rule; and

c. Each provincial athletic association is permitted to designate no more than two additional coaches of Level 1 or 2 to accompany their team for certification purposes.

In the last 10 years, the NCCP has transitioned away from delivering Level 1, 2, and 3 programming. The Levels-NCCP system has been replaced by coach training opportunities that are grouped into three main streams: Competition, Instruction, and Community Sport.

Specific to track and field, Level 3 has been replaced with Performance Coach, Level 2 has been replaced with Club Coach, and Level 1 has been replaced with Sport Coach. Upon consultation with the Athletics Canada Coaching Advisory Council, replacing each

level with their respective new designation would not be appropriate for the age group and long-term athlete development (LTAD) stage of Legion Nationals athletes. The Athletics Canada website states: "The Performance Coach certification is for coaches who are coaching year round, 40 or more weeks a year and 5-10 sessions a week. The athletes they are responsible for are competing at the national level in the junior or senior categories. The training for this course is event group focused. The main focus of this course is annual planning and periodization." Note the reference to "junior and senior" categories, not youth, as for Legion Nationals athletes.

Since Athletics Canada's Performance Coach certification is required for coaches who are working with U20 or older athletes, the following recommendations are brought forward for DEC consideration and approval:

- **RECOMMENDATION:** It is recommended that section 707b of the Sports Guide be amended to read: "Each Provincial Command must name one coach as the Head Coach and that *person has to be a fully certified National Coaching Certification Program (NCCP) club coach. All other team coaches require NCCP club coach trained certification.* There may be exceptions to this rule."
- **RECOMMENDATION:** It is recommended that section 707c of the Sports Guide be amended to read: "Each provincial athletic association is permitted to designate no more than two additional *NCCP club or sport trained coaches* to accompany their team *for professional development purposes.*"

c. Track & Field Championships Provincial Chairs Meeting

As a result of the success of the 2018 Track & Field Championships Provincial Chairs Meeting, another meeting will be held during the 2019 Legion Nationals. The meeting is not mandatory and a conference call line will be open for those who are not already at the Championships. The intent of the meeting is to provide chairs with the opportunity to share knowledge, discuss best practices and onboard new provincial chairs as required. The proposed date is Monday, 12 August 2019 – to be confirmed.

13. <u>REGIONAL REPRESENTATION – COMMITTEE MEMBERS</u>

The current committee liaison tasks are assigned as follows:

Sports Committee members will make and maintain contact with their associated provincial sports representatives and provide any feedback to the Dominion Command Sports Committee on Provincial Command concerns for both Legion member sports and track and field.

14. <u>NEW BUSINESS</u>

The following new business items were raised:

a. Legion Nationals Head Chaperones succession plan

It was discussed that there needs to be succession planning when the current Head Chaperones are no longer in a position to volunteer. As such, consideration needs to be given to qualified replacements and those replacements must be exposed to the duties assigned to these positions.

15. CLOSING RITUAL AND ADJOURNMENT

The chair concluded the meeting by thanking the committee members and the Provincial Command sports representatives for their insight and valued input. The chair conducted the closing ritual and the meeting adjourned 4 February 2019 at 2000 hours EST.

Accomodations

- Had 2 choices for hotels that were close to the Legion Branch
- Utilized MEETING ENCORE to determine best choice and to make contract. This company does not cost us. Payment to company comes from the hotel. We were very satisfied with Meeting Encore's service. They work nation-wide.
- One team (PEI) stayed at hotel in Gatineau due to insufficient space at the event hotel. They were provided with name of ("sister") hotel.
- Note: At future event if an overbooking occurs I suggest that the team / person contact the Legion Branch to see if there are any close alternatives.
- We had a greeter at the hotel on the main day of arrivals (Friday) only.
- We provided a local map of places of interest within walking distance of the hotel (banks, liquor outlet, drug store, etc.)
- District sports person only stayed at hotel for one night due to disturbances from a youth sports team that was also at the hotel. Hotel only charged for the one night.

Sport

- Branch had some cribbage boards. Remainder borrowed from Zone.
- Cards purchased from Costco in bulk pack.
- Extra pegs were required and were purchased online.
- Admin paperwork looked after by Zone / District event convenors.
- Event convenor provided computer and projector to display info during competition and to email results.
- Event convenor provided floor play for tables for competition.
- Registration table manned by event convenor on Friday evening.
- Referee from Zone.

Entertainment

- Entertainment provided Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights for this event.
- Westboro Legion normally charges for its Saturday entertainment (\$2.00 for Legion members and L.A. members from any Branch and \$5.00 for all others). For this event entertainment was free for all for all three nights.
- Note: Low turnout on Sunday evening due to early flights out on Monday. We would not recommend having Sunday evening entertainment.

Transportation

- Acquired 3 courtesy vans from local company at no charge Friday through Monday.
- Branch paid for insurance and gas for the courtesy vehicles.
- When vehicles were picked up copy of those driver's licenses were provided. Those drivers who did not pick up the vehicles had their licenses photocopied and provided to company.
- Some personal vehicles were utilized to cover high volume times.
- No insurance required for personal vehicles as drivers were volunteers and received no financial compensation.
- Transport from airport provided only on main day of arrival. Competitors that arrived on other days were responsible for their own means to get to the hotel.
- Signs were made for vehicles to indicate that they were for the Legion event.
- We did not have gas cards. All vehicles were refueled by one person who was reimbursed later.
- Branch does not have its own parking. In addition to places we utilize outside of regular business hours we had permission to park at a local funeral home when it was not in use for a service.
- Transport Chair scheduled drivers Friday through Monday airport and local.
- Driver's cell phone numbers provided to Transport Chair and Airport Greeter.
- Schedule of arrivals and departures and contact info provided by Dominion Command and given to Transport Chair, Airport Greeter and Hotel Greeter.
- On Friday vehicles parked at "cell phone" parking which was close to airport pickup point and available for immediate pickups.
- Drivers were at Branch and hotel Friday, Saturday and Sunday to move people as required. Also undertook trips to War Museum, downtown and shopping as time permitted.
- On Friday, Saturday and Sunday nights last ride from Branch to hotel was scheduled for 11:30 p.m. After that time people were required to arrange their own rides.
- We provided one group a ride to the airport on Tuesday as a courtesy because we had a vehicle and driver available. It was appreciated.

Bar

- Asked for and received donation of wine from distributor.
- Competition held in downstairs hall. Bar opened downstairs on Saturday and Sunday at 11:00 for those who were interested.
- Upstairs bar normally opens at 12:00. Opened at 11:00 on Saturday and Sunday to be consistent.
- Draft machine brought in for downstairs use.

Food

- Food looked after by Branch's kitchen manager (a Scouter).
- Kitchen staffed by members of Scout Group (Service Alliance, ages 17 25) which is sponsored by Westboro Legion.
- Grocery stores solicited for donations. Limited response.
- Some food items donated by a member who has a business.
- As per Dominion Command all lunches and snacks during play were free for competitors.
- Branch provided breakfasts, lunches, snacks, Friday icebreaker and Saturday supper free to all volunteers.
- All competitors and volunteers paid for Sunday supper.
- A number of guests did not pay for Sunday awards dinner Ottawa city councilor, Zone G-5 Commander, Legion Magazine correspondent. Dominion Sports Committee Secretary insisted on paying for her meal so as to support Branch.
- Branch made numbered meal tickets for each meal to assist tracking of sales eg. Saturday Breakfast, Sunday breakfast. Tickets sold at merchandise table.
- Table cloths used for awards dinner.
- Meal served by cadet corps which is sponsored by Westboro Legion.
