The use of Poppy Funds to maintain or preserve local monuments, cenotaphs and war memorials is limited to the statue or structure itself and does not include landscaping or other grounds maintenance."

THANK YOU, COMRADE CHAIR AND GOOD MORNING COMRADES,

I KNOW THAT WE HAVE A FULL AGENDA TODAY SO I WILL KEEP MY COMMENTS BRIEF.

BEFORE I BEGIN I WOULD LIKE TO SAY THAT I KNOW THAT ALL OF US WERE VERY CONCERNED TO LEARN OF COMRADE TOM'S RECENT HEART ATTACK, JUST AFTER BEING RELEASED FROM A LENGTHY STAY IN HOSPITAL. I KNOW THAT OUR THOUGHTS ARE WITH HIM AND HIS FAMILY. AND THAT WE LOOK FORWARD TO HS RETURN TO DEC AS SOON AS THAT IS POSSIBLE.

I WOULD LIKE TO BEGIN BY EXPRESSING MY PERSONAL CONGRATULATIONS TO THE NEWLY INSTALLED MEMBERS OF THE DOMINION EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

I KNOW THAT YOU HAVE MANY YEARS OF DEDICATED SERVICE TO THE LEGION AND THAT YOU EACH BRING A GREAT DEAL OF EXPERIENCE, WISDOM AND INSIGHT TO THE SENIOR LEADERSHIP COUNCIL OF THIS GREAT NATIONAL INSTITUTION.

I WOULD LIKE TO PARTICULARLY THANK COMRADE DONNA FOR RETURNING TO DEC AT SHORT NOTICE TO TAKE ON THE CHALLENGING ROLE OF DOMINION TREASURER.

WELCOME BACK DONNA AND THANKS FOR YOUR DEDICATION.

I VERY MUCH LOOK FORWARD TO WORKING WITH THE THREE NEW MEMBERS OF DEC..

I WOULD ALSO LIKE TO EXPRESS MY PERSONAL APPRECIATION AND A BIG BRAVO ZULU TO YOUR PREDECESSORS TOO. IT WAS A PRIVILEGE TO WORK WITH THEM AT A CHALLENGING TIME AS WE EMERGED FROM THE PANDEMIC.

IT REMAINS A CHALLENGING TIME FOR THE LEGION BUT ALSO ONE OF SIGNIFICANT OPPORTUNITY IN MANY AREAS INCLUDING MEMBERSHIP, WHICH THIS WEEK WAS REPORTED BY COMRADE RANDY AS 252,000 AND CONTINUING TO GROW AT THE BRANCH LEVEL.

ANOTHER MEMORABLE EVENT WAS THE DOMINION PRESIDENT'S PRESENTATION OF THE FIRST POPPY TO THE GOVERNOR GENERAL ON 20 OCTOBER.

THE GOVERNOR GENERAL AND HER HUSBAND ONCE AGAIN DID A GREAT JOB OF MAKING THIS CEREMONY AND THE RECEPTION WHICH FOLLOWED VERY SPECIAL AND VERY ENJOYABLE FOR ALL THE VETERANS AND OTHER GUESTS THAT WERE IN ATTENDANCE. THEY WERE ALSO AMONG THE LAST TO LEAVE THE RECEPTION.

THEIR EXCEPTIONAL WARMTH AND KINDNESS WERE SIMILARLY EVIDENT THROUGHOUT THE LUNCHEON THEY HOSTED IN HONOUR OF THE SILVER CROSS MOTHER ON REMEMBRANCE DAY FOLLOWING THE NATIONAL REMEMBRANCE CEREMONY.

SPEAKING OF WHICH, VETERANS WEEK EVENTS IN OTTAWA THIS YEAR, WHICH BEGAN WITH AN OUTSTANDING CEREMONY AT THE SENATE ON 3 NOVEMBER, WERE ADMIRABLY SUPPORTED AND/OR LED BY THE LEGION AND CULMINATED IN AN OUTSTANDING AND WELL ATTENDED NATIONAL REMEMBRANCE CEREMONY AT THE WAR MEMORIAL ON 11 NOVEMBER. THIS WAS A SUPERB TEAM EFFORT, IMPRESSIVELY ORGANIZED AND LED BY DOMINION COMMAND WITH STELLAR SUPPORT FROM THE CANADIAN ARMED FORCES, LOCAL LEGION VOLUNTEERS AND VARIOUS POLICE AND OTHER KEY PARTNERS.

I WOULD ALSO LIKE TO COMMEND AND TO THANK THE ENTIRE LEGION HOUSE TEAM FOR THEIR ENTHUSIASTIC AND EXCELLENT EFFORTS THROUGHOUT THE CEREMONY, WHICH REALLY WARMED UP A COLD MORNING FOR MANY VETERANS AND OTHER ATTENDEES. FINALLY WELL DONE, CONGRATULATIONS AND MANY THANKS TO EACH OF YOU, TO YOUR COMMANDS AND TO YOUR BRANCHES FOR YOUR HIGHLY DEDICATED AND OUTSTANDING EFFORTS IN HELPING CANADA AND CANADIANS ACROSS THE COUNTRY "TO REMEMBER" IN A FITTING WAY ON REMEMBRANCE DAY.



ITEM 7: 2024 BUDGET

OVERVIEW

The 2024 budget target was set at a break-even point of \$31,685. The current position of revenue (as of 30 September) is positive at \$360,070, however, due to seasonal revenue and cost fluctuation, typically approximately 90% of revenue is collected at this time where expenses may not reflect all expenditures recorded that were planned for this year. Projected numbers for 2023 at this point can be distorted.

REVENUES

The 2023 membership revenue is up 5.7% compared to the same time last year. Assuming that all branches are operating at the normal pace and with a targeted marketing campaign this year, the Legion surpassed projected revenue of 240,664 members. As of 26 October, membership revenue for 2023 is 101% or 247,370 members processed for the year. Legion Membership is now guaranteed to grow for the second consecutive year and will surpass 250,000 for the first time since 2019. The projection for the 2024 based on 243,071 members which is 2.6 % percent growth from the prior year. There are 37,400 new/reinstated members who have been processed to date (as of 26 October) which is a 26% increase from the previous year. In addition, 52,263 members have been processed for 2024. As always, focus continues to be on the membership development and the importance of it to all levels of the Legion.

Investment income estimated for 2024 as per our portfolio is approx.. \$554K. The draw down of \$3M for emergency distribution to the branches during the pandemic reduced the level of reserves and impacted revenues for the future years.

Economic growth is often correlated with stock market performance. If the economy continues to grow, corporate earnings could also increase, potentially driving stock prices higher. However, economic phases can vary, and unexpected events can impact growth. The US and Canadian economy's trajectory over the next five years involves factors like GDP growth, unemployment rates, and inflation. While uncertainties are inevitable, experts foresee slow but steady economic growth, supported by factors such as increased immigration, a decentralized economy, and technological advancements. However, the potential debt crisis and political changes can significantly impact these projections. Bank of Canada actions, especially changes in interest rates, can significantly influence the stock market. Rising interest rates could lead to higher borrowing costs for companies and consumers, affecting spending and investment.

External risks, combined with economic indicators, contribute to the overall uncertainty surrounding the market's future.


The composition of Legion portfolios is low risk, a mix of equity and fixed income, which

aimed to generate long-term returns. During a recession, dividends are especially important because they provide a cushion even if the stock price falls. The year 2024 could be another challenging year with the moderate impact on our investment portfolio. For information, the investment revenues earned in the operating budget are retained in the investment fund and not transferred to the General Fund bank account at year end. By doing this we receive a greater rate of return on the money. When cash in needed for operating expenses or expenses that are charged to Reserves it is withdrawn at that time. This gives us the highest possible return on investments. Current general investment portfolio balance as of 26 October, is \$15,939,382.

The Supply Department is forecasting sales of \$3,500,000 (an increase of 7.7% from last year) and royalty payments from Legion Lager of \$15,000. For a total of \$3,515,000. Last year, revenue was driven by successful sales of new stock items which maintained sales of approx. \$2.8M.

As previously approved, the chargebacks to the Poppy Fund for the noted departments are:

- Veterans Services: 95% of the personnel budget and 100% of admin expense
- Financial Services and Accounting fees: 20%
- Marketing and Communications Department: 12%
- Marketing, Advertising and Promotion: 12%

EXPENSES

Some revenue streams are showing a slight uptick towards the end of this year, however, the outlook is clouded by a number of uncertainties: there is an assumption that this trend will continue into the 2024. Expenses were analysed and adjusted according to the projected revenue for 2024.

Department / Section Budgets:

- Labour across departments There is a marginal increase in payroll expenses because of a modernization of pay levels derived as a result of an independent assessment of pay equity of Legion Headquarters and similar organizations in the country. These are non-avoidable expenses necessary to attract and retain qualified, excellent people of substance.
- Member Services Besides the change to salary expenses, there are additional
 costs to credit card processing fees of \$25,000 due to the increase of online portal
 activities. Miscellaneous costs are under budget this year, which consists of cost
 of the free pins for the free memberships given to retiring members of the CAF as
 an incentive to have them join and renew as members of the Legion.
- Marketing An increase of \$51,040, to enrich the strategy of membership and supply growth. However, as a result of departmental analysis, there is a charge back of \$125,760 to PTF for the work the department delivers.
- Financial Services An overall increase of \$4,934, due mostly to salary fluctuations and two maternity leaves. As a result of departmental analysis, it was determined that the Finance Team spends 10% of their time supporting Veteran's services and 20% spending supporting the Poppy campaign throughout the year. As a result, there is a PTF charge back of \$178,815.
- Supply An overall increase of \$178,979 compared to last year. Shipping costs and wrapping materials are the major factor in this outcome. Postage has increased by \$100,000. The PTF charge back for this department is \$407,430 for services delivered.

- Veterans Services this department works exclusively for Veterans. In the past, as approved by DEC, 95% of the labor incurred by the department was recoverable from PTF. There is a minor increase in various accounts of \$13,171.
- Corporate Services An overall increase of \$25,421, mostly due to marginal annual payroll COLA indexation. Office supplies and telephone costs decreased by \$12K.
- Information Technology Section There is a projected increase of \$212,045.
 There is a plan to upgrade Legion HQ IT structure in 2024, which is necessary to continue to be operational. Programming and technical support costs increased by \$39,000, due to CRM and GP upgrades in 2023. Maintenance/contracts are reduced by \$54,000.

The majority of all departmental expenses are underbudget, as projected.

Committee Budgets

Committee expenses are projected to upsurge by \$124,803. The major changes are:

- Public Relations reduced by \$25,080 due to the removal of the travel and per diem for in-person committee meetings and certain expenses related to media monitoring and PR support.
- National T&F is \$50,817 less than last year budget. It is due to lower transportation and accommodation costs. The outcome of this budget will vary depending on the location.
- Elected officers reduced by \$11,000 due to less travel required in 2024.
- DEC/Senior Elected Officers' overall cost is increased by \$25,000 to reflect the actual cost for in-person meeting and allowance for LHQ annual reception.

The Centennial Fund grant for the Legion National Youth Track & Field

Championships, with necessary approvals, should be renewed for \$100,000 for the 2024 year. Please note, the location plays a significant contribution toward increased costs for the year and for 2024 as well. This is shown in the Recoveries section of the Track & Field budget.

FUTURE CONSIDERATION

Proposed Increase of per capita tax fees for 2025.

As per our national strategic plan passed at the 2018 Dominion Convention, we have begun to grow membership, modernize our infrastructure and improve our organizational communications and overall public awareness. Investments have been required to accomplish these goals which are yielding some of the most positive results we have experienced in over three decades. Since our last per capita increase passed at the 2016 Dominion Convention, our operating costs, like any business, have increased over the past 8 years. To maintain the level of investment in the services Legion members are accustomed to, and to ensure we continue our momentum to execute our strategic plan moving towards our centenary, we will be presenting a resolution to DEC in Spring 2024 for a modest Dominion per capita increase for 2025. If approved by DEC, this resolution would be voted on by attending delegates at the 2024 Dominion Convention in Saint John, NB.

This information is provided to ensure full transparency with our membership.

CONCLUSION

The draft budget follows for review and discussion.

Royal British Legion & Royal British Legion (Scotland) Conventions May 17th-28th, 2023

l attended both conventions. The RBL was held in Torquay in South-west England . The RBL (Scotland) was held in Perth Scotland. Many of the issues and problems discussed were similar to what would have been heard at a Royal Canadian Legion Dominion or Provincial Convention i.e. membership, modernization, electronic processes, veterans issues and governance. However, in discussion with our counterparts we found that the RCL was already moving forward on many of these initiatives while they were still at the beginning of these processes. We heard that their dependency on non-electronic means of conducting "processes" had caused great difficulties during the pandemic and lockdown periods and there was great interest in our experiences. There are significant differences between the RBL and RCL particularly in governance and mission. The RBL is foremost a charity and is governed under specific rules for British Charities and their governing body is a Board of Trusties not the membership. Also, the number of "branches" has declined significantly in number and importance. All in all, an excellent informative visit, both Chairpersons indicated their intent to attend our next convention.

I would suggest that in future we only attend in "off" Dominion Convention years.

CIMVHR Forum October 15th -18th, 2023.

I attended the CIMVHR forum in Gatineau QC. CIMVHR stands for the "Canadian Institute for Military and Veterans Health Research" and is supported both financially and conceptually by the Royal Canadian Legion. The forum was well attended by Researchers, Clinicians, Physicians, Psychiatrists, Psychologists and Technicians, both military and civilian and those organizations such as the Royal Canadian Legion who support their "evidence based" research.

A "moral injury" occurs in a military member when they are required to commit, or fail to prevent, incidents which violate their own personally held beliefs or moral values. I have no doubt of the immense value of this "evidence based" research to our military along with all the other statistical studies and research being done on veteran's issues.

I also had the privilege of introducing the Legions new \$50,000 PHD. Scholarship beginning in 2024. The Royal Canadian Legion was mentioned and thanked on numerous occasions for its ongoing support of CIMVHR and its financial support of "evidence-based research" through our Master Scholarship Programme and our newly announced PHD Scholarship.

I believe it is essential to continue our presence at the annual CIMVHR forum "True Patriot Love" is there "Wounded Warriors" is there "Soldier On" is there and the Royal Canadian Legion should be there.

Report to the President Memorial Cup 2023 – Kamloops, British Columbia

Kamloops hosted the 2023 Memorial Cup from 25 May to 04 June, 2023.

I was asked by President Bruce Julian to represent him as the Royal Canadian Legion representative to the games.

My role was initially unclear, and through communications with Dion Edmonds, I connected with Canadian Hockey League (CHL) officials to define my duties.

It became evident, my only official duty at the event was to present the 2023 Memorial Cup Jersey to Chief Roseanne Casimir of Kamloops Indian Band. This was to be done at the arrival of the cup on 25 May.

BC Yukon Command ED Veronica Brown and I had one Zoom meeting with Patrick Roberge, the person in charge of the arrival of the cup ceremony. That conversation took place in early April and was the last contact prior to the actual ceremony.

In gleaning info from other sources, I met with Mr. Roberge and his team at the practice for the arrival of the cup event, an hour before the actual event, and was briefed on my involvement.

My duty was to unveil the Memorial Cup Jersey at the arrival of the cup event, then present it to Chief Casimir.

After the event, I was invited to the VIP reception sponsored by the local organizing committee. This invite occurred only because of my knowing the President of the Kamloops Blazers, I was not invited by the CHL.

That was the extent of my official involvement.

Because I am known locally by the local organizing committee, I was asked by the CHL to provide a Veteran to drop the puck at the opening game. I took the opportunity to represent the Legion and Veterans, and chose to drop the puck myself.

I was also interviewed twice by the CHL in taped interviews, one on the history of the Memorial Cup and the second on the relationship of the Indigenous Pin and the Memorial Cup jersey.

I must make a few comments overall.

There seemed to be a lack of communications between CHL and the Legion. There was also found to be some issues that arose around the Memorial Cup Jersey.

The Rocky Mountain Rangers were not pleased their logo would not be on the MC Jersey. Dion advised this decision was made in Ottawa by a person from the Strategic Joint Staff (SJS), a woman named Louise.

When discussing the make-up of the Colour Party for the first game, the Legion was advised SJS (Louise) had decreed there would be no Veterans involved, the Colours would be presented solely by the Rocky Mountain Rangers.

Each evening during the games, a member of the Rocky Mountain Rangers was spotlighted on the big screen and was in attendance. No Veterans were spotlighted.

During the distribution of poppies to the final game, the DCO of the Rocky Mountain Rangers advised SJS (Louise) had decreed there would be no poppies worn by any member of the military, specifically the Rocky Mountain Rangers. The DCO advised SJS was angry that military members had worn poppies during the first game.

The City of Kamloops has a long and storied relationship with 419 Tactical Fighter (Training) Squadron based at CFB Cold Lake, Alberta, in fact, 419 Squadron has "Freedom Of The City Of Kamloops", an honour bestowed them many years ago. 419 Squadron was already set to attend a function in Kamloops on 2023 May 27, and because they were already going to be in the City, the Mayor and Council requested they perform a "fly-past" at the arrival of the cup ceremonies.

SJS (Louise) took great exception to this request for a "fly-past" and went to lengths to have it stopped. Had it not been for the intervention of the Member of Parliament for this riding, and Chief Casimir, the "fly-past" would not have happened.

In talking with CHL, local organizers and local military personnel, it seems SJS (Louise) wanted the Legion to have no official role in the MC. This seems to be something that stems from meetings between the Legion and SJS.

On a lighter note, the Kamloops Legion Branch 01-052 was front and center during the entirety of the MC. The Branch hosted a breakfast for the MC followers booster club, the Junior Junkies, as well as having pre-game meals available.

Branch members also manned the Legion booth in the Fan Zone the entire week.

By chance, I was fortunate enough to meet the organizing team from Saginaw, Michigan, the hosts for the 2024 Memorial Cup. They were very interested in the Legion's involvement throughout. At their request, I provided them with Dion's email as they are looking at including the RCL in their event next year.

Finally Bruce, I wish to personally say thank-you for allowing me the privilege of representing you and the RCL at the 2023 Memorial Cup event in Kamloops.

- f. We are always creating and developing new products to help increase revenue generated through the Supply Department.
- g. Supply continues to support committee activities and initiatives.

5. <u>Marketing and Communications</u>

a. Communications

The department continued to produce communications impacting our mission pillars. Videos were developed around advocacy positions focused on Veteran Homelessness as well as showcasing the Legion National Youth Track & Field Championships first ambassador. We successfully implemented communication strategies to highlight the first National Legion week as well as the annual Poppy Campaign and National Remembrance Day Ceremony that generated National coverage.

b. Direct Mail Marketing

Three renewal marketing campaigns were launched this year – the latest in October to over 58K members with no email on file encouraging them to renew.

c. Email Marketing

Email renewal reminders continue to be sent to members with an email on file (now over 100K on file and growing) on a consistent basis throughout the year. The department continues to issue branch and member newsletters via email each month. Emails are proving to be quite successful: the industry average for nonprofit emails show a 40% open rate and 2% click rate vs the Legion's, which have a 51% open rate 8.4% click rate. This further reinforces the need for email collection at all levels of the organization.

d. Social Media

We have invested a significant portion of our annual budget in Social Media advertising to drive membership acquisition as well as Poppy Store Sales. This complements our organic posts that are designed to raise awareness.

Both the Store and membership are up significantly Year of Year. The social campaign is also driving significant traffic to legion.ca in key areas. See below Year over Year increases in site traffic.

e. Broadcast Marketing

New TV and Radio spots were developed for the Remembrance Period and received significant coverage by all major channels.

6. <u>IT</u>

a. Projects Completed Since May:

- New Wi-Fi throughout the building.
- Implementation of a new backup system, resulting in a cost savings of over \$12,000 annually by replacing two old solutions.
- Introduction of a new security awareness program.
- Deployment of Mobile Device Management for Legion-owned cell phones.

- Automation of system patching and applications updates using PDQ.
- Successful migration to a new integrations platform for our CRM/GP integrations, which involved re-architecting the process and eliminating manual steps.
- Completed a substantial Accounts Receivable cleanup within the Finance department.
- Implementation of a new ticketing system for IT and Membership.
- Identified and fixed several major issues in our payable reporting in CRM.
 This, combined with the re-architecting of the integrations, has led to two
 months of no issues with provincial payables for Finance during some of
 our highest volume months.
- Built a CRM plugin to handle Digital Card URLs, enabling us to fully launch the Digital Card.

b. Projects Ongoing:

Some challenges were experienced with the Portal Upgrade project. A part of the upgrade that was originally considered straightforward turned out to be more complex than expected and could not be completed in the allotted timeframe. As a result, this will be postponed until 2024 to bundle it with our plan to migrate the portal to the cloud.

We continue to request updates from the government on important issues affecting our Veterans and their families; specifically, the backlog of disability claims which has made some positive progress, details on the Veterans Survivor Fund, the mandated priority "Elimination of the Marriage Over 60 Clause", for increased access to improved Veterans Independence Program, long term care, the promulgation of the National Homeless Veterans Strategy, and various other departmental benefits and programs.

3. CANADA LIFE

On 1 July 2023 Canada Life became the new health insurance for CAF members, veterans and public service employees, transitioning them from Sun Life. There have been several complaints raised in the media regarding difficulties in obtaining benefits and not being able to reach a representative on the phone. While those who raised public personal complaints appear to have been resolved, many others are experiencing the same difficulties. Comrade Bruce will be sending a letter shortly to the Treasury Board to advocate for all who are being negatively affected

by the transition as similar problems will likely be experienced when Canada Life also takes over the Pensioners Dental Plan in 2024.

4. **LEGISLATION**

Over the past several decades VAC benefits have come under the purview of the *Pension Act*, the *New Veterans Charter* and now the *Well-Being Act*. This has resulted in multiple different and overlapping benefits and programs depending upon when a Veteran applies for a disability benefit. Recommendations for fairness for all Veterans from the Minister's Advisory Groups have largely been ignored.

The Committee is exploring what would be the best way to advocate, such as a Royal Commission, Commission of Inquiry, or similar avenues and will invite Comrade Andrea Siew to present her research and recommendations to the VSS Committee in January.

INFORMATION ONLY ITEMS

5. CIMVHR FORUM

Comrades Bruce Julian, Dominion Command President, Steven Clark, the National Executive Director, and Carolyn Hughes, Director of Veterans Services attended the annual forum in Gatineau this year in October. The research being conducted is invaluable in providing better health and well-being for veterans and their families, and will guide the development of new and improved programs by VAC and improved health care overall.

The President spoke at three well-received events during the forum, presented the scholarship to Ms. Kathryn Reeves, and hosted the Student and Postdoctoral Engagement.

6. <u>MILITARY VETERAN WELLNESS PROGRAM</u>

Under Comrade Dave Gordon's guidance, the Committee and with Veterans Services at Dominion Command, continue to roll out the Homeless Veterans Program across the country. With consent, Veterans Services has the ability to verify Veteran's service, often within a few hours, but no later than 72 hours if request occurs over the weekend. This continues to expand across the country and Veterans Services has been seeing some uptake in referrals. Once service is verified, the veteran is then connected with the appropriate Provincial Command for assistance.

7. VETERANS SERVICES

There has been a turnover of Service Officers in various Provincial Commands across the country and at Dominion Command. Training continues to be ongoing

and Dominion Command Service Officers continue to support several Provincial Commands with Service Officer functions.

In 2024, the Director of Veterans Services or a senior Service Officer will conduct site visits across the country to provide assistance as needed and to ensure processes, procedures and security protocols are respected as per the RCL Business Process and MOU with Veterans Affairs Canada.

ACTION ITEMS FOR DECISION

1. PROPOSED POPPY MANUAL AMENDMENT – POPPY MANUAL 403.ii.a.

The Poppy and Remembrance Committee discussed that funds used for repairs in the Housing Accommodation or Care Facilities category within the Poppy Manual should be minimal; therefore, the intent of the following amendment is to ensure that Poppy Funds are only to be used for minor repairs.

RECOMMENDATION:

That section 403.ii.a. be amended to the read: "Housing Accommodation or Care Facilities: (prior Provincial Command approval is required) Up to 50 percent of the current balance, to assist in minor repairs or furnish housing accommodation and care facilities, including hospice facilities and hospital wards/rooms for Veterans."

2. PROPOSED POPPY MANUAL AMENDMENT – POPPY MANUAL 403.ii.f.

The purpose of a glossary is to define specific terms, not to provide parameters for the use of Poppy Trust Funds. Therefore, the intent of the following amendment is to move the restrictions regarding Poppy Trust Funds usage for monuments, cenotaphs and war memorials' grounds maintenance from the glossary on page 55 to section 403.ii.f. of the Poppy Manual.

RECOMMENDATION:

That section 403.ii.f. be amended to read: "Monuments: (prior Provincial Command approval is required) Up to 25 percent of the current balance, for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or preserving local monuments to Veterans. The 25 percent must not exceed one-half of the total funds (50 percent) required to construct, maintain or preserve local monuments for which funds are allocated. For Legion-owned monuments, 50 percent of the current balance may be used for the purpose of constructing, maintaining or preserving the monument. The use of Poppy Funds to maintain or preserve local monuments, cenotaphs and war memorials is limited to the statue or structure itself and does not include landscaping or other grounds maintenance "

3. PROPOSED POPPY MANUAL AMENDMENT – POPPY MANUAL 403.ii.g.

Branches have been permitted to donate to several cadet corps or squadrons, *multiple times per year*. Therefore, the intent of the following amendment is to ensure that each cadet corps or squadron is only receiving one donation per year from the Branch. To note, the total of the combined donations cannot exceed 20 percent of the balance of the Branch Poppy Fund.

RECOMMENDATION:

That section 403.ii.g. of the Poppy Manual be amended to the read: "Support of Cadet Units: (prior Provincial Command approval is required) *Once a year,* up to 20 percent of the balance, to support and encourage Cadet Units that have assisted the Branch with the Poppy Campaign or other Remembrance activities. Cadet units are defined as Sea Cadets, Army Cadets, Air Cadets, Navy League Cadets and Junior Canadian Rangers. An allotment would be for assistance to Cadet units, not reimbursements for individual expenses. See "Example" in Subsection 403.i.e."

4. PROPOSED POPPY MANUAL AMENDMENT – POPPY MANUAL 403.ii.k.

Since donations are also received as paper bills, the intent of the following amendment is to include bill sorting machines to count bills collected during the Poppy Campaign.

RECOMMENDATION:

That section 403.ii.k. be amended to read: "Money Sorting Machine: (prior Provincial Command approval is required) Up to 10 percent of the cost or maintenance cost of a coin or bill machine designed to count/sort/wrap coins or bills collected during the annual Poppy Campaign. Group funds or larger Branches may make application under this Section for a greater percentage, the approving authority will be the Provincial Command."

5. REQUEST FOR FUNDS – MARKETING THE POPPY CAMPAIGN 2024

The marketing department would like to actively promote the Poppy Campaign through a series of social media and on-line initiatives as part of the 2024 marketing plan.

Below are the details on the intended initiatives to take place between October and November 2024.

- Social media paid ads (X(Twitter)/Facebook/YouTube/Google): \$100,000
- Paid media buy (TV/Radio/Out of Home Signs) to encourage moment of silence/visit a local ceremony on November 11: \$75,000

Therefore, the following recommendation is presented to DEC for consideration.

RECOMMENDATION: That funding in the amount of \$175,000 for the 2024 marketing campaign be approved.

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION_

1. ZONES AND DISTRICTS TO HOLD POPPY FUNDS REQUEST

Allowing Zones and Districts to hold Poppy Funds was initially discussed during the 21 April 2022 Poppy and Remembrance Committee of the Whole meeting and the majority of Provincial Commands did not support the request.

The request was subsequently brought up at the DEC meeting on 30 April 2022 and it was directed that the Poppy and Remembrance Committee revisit this request. At the following Poppy and Remembrance Committee of the Whole meeting on 21 March 2023 the following was included under new business at item c:

"Zone and District Poppy Fund accounts. This was not brought to New Business as it will need to be brought as a resolution in the next Dominion Command

Convention to have the current rulings changed. The current status is that Zone and District levels may not hold Poppy Funds."

The Poppy and Remembrance Committee discussed that some Branches in larger cities are working together during the Poppy Campaign and have setup joint Poppy Funds. These funds are not managed by the Zones or Districts but by the Branches themselves. In addition to combined Branch efforts and Provincial Commands already being set up to assist with larger Poppy Fund requests, joint Poppy Funds may be a solution for Ontario Command's current concerns. Following the discussion, the Committee maintained their previous position that Zones and Districts do not require their own Poppy Funds and recommended that Ontario Command propose this resolution at the next Dominion Command Convention.

DISCUSSION: The above information is presented to DEC for discussion.

2. POPPY MANUAL 403.ii.a and c.

403.ii.a. "Housing Accommodation or Care Facilities: (prior Provincial Command approval is required) Up to 50 percent of the current balance, *to assist in minor repairs* or furnish housing accommodation and care facilities, including hospice facilities and hospital wards/rooms for Veterans."

403.ii.c. "Medical Appliances: (prior Provincial Command approval is required) Up to 50 percent of the current balance such as but not limited to, medical thermal imaging cameras and defibrillators which will assist in the care of Veterans within the community."

The Poppy and Remembrance Committee discussed how their Provincial Commands are addressing the special use requests in sections 403.ii.a. and c. There have been ongoing concerns that these uses sometimes may not directly support Veterans or their families. Therefore, the Committee has requested that Provincial Commands share their application process regarding the criteria (e.g., number of Veterans who could access the medical appliance, percentage of Veterans at the accommodations, etc.) that must be met before they approve these requests.

DISCUSSION: The above concern is presented to DEC for discussion.

THE WAY AHEAD: COMMITTEE PLANS / GOALS

1. POPPY TRADEMARK

Following direction and guidance from our intellectual property lawyers, The Poppy and Remembrance Committee is in the process of developing a formal Poppy

Trademark program to safeguard the Poppy insignia as a symbol of Remembrance. The new trademark terms and conditions and procedure to request use of the trademark will be shared in 2024. Since it is expected that the application process will be more rigorous in the future, individuals have been encouraged to request approval well before the beginning of the Poppy Campaign for future years. In the meantime, please report any Poppy trademark infringements to poppytrademark@legion.ca.

2. POPPY AND REMEMBRANCE DIVISION STRATEGIC PLAN REFRESH

The Poppy and Remembrance Committee, on behalf of the Legion National Foundation (LNF) where applicable, will continue to focus on reviewing, enhancing and modernizing Legion and LNF Poppy and Remembrance programs. In collaboration with Provincial Commands, the Committee's focuses will be on the Poppy Campaign, Poppy trademark, National Youth Remembrance Contests, Pilgrimage, Teaching Guide, Poppy and Remembrance promotional materials, and the expansion of corporate partnerships.

The 2023 host branches did an exceptional job at ensuring the members enjoyed a great weekend of comradeship, community, and friendly competition. The 2024 Dominion Member Sports Championships are anticipated with much excitement and will be hosted at the following locations:

3. LEGION NATIONAL YOUTH TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 2023 Legion Nationals took place in Sherbrooke, Quebec from 9 – 15 August 2023. A detailed summary of the event can be viewed at the end of this report. In general, postevent surveys and after-action reports indicated that the event was a huge success. For 2023, the Dominion Sports Committee moved the Legion Teams to Bishops University. Bishops provided an exceptional environment for the teams, going above and beyond in every aspect. From a competition perspective, the 2023 Legion Nationals was a huge success, registering the second largest number of athletes in the history of the championships. A major highlight of the event was the inclusion of Mike Trauner as the Legion Nationals Ambassador. Mike told his story as an Afghanistan veteran and competitive athlete, exemplifying the values of the Royal Canadian Legion and teaching the kids to face and overcome adversity. In summary, the 2023 Legion Nationals provided a life changing experience for Canadian youth through the delivery of values-based sport!

2023 Legion National Youth Track and Field Championships

The 2024 Legion Nationals will take place in Calgary, Alberta from 7-14 August. The competition will occur at Foothills Athletic Park. The Legion Teams will be housed at the University of Calgary. The Remembrance theme for the 2024 Legion Nationals is under development.

Future Legion Nationals

The dates for all upcoming scheduled Legion Nationals are as follows:

2026/2027 Legion Nationals Bid Process

4. **COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE MEETING**

The Sport Committee continues to maintain close liaison with Provincial Command sports representatives by encouraging a reciprocal flow of information and requesting feedback to enhance the Legion's Sports Program.

2023 LEGION NATIONAL YOUTH TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Post-Championships Report

The 45th Legion National Youth Track and Field Championships took place 9-15 August 2023 in Sherbrooke, Quebec. The total attendance was 908 athletes, including 307 Legion sponsored athletes, representing 9 of 10 Provincial Commands, and 601 open category athletes. The athletes were supported by 36 Legion sponsored chaperones and 31 Legion sponsored coaches, as well as 108 open category coaches. There were approximately 2,000 spectators, officials, and volunteers from all parts of Canada in attendance which included veterans, both retired and serving, covering all branches of service.

The program continued to consist of, for Legion athletes, instructional clinics, practice sessions, social activities, and the actual meet. For 2023, a remembrance theme of the 75th Anniversary of Peacekeeping was prominent throughout. For Provincial Command teams, the highlight of the event was visiting having the opportunity to listen to Mike Trauner, Canadian Forces and Afghanistan Veteran, speak about his experience suffering major injuries in Afghanistan and going on to become a decorated athlete.

The Royal Canadian Legion Dominion President attended the event and was the official guest of honour. Additionally, the Royal Canadian Legion Vice-President and Sports Committee Chair, Comrade Brian Weaver, was present throughout the event. In attendance as well was Comrade Norman Shelton, who attended on behalf of the Royal Canadian Legion QC President; Elisabeth Briére, Member of Parliament; Christine Labrie, National Assembly of Quebec, and Guy Marchesseault, Branch 010 President. The opening ceremony began with a parade led by Sergeant-at-Arms, Michel Rodrique, and his Color Party. The music was provided by piper Sylvain Ross. Additionally, the Canadian Forces Recruit and Leadership School official band provided music throughout the opening ceremony. Legion teams representing the participating Provincial Commands made for a wonderful opening. It should be noted that due to forecasted inclement weather, the opening ceremonies was held indoors at Bishops University. Immediately following the ceremony, Dominion Command hosted a reception on-site at Bishops University, Further receptions were held at Branch #010 Sherbrooke for the coaches and chaperones on Friday and Saturday respectively. The closing banquet was hosted at the Bishops University Sports Centre on Sunday evening. During the closing banquet, the President's Award, which recognizes individuals who have demonstrated exceptional dedication, support, and service to the Legion Nationals program, was presented to Mr. Danny Martin.

From the opening ceremony through to the closing banquet, Canada's contributions to freedom and the sacrifices of our veterans formed the cornerstone of this event. This was projected through the content of speeches, event publications, local and national media outlets and event paraphernalia sporting the 75th Anniversary of Peacekeeping (i.e. on volunteer t-shirts, event bags, hats, bibs, event booklets, etc.). Other areas of remembrance were the medals presented which featured silhouettes that paid tribute to

the UN veterans. On-site, a peacekeeping booth was set up which provided the public with information on the various peacekeeping missions Canada has contributed to. This booth was included UN Veterans who were able to speak to the public about their experiences. Additionally, two minutes of silence, the act of remembrance, and the laying of a wreath by the guest of honour, were all done during the opening ceremonies.

A major highlight of the event was the attendance of the first Legion Nationals Ambassador, Afghanistan Veteran Mike Trauner. Mike lost both his legs from an improvised explosive device while serving in Afghanistan in 2008. Mike has since gone on to be a successful national athlete, winning multiple medals including 2 Invictus Games gold medals. Mike spoke to the Legion Teams during the athlete clinics and was present throughout the competition. His experience and perseverance inspired all the athletes and helped educate the public on the sacrifices serving Canadian Forces members, and Veterans, make for Canada.

The meet was held from 11-13 August under favourable weather conditions. The facility at the Université de Sherbrooke was in excellent condition and enhanced the overall competition. The meet itself was carried out over a full three-day period under the excellent organization of the meet director, Daniel Quirion, the official's director, Cecil Lefebvre, and the technical advisor, Serge Thibaudeau. Six meet records were broken. The top Legion female athlete, receiving the LeRoy Washburn trophy, was Hannah Gates from Saskatchewan and the top male athlete, receiving the Jack Stenhouse trophy, was Caleb Piven from Quebec.

Logistically, the cafeteria from Bishops University provided all food for the Legion Teams while the stadium canteen provided food at the track. The food provided to the Legion Teams from Bishops University was excellent throughout the entire week. The quarters used to house the Legion teams were also in excellent condition at Bishops University. The transportation provided for staff and Legion teams was very flexible and, despite some logistical challenges transporting teams to and from the track, were sufficient in ensuring the transport went smoothly.

For 2023, an digital media campaign was conducted which included Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, and Snapchat. The digital media campaign was successful in reaching a large audience and bringing awareness to the Legion National Youth Track and Field Championships.

Additional promotion prior to the event was provided through advertisements at high school track and field championships and interviews with local and provincial media outlets. During the championships, the track events were broadcasted via live streaming on AthleticsCanada.TV.

The Sherbrooke community led by the LAC Chair (Judith Lefebvre) and President (Sandrine Charron) worked extremely hard to provide the best possible experience for the athletes, coaches, chaperones, and guests. Additionally, Legion Branch #010, led by President Guy Marchesseault, provided exceptional support throughout all aspects of the event. The entire Sherbrooke community rallied around the program providing a volunteer

base of over 200. Additionally, the 197 Frontenac Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps was involved in the opening ceremony, the medal presentations, the closing banquet, photography, and recruitment. The Université de Sherbrooke, Athletics Canada, Bitfarm, Athlétisme Sherbrooke, Yeti, Professional Institute of the Public Service of Canada, and Programmed Insurance Brokers Inc. were diamond level sponsors, along side many other local sponsors, who made the event possible.

The committee will bring forward a funding envelope recommendation for approval for the Individual Assistance Grants and Poppy Material needs for Caribbean countries that receive such support. It is expected the overall budget forecast will be close to or slightly over the 2023 budget which was at \$231,500.

THE WAY AHEAD: COMMITTEE PLANS / GOALS

The distribution of benevolent payments to Veterans in widows will continue with direct support to Antigua, Bahamas, Jamaica and Trinidad and Tobago.

Discussions surrounding the end of the RCEL mandate continue to take place along with consideration as to how the role and participation of RCL may evolve when this occurs in 2027.

As previously confirmed, RCL will be hosting the 2025 Conference between 29 June 2025 to 3 July 2025. This is anticipated to be the last conference RCEL conducts. Preliminary planning is underway to ensure this event is a success as it will bring significant worldwide attention the Royal Canadian Legion.

Monitoring and welfare visits to Jamaica and Bahamas are scheduled to take place in February and March 2024. Other islands in receipt of financial assistance and poppy materials were visited in February 2023.

The Legion's President Cruise will take place in February 2024. Dominion President, Bruce Julian and National Executive Director, Steven Clark will host a group of over 50 Legionnaires. Official visits including Wreath Laying Ceremonies, visits to war graves and cemeteries, meet and greet events with the Governors General will be conducted in St. Lucia, Tobago, Grenada and Antigua.

ACTION ITEMS FOR DECISION

The Defence and Security (D&S) Committee has one action item for decision.

1. Requirement for a National Women Veterans Monument

The Government of Canada should establish a national monument to honour Canadian Women Veterans and recognize their significant contributions and sacrifice to Canada and inspire future generations to appreciate the role women have played in Canada's military history. It would acknowledge their dedication, resilience, and pivotal role in defending the nation, and fostering a sense of equality and inclusivity in the narrative of Canada's military heritage.

Research shows that women often do not see themselves as a Veteran despite the fact that Canadian women have a long and outstanding history of serving in various capacities during times of conflict and peace. The following briefly highlights the significant contribution that women have made in supporting the defence and security of Canada:

 Prior to World War I women supported the military effort by volunteering as nurses, providing medical care to wounded soldiers, and participating in charitable organizations assisting the military. The Northwest Rebellion of 1885 and the Boer War (1899-1902) saw Canadian women providing medical aid and support to troops.

- It was during World War I that Canadian women's involvement in the military became more formalized and structured with the establishment of organizations like the Canadian Army Medical Corps and the Canadian Women's Army Corps (CWAC), leading to more recognized roles within the military. During World War I, Canadian women served as nurses, clerks, and in other supportive roles both at home and overseas. Approximately 2,500 Canadian Nursing Sisters were part of the Canadian Army Medical Corps, providing critical medical care.
- The Second World War saw a significant increase in the involvement of Canadian women. They served in the military in various roles, including the Canadian Women's Army Corps (CWAC), Royal Canadian Air Force Women's Division (RCAF-WD), and the Women's Royal Canadian Naval Service (WRCNS).
- After World War II, women's involvement in the military continued to expand:
 - Women served in Korea (1950-1953) and various peacekeeping missions.
 - o By the late 1970s, the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) began integrating women into all military occupations.
 - o In recent decades. Canadian women have served in diverse roles within the CAF, including combat roles, aviation, naval operations, intelligence, engineering, and more including during the Persian Gulf War (1990-1991) and the Afghanistan (2001-2014).

A monument recognizing Canadian Women Veterans would honour their service, resilience, and sacrifice, highlighting their integral role in shaping the military and societal landscape of Canada. It would serve not only as a symbol of gratitude for their service and sacrifice but also as a reminder of the ongoing need for gender equality and inclusivity in the CAF.

Today, there are almost 100,000 women Veterans who have served Canada and it is time that their service and sacrifice be recognized.

RECOMMENDATION: That the Royal Canadian Legion request that the Government of Canada establish a monument to honour Canadian Women Veterans, to recognize their significant contribution and sacrifice to Canada, and inspire future generations to understand the role women have played in Canada's military history.

ADVOCACY ACTIONS

2. RCMP - Definition of a Veteran for Commemoration Purposes

The Legion has not received a response to the letter sent in February 2023 to the Minister of Veterans Affairs. The Dominion President sent a follow up letter to the new Minister on 26 October 2023.

3. RCMP - VAC Clawback from Merlo Davidson Lawsuit Claimants

The Legion has not yet received a response to the May 2023 letter that the Dominion President sent to the Minister of Veterans Affairs. The Committee plans to follow-up.

4. CAF Sexual Misconduct and Cultural Change

While the CAF is making significant progress to implement the recommendations of Independent External Comprehensive Report (IECR) by the Honourable Louise Arbour there are concerns:

- On October 24, 2022, the Government announced the appointment of Madame Jocelyne Therrien as the External Monitor to oversee the DND/CAF efforts to address sexual misconduct and harassment in the CAF and monitor the implementation of the 48 recommendations of the IECR. While the appointment is initially for one year, the Committee is optimistic that the Government will do the right thing and extend the appointment.
- The external review of the two military colleges, as required by recommendations 28 and 29 in the IECR has not yet been launched. The May progress report by the independent monitor, Jocelyn Therrien, stated that the panel would be operational by June 2023. There is no indication of a reason for the delay in launching the review.

The next progress report of the independent external monitor is due October/November.

5. CAF Housing Differential Benefit

In July the CAF announced a phased approach to implement the CAF Housing Differential Benefit, the new housing benefit for CAF members. With the introduction of the new housing benefit, approximately 7,700 personnel currently in receipt of the old benefit (Post Living Differential) would be ineligible for the new benefit and thousands of others would see their monthly payments reduced. Hearing feedback from CAF members who were set to lose the payments, the CAF created a new program, to gradually phase out its old housing benefit. Under this new program those who would have seen their monthly housing benefit end or decrease will receive decreasing payments until July 2026.

6. <u>Defence Policy Update</u>

The update to Strong, Secure, and Engaged, the current defence policy, which was announced in the 2022 Budget, has still not been promulgated. The Committee has concerns that the delay will impact personnel readiness, equipment and procurement as well as the need for the overall modernization of the CAF.

7. Budget Cuts

The Committee is monitoring the Government's proposed spending cuts to find \$15B in savings over the next three years and the impact on the CAF and the RCMP. The proposed spending cuts will have an impact on personnel, equipment and operations for both the CAF and the RCMP which are already stretched and over committed.

8. <u>Domestic Operations and Call for a Dedicated Response Capability</u>

The Committee is monitoring the unprecedented number of climate emergencies and other domestic operations as the support provided by the CAF and the RCMP is not sustainable. There have been calls for the creation of a dedicated emergency response force. The Minister of Emergency Preparedness stated in September that they are looking at options. While the wildfire season is coming to an end the Government should have at least an interim coordinated national response capability for summer 2024.

COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

9. Meetings and Engagement

- a. The National Executive Director (NED), Director Communications, Director Poppy and Remembrance, Veterans Services staff and Defence and Security Committee Chair hosted a meeting with the Canadian Forces Morale and Welfare (CFMWS) CEO Ian Poulter on 27 June 2023 to discuss how The Legion and CFMWS can enhance engagement and partnership opportunities. The NED provided an overview of the Legion and current engagement with the CAF. Marketing, sponsorship and communication initiatives were discussed. Opportunities for Legion directed support/gifts for troops deployed as part of the Latvian Battle Group similar to the gifts provided to deployed troops during the Afghanistan mission were discussed and CFMWS will follow-up on possible options.
- b. A meeting with the Minister of National Defence COS Taras Zalusky and the NED, Director of Communications, Director Veterans Services and the Defence and Security Committee Chair was held on 29 June 2023. The very candid and

open discussion focused on The Legion's three key Defence and Security advocacy priorities:

- CAF cultural change and recruiting and retention challenges (CAF Housing and new housing benefit)
- The Defence Policy Update
- Operational capabilities and modernization of the CAF. A future meeting between the Minister of National Defence and the President of the Royal Canadian Legion is being planned.
- c. The Committee Chair and Coordinator attended the annual VIMY Gala on 8 November.
- d. A meeting with the RCMP Commissioner Micheál Duheme and Chief Human Resource Officer Nadine Huggins is being planned for November.

INTRODUCTION

2023 will be a better-than-expected year for Canvet, with a modest surplus forecasted. The publishing industry has weathered the current economic climate and Canvet is well positioned for the future.

SUBSIDY REVENUE

Once again, Canvet received the Canada Periodical Fund (CPF) subsidy in 2023. The funding was awarded for *Legion Magazine* and *Canada's Ultimate Story (CUS)*.

In 2022, Canvet received \$1,020,896. This year, the CPF awarded a combined cheque for \$940,961, eight per cent (\$79,935) lower than last year. The reason for this decrease in funding is due to the CPF phasing in a new formula to calculate the maximum amount of subsidy for Canadian publications. In the past, the formula was based on the publication's Canadian circulation, but it is now based on Canadian content. This new formula is being phased in over a four-year period. Twenty-five per cent of the new formula was applied in 2021, 50 per cent in 2022, 75 per cent in 2023 and 100 per cent in 2024. Canvet's publications consist of 100 per cent Canadian content, so with this new formula, Canvet will receive another slight decrease in 2024 but then should stabilize at the maximum subsidy. This bodes well for the future of Canvet's subsidy under the new formula.

The subsidy comes with clear rules for inclusion and the Department of Canadian

Heritage must continue to be confident that *Legion Magazine* and *CUS* are independent publications and that Canvet is an independent publisher. Any periodicals "that primarily reports on the activities or promotes the interests of the organization" will be excluded from receiving funding.

Canvet's budgets are dependent on support from the federal government. The government year is from April 1 to March 31, while Canvet's is the calendar year, so the amounts in the operating budget reflect that variation.

In 2012, Canvet made the commitment to convention to keep the subscription price for Legion Magazine at \$9.49 for eight years. Canvet not only realized that commitment, but exceeded it by an additional four years. At the next convention in August 2024, Canvet will need a subscription fee increase which will take effect in 2025.

EDITORIAL

In 2023, Canvet published six issues of *Legion Magazine*, four issues of *CUS*, six French inserts and a French and English eBook titled *Veterans Benefits Guide* (56 pages) which is free to all veterans and their families.

Canvet also produces websites, eBlasts, including a weekly e-newsletter showcasing Front Lines Weekly and Military Milestones, the Military Moments video series and podcasts.

In 2024, the January/February issue will showcase coverage of Remembrance Day and articles about the 100th Anniversary of the RCAF, fighting disease in the Great War, Trail blazer Kathleen Blake (Kit) Coleman, Canada's first female war correspondent, and much more.

Again, four Special Interest Publications are scheduled: RCAF: 100th Anniversary; 1944: The prelude to victory; Battle of the Scheldt; and O Canada.

In addition to translations of articles from the English edition, each French insert includes an original article on a topic from French Canada's military history.

WWW.LEGIONMAGAZINE.COM AND SOCIAL MEDIA

In 2023, legionmagazine.com will have more than 3 million visits, and it continues to grow yearly. The site showcases our award-winning interactive websites, historic photo archives, podcasts, videos and the Last Post database with nearly 210,000 names to date. Canvet continues to produce videos in the Military Milestones series with four more published this year.

Not only do the partners offer member discounts but they also contribute significant funding to Legion programs. GENERAL

This report is provided for the information of the Dominion Executive Council. The Foundation's Board of Directors last met on 23 October 2023.

FUNDRAISING

The Legion National Foundation received donations from individuals, foundations, and corporations in the last number of months. The Digital Poppy Campaign from October 27 to November 11 is the signature event and will raise significant funds to support the work of the LNF. The appeal card included in the Legion magazine, online donations, legacy gifts, monthly donations, and gifts of securities continue to be sources of revenue.

The website for the Legion National Foundation has been refreshed to keep current and inspire donors to give to support Veterans and their families. Increasing diversity through photos was also a focus of the updated website.

DISBURSEMENTS

The Board confirmed a disbursement of \$75,000 to the Veterans Transition Network. In addition, a bursary of \$2,500 was awarded to a Cadet for their university studies.

The Legion National Foundation Board of Directors is scheduled to meet in November, 2023.

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Message from the Grand President

General The Lord Richards of Herstmonceux GCB CBE DSO DL



It has been a year of highs and lows for the League. The death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, our Patron for over 70 years, came as a great blow to all our Member Organisations across the Commonwealth.

Her Majesty's deep interest and commitment to the League began in June 1951 when she attended, as the then Princess Elizabeth, the 11th Conference Reception hosted by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother. Her Majesty was deputising for our Patron His Majesty King George VI who was unable to attend due to illness. By the 12th Conference in 1953, Her Majesty had graciously agreed to succeed King George VI as our Patron. Indeed our 12th Conference in London was less than a week after her Coronation on the 2 June 1953. The support that we have received from The Royal Family for over 100 years has been outstanding. It continues today, exemplified by His Royal Highness Prince Edward, the then Earl of Wessex, now Duke of Edinburgh, hosting our 34th Conference Reception in St James's Palace on 28 September 2022, just a few days after the period of Royal Mourning following the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. That our 11th Conference was held in St James's Palace in 1953 and 69 years later in 2022 our Centenary Royal Reception in the same Palace, is tangible evidence of this incredible link between the League and The Royal Family over the last century.

My tribute to our Patron Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on 8 September 2022 follows but amongst the sadness of Her loss came the commemoration and celebration of our 34th Centenary Conference in London on 24 September 2022. That 39 Member Organisations were represented by over 100 delegates was remarkable and I thank all those who made the trip to London to make the Conference a very special and uniquely memorable 5 days. There will be more coverage later but I, like many who were present, will not forget the incredibly moving Service of Remembrance in the Guards Chapel when wreaths were laid for all Nations of the League and for the first time. we sang God Save The King.

Of course, it is the veterans and widows who we, together, support that are and always will be the unifying focus of the League. It is right that we celebrated our 100 years of commitment to them and their service while fully recognising the amazing efforts of our Member Organisations. None of this though would be possible without our generous supporters and I finish by once again thanking the Service Charities who are also members of the Commonwealth Veterans Review Committee for their moral and financial support.





HER MAJESTY QUEEN ELIZABETH II

Between 1952 and 2022 we could not have been more fortunate that Her Majesty chose to be our Patron. For 70 years she remained committed to those Commonwealth veterans who served in the Armed Forces of the United Kingdom and to their widows. Her Majesty showed a continuous, and personal interest, in the Charity throughout, receiving regular updates on the issues affecting the veterans and widows in our care.

The League was formed in February 1921 at the Empire Conference held in Cape Town and attended by Earl Haig and General Smuts. The United Kingdom with Australia, Canada, New Zealand and South Africa are the Founder Members. The object of the League is to ensure that no man or woman who served the Crown should be without help if in need.

Past and present members of our Family of Nations were all greatly honoured to have received the support, influence and companionship of Her Majesty for 70 of our 101 years of existence. There is no doubt that her engagement has contributed significantly to our longevity and tens of thousands of Commonwealth veterans and their widows have been lifted out of poverty, affording some dignity in the knowledge they have not been forgotten. She will be greatly missed by all our veterans and widows in Commonwealth countries across the world.

The Deputy Grand President role has several responsibilities, but one is always a pleasure; saying thank you. So can I start by first saying thank you to you all for your unwavering efforts and dedication to supporting our veterans and their widows in their hour of need. It has been another terrific effort this year. My next thank you is to our Grand President, General the Lord Richards of Herstmonceux GCB CBE DSO DL, for his Message opening this year's Annual Report. It reminds us of the huge commitment and sad loss of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and just how grateful we are to our Grand President and Lady Richards for their own personal and genuine commitment to the League.

Our Centenary Conference in September 2022 was held in Canada House in the heart of London's Trafalgar Square. Another thank you must go to His Excellency Mr Ralph Goodale, the Canadian High Commissioner for the United Kingdom and Ireland, for allowing us to meet in this magnificent setting and for the support of his incredible team. His Excellency was also able to join us at the poignant Remembrance Service in the Guards Chapel at the beginning of Conference, where watching the laying of wreaths by all our members organisations left me with a tear in my eye and a visible understanding of just how global our effort is. Canada House is our home in London, and it did not disappoint. I should also mention our Conference accommodation venue, the Army and Navy Club, which allowed us to enjoy their wonderful history and atmosphere during the 5 days of Conference.

We had some very important business to attend to and were delighted that Sir Malcolm Rifkind KCMG KC, a Friend of the League and Chair of the Commonwealth Veterans Review Committee, was able to join as our first Guest Speaker. We were also incredibly fortunate that our subsequent

guest speakers, both role models, could find the time to address Conference. Colour Sergeant, now Warrant Officer Class II, Johnson Beharry VC COG and Lieutenant General James Bashall CB CBE, National President of the Royal British Legion, both delivered memorable addresses to Conference.

Much was discussed and debated during the Regional Discussion Groups and the plenary session in Canada House. The widow's eligibility criteria was amended, and Conference passed two key Resolutions concerning the future of the League. After more than 100 years of service we must be ready for, and manage effectively, the next 5 years or so. Naturally, if very sadly, our beneficiaries will fade away and the time will come when we cease to be a going concern as a Charity. The timing of such a cessation is largely dependent on two conditions; first, the decline of beneficiaries and the second, our financial position. On the former we hope this 'decline' will be slow as our veterans and widows live for longer. On the latter, we await news of our application to the Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office for an extension to the Commonwealth Veterans Programme for a further 3 years out to April 2027. Our future will largely hinge on this extension

Rest assured, the Senior Management Team, Executive Committee, the core League staff and I, are fully engaged with our future as a going concern. My final thank you for this year goes to them for their incredible commitment and wise counsel. Next year will be crucial and I look forward, with confidence, to reporting that the Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office have continued their generous support to our veterans and widows and that we have mapped out a way ahead for the next 5 years.

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Report of the Secretary General Lieutenant Colonel Christopher Warren



ast year I reported that 'in April 2023 we enter the final year of the Commonwealth Veterans

Programme, and we shall be applying for an extension in order to ensure the 2,500 or so veterans and widows who are forecast to be with us remain supported for as long as is necessary.'

I can report that the Deputy Grand President submitted the application on 28 April 2023 and, following a review of the actuarial forecast based on live data, requested support for 3,355 veterans and widows. This Annual Report explains the success of the 4th year of the Programme which has allowed us to reach more eligible beneficiaries than expected. This is terrific news and testimony to the hard work of our Member Organisations.

Significant investment by the Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) has delivered improved resilience and governance. Much of what we do though is still delivered by volunteers, whether our Board of Trustees and Commonwealth Council Members in UK or those overseas who commit so much time and energy to helping others. So, the stage is set for an encore: another 3 years of funding by FCDO to ensure we continue with the same level of grant award as we have since 2019. If there is no extension, this would be detrimentally life changing for thousands who served The Crown and their widows. It could also undermine the great gains made in resilience and governance across the Commonwealth and wider.

We remain hugely positive about the outcome because FCDO and their team supporting this Programme could not have been more supportive. I recognise and thank, on behalf of over 7,000 beneficiaries who have been kept alive during the first 4 years, the Government of the United Kingdom for their life saving contribution to those from across the Commonwealth who served The Crown in its hour of need.

The State Funeral for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II took place at Westminster Abbey on Monday 19th September 2022 at 1100hrs. The

League had been fortunate to enjoy the Patronage of Her Majesty for over 70 years and was honoured to be invited to parade our Standard at the Cenotaph, on the route of the Funeral Procession. Colonel Pasan Kularatne, our Standard Bearer, joined a handful of Royal British Legion and other National Standards, for a week of rehearsals prior to the State Funeral. The World watched as Her Majesty's coffin processed to Westminster Abbey and then on to St Georges Chapel at Windsor Castle and our Standard was dipped as Her coffin passed a few feet away. Inside the Abbey our Grand President, General the Lord Richards of Herstmonceux GCB CBE DSO DL, as a former Head of the British Armed

Forces and Chief of Defence Staff, was in the front row of the Congregation to say farewell to our much-loved Queen.

We are honoured and proud that the Standard of the Royal Commonwealth Ex-Services League was on Parade to recognise and pay tribute to the incredible support Her Majesty gave to Commonwealth pre-independence veterans and their widows who served in the British Armed Forces.

Report of the Honorary Treasurer Mr Jeremy Archer



his report covers the 12-month accounting period to March 2023, the penultimate year of the Accountable Grant Arrangement (AGA) into which we entered, in partnership with the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) formerly the Department for International Development (DFID), four years ago.

During the last two years, changes in working practices – driven by the Covid-19 pandemic to a hybrid model – are now well established across the League. All key management meetings in the UK, including the Commonwealth Conference, were held in person. In addition, the HQ Staff have conducted a larger than normal number of Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) visits to our Member Organisations, both to clear a pandemic-related backlog and also to satisfy the contractual requirements of the AGA.

The League's income improved year-on-year, with donations higher than expected, driven by the return of accumulated welfare grants from India – which could not be spent due to FCRA regulations – and also by generous grants from The Dulverton Trust and the M St J Way Charitable Trust. FCDO provided £646,000 of additional funding to cover the final 18 months of the Commonwealth Veterans' Programme (CVP), which enabled the League to maintain individual grants at the same level, despite higher-than-forecast beneficiary numbers. A cumulative number of 7,285 veterans and widows have been supported by the CVP over the last four years.

After a significant spend deficit in the first two years of the CVP – borne by the League from its own reserves – a key target this year was to continue to offset the CVP matchfunded overspend for a second year. This was successfully achieved, as FCDO funded a larger proportion of welfare grants, reflecting earlier underspends, together with a proportion of the additional funding which enabled individual grant levels to be maintained. This adjustment has brought match-funded expenditure across the first four years of the programme back into line with budget. The overspend on grants was driven entirely by an increase in the number of beneficiaries, a significant proportion of whom were widows from countries which had not previously supported them. Ultimately, the League has been able to support more beneficiaries than initially forecast with the promised two nutritious meals a day. Other cost lines were tightly controlled and delivered under budget.

I am pleased to report the following progress for 2022/2023:

- Global distribution (including Founder Members) exceeded £3.76 million.
- Total income exceeded £3.79 million.
- Under the heading of Agency Work, the League distributed £464,783.
- 544 individual welfare cases were met.

The League is most fortunate to have financially stable, steadfast and sympathetic supporters, despite the significant impact

of the pandemic across the Service Charity sector. Our two key supporters are ABF The Soldiers' Charity, which donated £200,000, and The Royal British Legion (TRBL), which donated £240,000. Furthermore, TRBL generously agreed to continue its support for Commonwealth veterans and their widows for a further two years, to the end of 2024. The League is not only extremely grateful for TRBL's financial support but also for the use of office space, with associated technological and administrative support, in Haig House. In addition, we received grants of £30,000 from The Royal Navy and Royal Marines Charity and of £20,000 from The Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund.

Agency Work comprises a significant proportion of the League's workload and this will continue, albeit at a declining rate. A decrease in the number of Agency cases from 705 in 2021/2022 to 544 in 2022/2023 was directly attributable to the increasing age and frailty of those receiving support.

A comprehensive strategy paper – exploring the longer-term future of the League beyond the CVP, which is due to finish in March 2024 – has been discussed with key stakeholders. The paper not only considered future sources of funding, including the prospects for further funding from FCDO, but also the future role of the League, as numbers of pre-independence Commonwealth veterans, their widows and contemporary veterans inevitably decline. The potential Courses of Action (COA) resulting from this paper were considered and voted on at the Commonwealth Conference in September, thus empowering the Trustees to take the appropriate action.

Following Conference, the Commonwealth Veterans Review Committee (CVRC) – chaired by Sir Malcolm Rifkind and General The Lord Richards – was updated by the Deputy Grand President. The Service Charities, the principal supporters of Commonwealth veterans and their widows overseas, will be briefed fully once the outcome of the FCDO CVP extension


is known – and agreement for the chosen COA sought.

An application for a three-year extension to the CVP from March 2024, driven by the fact that the number of beneficiaries supported by the League exceeds actuarial forecasts, has been submitted to FCDO. We estimate that some 3,355 beneficiaries would still need support for up to a further five years after the end of the CVP. Whilst the FCDO is aware of the situation, they are as yet unable to indicate whether or not further support will be forthcoming. An extension to the CVP, supported by our CVRC partners, will be our main effort during the final year of the Programme.

The outlook remains uncertain. The war in Ukraine continues; however, of greater economic significance is the dramatic global increase in the cost of living. Many of the countries we support have been significantly affected by the inflationary impact on food prices which, in turn, affects the purchasing power of our grants. Despite these ongoing challenges, the League – through its network of Member Organisations – continues to support our beneficiaries around the world, providing much needed food grants at a time when many veterans and their widows are particularly vulnerable.

Our key objective – to 'help our veterans now, in their hour of greatest need' – remains unchanged. Whilst beneficiary numbers fluctuate, the overall trend is inevitably downwards; nevertheless, a significant number will require our support through to 2024 and beyond. In all our endeavours, we continue to rely on our staunch network of supporters and benefactors.



Report by Chairman of the Standing Committee on Welfare Programmes (SCOWP) Brigadier John King MBE



uring 2022, the effects of COVID-19 had largely passed and the work of SCOWP returned to normal, delivering welfare grants to needy pre-independence veterans and their widows throughout the Commonwealth. I congratulate all Member Organisations on their quick recovery and resilience.

In April, SCOWP began the fourth year of our Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) funded Commonwealth Veterans Programme, a five-year welfare programme to deliver the highest-ever level of welfare grants to our beneficiaries. For many veterans and widows in the 25 countries within the programme the grants, equivalent to the cost of two meals a day in their country, have meant a significant improvement in their welfare, beyond RCEL's previous aim of providing one meal a day. Having avoided the worst of COVID, our needy veterans and their widows now face steep cost-of living increases, rapidly rising prices for food, cooking gas and cooking oil.

During 2022 SCOWP grants were made to 4,114 beneficiaries across 28 countries, a reduction of 10% from the 4,580 veterans and widows supported in 2021. RCEL global welfare distribution to Member Organisations exceeded £3.76M including those of other Founder Members and UK Service Charities. This sum included 544 grant payments totalling over £464,000 on behalf of some 28 UK-based charities as Agency work. Our disbursement of grants from Blind Veterans UK (BV UK) continues. Some 115 veterans were supported, similar to 2021 and this £120 annual grant is highly valued by beneficiaries. BV UK's continued support to blind and partially sighted Commonwealth veterans is gratefully acknowledged.

The Royal Canadian Legion is also gratefully acknowledged for its generosity in 2022, contributing over £92,000 of welfare support to Member Organisations in the Caribbean, directly funding 43 beneficiaries in Antigua, The Bahamas, Tobago, and Trinidad & Tobago and part-funding 29 veterans and widows in Jamaica. Our other Founder Members, The Returned & Services League of Australia, The Royal New Zealand Returned and Services Association and The South African Legion also contributed significantly to beneficiary welfare.

Although the worst of COVID-19 has passed, the threat of natural disasters is ever present for our beneficiaries, so many of whom live in poor accommodation and rely on subsistence farming. Sadly, the south Asia monsoon was the worst for a generation and flooding hit Pakistan particularly hard during June – October 2022. Whilst our Member Organisation in Pakistan, the Commonwealth Ex-Services Trust reported no beneficiary fatalities they did ask us to assist veteran's widows whose homes were washed away. I was pleased to provide modest recovery grants to these widows to buy replacement kitchen goods along with vital cooking gas, oil and food to meet their immediate needs.

As post-COVID travel restrictions were lifted the office staff were able to resume Monitoring & Evaluation visits to Member Organisations and meet our increasing aged and less mobile beneficiaries. In May 2022, our Deputy Grand President Maj Gen Mitch Mitchell visited India, accompanied by Tim Burt, Controller Welfare & Grants. This visit, to the largest of our India member organisations, the India Ex-Services League, and to the Veterans Department of the Indian Ministry of Defence, concluded with the payment by Indian states of old-age pensions to pre-independence veterans and widows.

Pasan Kularatne, RCEL Programme Manager, visited Cameroon and Eswatini, formerly Swaziland. In Cameroon, our Member Organisation, the Fraternal Union of Cameroon Ex-Servicemen of the Crown, supports 52 beneficiaries across the two Anglophone regions. Despite the tricky security situation Pasan was able to travel to Limbe in the South West and Bamenda in the North West to meet veterans and widows and make welfare grant payments.

Secretary General Chris Warren and our Honorary Legal Adviser & Council Member for Gambia, Toby Case, visited The Gambia, Sierra Leone and Uganda. They met dozens of preindependence veterans and widows but sadly just a few WWII veterans, now all in their late 90s. In all the countries our on-the-ground Honorary Advisers and supporters continue to provide oversight and confidence of grant delivery.

David Thompson, Controller Finance & Compliance visited Mauritius and Malaysia. In Mauritius, our Member Organisation, the Ex-Service Association of Mauritius looks after our veterans and widows along with a handful of BVUK beneficiaries. Whilst Malaysia has few RCEL beneficiaries it does have our highest number of Agency cases, over 90 Army, RAF and Royal Navy veteran and widow beneficiaries of our UK Service charity partners, which our Member Organisation the Malaysia Ex-British Army Association does the excellent casework and grant payment on behalf of.

Further visits were undertaken during the year to Malawi, Botswana and Zambia. A summary of all visits to meet beneficiaries can be read in later pages. Throughout 2022, RCEL's unique network of Member Organisations and partnership with UK Service charities once again delivered vital welfare benefits to their beneficiaries.

SCOWP welfare grants, maintained for a fourth year by FCDO funds, continue to deliver life-changing funds to over 4,000 needy pre-independence veterans and widows throughout the Commonwealth. I am pleased our Member Organisations remained resilient in the face of COVID, delivering RCEL welfare grants to beneficiaries affording daily food-security to those who served the Crown and now look to us for their support.

Case Studies



Cedric Chimala, aged 101, was born in Malawi. He left school at 15 and in 1937 when he was 16, the army came to his village looking for men to enlist and he enrolled.

When he returned to Malawi after the end of WW2, Mr Chimala had a breakdown and later relocated to Northern Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe) where he eventually settled in Bulawayo and found work as a gardener. His mental health improved over the years and in 1953 he married his wife Elizabeth who was working for the Red Cross, training nurses. The couple went on to have children and continue to live in Bulawayo. Mr Chimala and his wife are now both retired and she is bed ridden. Two of their great grandchildren live with them and assist with their care.

SSgt James Fallah was working as a welder and paint sprayer when he enlisted in 1958. He was born on 12 January 1923 and recently celebrated his 100th birthday. He continued to serve in the Republic of Sierra Leone Regiment until discharge in 1977. He attended a boxing course in the UK and took part in a competition in London. He fondly remembers his Company Commander, Major Buchanan, who he describes as a Scot and an excellent Commander. The monthly pension he, and others, receive from Sierra Leone is SLL 250 or the equivalent of 50p after 36 years' service in the Republic of Sierra Leone Armed Forces. He survives on the grant received from RCEL.



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Mr Gunasekara from Sri Lanka served in the Ceylon Royal Army Service Corps from April 1942 to August 1946 with overseas service in Kenya, Egypt and Libya. He recently celebrated his centenary birthday at his son's home in Kandy. Mr Gunasekara's wife died 20 years ago and he is cared for by his children.

Elizabeth Fane Mbati's husband, Febian, served as a Corporal in the Northern Rhodesia Regiment during WW2 from 7th October 1943 until 27th August 1945. They were married in 1951 and had eight children, seven of whom are still alive. After leaving the Army, Febian worked for the government as a court presiding officer. He retired in 2004 and died in 2007.

Elizabeth worked as a primary school teacher in Zambia after her last child was born, a job she loved. Now 86, she uses her RCEL grant to buy food and is very thankful for the help she receives.



FCDO (UK Aid) Commonwealth Veterans

Programme 2022/23



rom a standing start in 2019, the Royal Commonwealth Ex-Services League (RCEL) has successfully completed the fourth year of its five-year Commonwealth Veterans Programme (CVP). Majority-funded by FCDO (UK Aid), the key aim of the programme is to support Commonwealth veterans and surviving spouses of veterans who served in the British Armed Forces prior to their country gaining independence who are now living in poverty.

This cash transfer programme enables beneficiaries to afford sustained nutrition, for two meals a day, strengthening their resilience and lifting them out of absolute poverty. Such grants provide a level of dignity that otherwise they may not experience. The monetary value of an average individual welfare grant across the League has increased from £48 in 2014 (Pre LIBOR) to £219 in 2018 (with LIBOR) to an average of £665 from 2019 to date (with UK Aid) enabling RCEL to make a significant positive impact on the lives of our frail and elderly beneficiaries.

RCEL is the only NGO which globally provides Commonwealth veterans and widows with targeted cash transfer support. There is no other NGO that specifically focusses on these

beneficiaries, over 50% of whom are widows, and therefore has a unique understanding of the eligibility process, beneficiary requirements and grant delivery mechanisms.

A new policy - Sexual Exploitation, Abuse and Harassment (SEAH) was formulated and added to existing RCEL Safeguarding policies and circulated to all Member Organisations. Given a significant proportion of the welfare grants are publicly funded, an enhanced annual due diligence check of Member Organisations is carried out prior to the disbursement of funds. The quarterly reporting system is well established to reconcile funds received and disbursed, and gather additional data required to complete both our Quarterly Reports and our Annual Review submitted to FCDO as required in the Accountable Grant Arrangement. The mid-cycle Due Diligence refresh of RCEL was successfully completed in October 2022 by FCDO and the ongoing action plan agreed.

Again, the CVP received an 'A' grade for the Annual Review for the fourth consecutive year. This would not have been possible without the support and guidance from the Senior Management Team, the RCEL Board, hard work of our Member Organisations, the team effort of the HQ RCEL Staff, our Project Officers

and Honorary In-country Representatives, FCDO staff based in Whitehall and East Kilbride, the Mannion Daniels team lead by David Bailes and our auditors, Mazars.

RCEL disbursed just over £2.5M to our Member Organisations during the fourth year of the FCDO funded Programme. These welfare grants were distributed amongst 3,909 Commonwealth veterans and widows in 25 countries. India was removed from the programme in the first half of Year 4, and Botswana in the second half as beneficiaries in those countries are now in receipt of their own government pensions.

Antigua was removed from the FCDO Overseas Development Assistance recipients (ODA) list of countries at the end of 2021 and no FCDO funds were sent to Antigua this year. Antigua now receives support from the Royal Canadian Legion, and we are most grateful to them.

The table below is a summary of funds disbursed and the costs incurred. It is important to note the relatively low disbursement cost incurred which is testimony to the value for money of the Programme and a credit to the RCEL network established, developed, and maintained over the last 102 years.

One of the key challenges of the CVP budget management is the increase in the number of beneficiaries relative to the original business case. A rebudgeting exercise was completed in the second half of 2022 and we were successful in securing an additional budget of £646K over the life of the programme to support all eligible beneficiaries, resulting in no reduction in individual grant size. An Accountable Grant Amendment was formally signed between FCDO and RCEL in December 2022. As such, the FCDO budget has increased from £11.6M (£11,690.000) to £12.3M (£12,336,168).


We would like to record our sincere gratitude to John McGinn the current Programme Manager and Senior Reporting Officer from FCDO, to Freya Pascal, Deputy Head, Civil Society and Civic Space, also from FCDO, and all FCDO staff who are involved with the Programme. Their continued commitment to make a difference to the lives of thousands of Commonwealth veterans and widows, particularly during a challenging time for public expenditure is much appreciated by all across the Commonwealth.

The cumulative number of beneficiaries the Programme has supported over the four years is 7,285 more than the 7,000 predicted in the Business Case in 2018. Although the numbers are steadily declining, at the end of the current 5-year programme in March 2024, over 3,300 veterans and widows living in 24 countries are expected to continue to require life sustaining support. The CVP is currently supported by match funding from RCEL and the major Service Charities. However, we will not be able to continue with the same level of support to our beneficiaries without the support from FCDO, our major funding partner. An extension of

3 years, from April 2024 – March 2027 would save these veterans and widows from starvation. An application for a Programme Extension was submitted in April 2023. We hope this will be successful and our beneficiaries will have continued FCDO support. If the application is unsuccessful, the level of individual grant size will fall to pre-LIBOR level.

RCEL extends its thanks to the Commonwealth Veterans Review Committee (CVRC) partners for their

ongoing match funding support. The Committee, chaired by Rt Hon Sir Malcolm Rifkind KC and our Grand President, General the Lord Richards GCB CBE DSO DL, consists of the major supporting UK Service Charities. On behalf of the veterans and widows supported through the Commonwealth Veterans Programme, we thank The Royal British Legion, ABF The Soldiers' Charity, the Royal Navy and Royal Marines Charity and the Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund.





Monitoring & Evaluation Visits

Controller Welfare & Grants BANGLADESH 24 - 25 May 2022

Tim Burt's visit to our member Organisation the Bangladesh Armed Services Board (BASB) was in accordance with RCEL policies and practices and to meet beneficiaries. However, the planned two-day visit was cut to one day (Wednesday 25th May) following a weather delay travelling from Delhi to Dhaka.

The shortened visit led to a change of programme to do what was possible for one day. Unfortunately, this meant Tim was unable to visit Comilla and meet veterans and widows gathered at the Commonwealth War Graves Commission cemetery, Maynamati. The shortened programme began with a meeting at Bangladesh MOD and concluded with meeting at BASB, both in central Dhaka.

Tim met with Mr Hasibul Alam, Permanent Secretary, Ministry of Defence under whose remit BASB falls. Also in attendance was Director General BASB, Brigadier Hasan and other BASB executives. It was a productive meeting highlighting the important role BASB plays in distributing aid to veterans and widows in Bangladesh.

Conference in 2016 and the last visit was by former Controller Finance, Nigel Dransfield. In 2021, a new Committee was formed. This visit was a routine monitoring and evaluation visit with the

objective of meeting veterans and widows.

Later that day, Tim received a briefing by Director General of BASB, who was joined by Colonel Hussain Reza and Major Moshiul Mashuk and Major Asraf Choudhury. The briefing outlined the BASB role, functions, organisation and size of membership (160,000+ veterans), RCEL beneficiaries, payment of RCEL grants since 2019 and discussion of the RCEL administration grant to BASB.

Whilst disappointing that bad weather cut the visit schedule in half, the meetings Controller Welfare & Grants had with with Mr Hasibul Alam at Bangladesh MoD and with Brigadier Hasan and staff at BASB were very worthwhile. BASB remains a valued Member Organisation providing excellent support to veterans and widows in Bangladesh.

Whilst in Botswana, Tim met with Mrs Sebipe, Deputy Commissioner, Department of Social Protection who confirmed that all elderly Botswana citizens receive a monthly pension and WWII veterans receive a monthly allowance; a total of approx. £90 per month.

This was the first visit to Cameroon by a member of the UK team since 2019, though Derrick Cobbinah, Project Officer for Africa, visited in 2021. As one of the most challenging countries of the Commonwealth Veterans Programme because of the prevailing security situation in the country, a Monitoring & Evaluation visit was important.

The Fraternal Union of Cameroon Ex-Servicemen of the Crown (FUCEMOC) is the RCEL Member Organisation and at the time of the visit, there were 52 surviving beneficiaries: 31 veterans and 21

Pasan spent time in Limbe in Southwest Cameroon with Sophie Scott, FUCEMOC Treasurer and Chief Warrant Officer Nyenti Egbe John, Vice President of FUCEMOC, looking at the records they hold in the office. Pasan was able to meet with five widows at a lunch arranged by Sophie and hand deliver their SCOWP welfare grants, and visited two widows at their homes. He also visited the Commonwealth War Cemetery in Limbe Botanic Garden where the annual Remembrance service takes place.

Pasan also visited Bamenda in Northwest Cameroon but was advised not to stay overnight due to security concerns. Whilst in Bamenda,

Pasan and Sophie were joined by Captain Sylvester Ade, President of FUCEMOC. They met several widows including Cameroon's oldest surviving veteran, Sergeant Lawan John who is 108. Sergeant John was recruited in Enuga

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Nigeria in March 1942 to Unit 2442 APC North Africa. He was discharged in July 1946. He served in Enugu, Jerusalem, Burma and Bamenda. He lives in Bamenda with his second wife and has 6 children.

Whilst in Cameroon, Pasan was able to meet with the Deputy High Commissioner, Nigel Holmes and inform him about the work of RCEL and the Commonwealth Veterans Programme.

Sophie, Egbe and Sylvester are doing a great job in Cameroon, despite the challenging security situation. Grants are disbursed in a timely manner and the welfare of veterans and widows is always forefront in their minds.

Julius was keen to talk about his early life, joining the Kings African Rifles in the then Bechuanaland Protectorate, his post war teaching career, retirement in 1990 and meeting Princess

Secretary General **CANADA**24 – 27 November 2022

Following the Commonwealth Veterans Review Committee (CVRC) Meeting in October 2022 the Royal Canadian Legion (RCL) invited Chris Warren, Secretary General to Canada to update RCL on planning options for the future of the League over the next five years and attend the annual RCL SCOWP Committee meeting. RCL support to the Caribbean is crucial and a key objective of the visit was to discuss this support on an ongoing basis.

The RCL agreed to continue supporting Antigua, Bahamas and Trinidad & Tobago and assist with part funding in Jamaica. The RCL Committee agreed,

in principle, to continue support for a 3-year programme until March 27.

In addition, at the Centenary Conference in London in September 2022, the RCL offered to host the 35th Conference. Chris was able to discuss this further with the Executive who had undertaken a degree of planning and based on advice during this visit, would submit a more formal proposal in 2023. The proposal is to hold Conference in 2025 in Ottawa between 29th June and 2nd July 2025.

This was a timely and useful visit. The RCL are fundamentally important to RCEL for their outstanding moral and financial support to Commonwealth veterans and widows throughout the Caribbean. The RCL continue to support RCEL and we remain indebted to them.

ESWATINI28 Nov – 01 Dec 2022

Eswatini was last visited by the Secretary General in 2016, so this was a timely visit. The Member Organisation, Umsizi, the Ex-servicemen's Welfare Association is Chaired by Gaz Barlow who spent 12 years in the British Army (Royal Signals) before moving to Eswatini 22 years ago. Gaz is supported by his wife Iris, who acts as Treasurer.

There are no surviving veterans in Eswatini and 25 widows at the time of the visit. Pasan visited five widows in their own homes all living in rural areas. Tryphinah Sulo Khumalo, 80, is the widow of Pte Moses Mnushile Khumalo. Pte Moses served in the Royal Army Unit 97 from 1942 to 1945 where he

served in Tripoli, Libya and Italy. After WW2 service, he served in the United States Defence Force and died in 2002. They had seven children. Mrs Khumalo expressed her gratitude for the grants she receives.

Whilst in Eswatini, Pasan met with the British High Commissioner, Simon Boyden who was very interested to hear about RCEL and the Commonwealth Veterans Programme and expressed his willingness to assist Umsizi and RCEL if a need arises.

Umsizi is well run and well managed by Gaz and Iris Barlow and excellent paperwork is maintained. Both spend considerable personal time and money supporting RCEL beneficiaries.

Secretary General & Honorary Legal Adviser GAMBIA 21 - 26 January 2023

Chris Warren was accompanied by Toby Case, RCEL's Commonwealth Council Member for The Gambia, a member of the Senior Management Team and the Honorary Legal Advisor. Both were escorted on visits by Pa Faal and Gibril Jaw representing the Gambia Legion and by Peter Twitchett, who assists and advises the Legion. The security situation has much improved since the last visit in 2017.

Noeline Ambrose, our Gambia Project Officer, has responsibility for all aspects of welfare support and administration and all records and accounts are accurate and well maintained. Further, she and Pa Faal successfully persuaded the Gambian Armed Forces (GAF) to provide a vehicle and driver to assist with the payment of welfare grants.

Whilst in Gambia, Chris and Toby met with the Deputy High Commissioner, Martin Norman and thanked him for his support to veterans and widows during Remembrance and discussed the political situation. They also met with Major General Mamat Oacham, Deputy Chief of Defence Staff and thanked him for the support of the Gambian Armed Forces and the provision of a vehicle and driver during welfare payment visits.

During a visit to Banjul, Chris and Toby met two widows and one veteran in their homes. Bully Sanneh, 95 is cared for by his wife and daughter. He joined the 1st Gambia Regiment in 1944 with the Royal West African Frontier Force and served until 1958. He completed his service as a Sergeant and remembers the atomic bomb being dropped on Hiroshima. He is very grateful for the RCEL welfare grant which is used to buy food.

The last remaining Gambia Legion branch situated in Bakau held its AGM during the visit. This was attended by 35 members, including many veterans and widows. This provided a further opportunity for Chris and Toby to meet with beneficiaries during the

lunch that followed. They included WW2 veteran, LCpl Landing Jetta who finished his service with The Gambia Regiment in 1957.

This was a busy and productive visit, greatly enhanced by having Toby Case present in his capacity as Council Member and Honorary Legal Adviser. Toby was able to speak with and capture the details of many veterans and widows. In addition, he assisted with the review and auditing of Noeline's records and accounts.

GHANANovember 2022

For the third year, in November 2022, Project Officer, West Africa, Derrick Cobbinah undertook a round of visits to beneficiaries in Ghana. In addition to proof of life and welfare checks, Derrick distributed food boxes. As with previous years, the food boxes were funded by donations received by Warrant Officer Joseph Hammond's



sponsored walk and were gratefully received by all beneficiaries.

INDIA17 – 23 May 2022

In 2019, India had the largest number of RCEL supported beneficiaries, over 1,400 veterans and widows. Sadly, as the provisions of the Government of India introduced Foreign Contributions Regulation Act 2010 (FCRA) have taken effect, our five member organisations in India have been unable to receive RCEL welfare funds for distribution to our beneficiaries. FCRA regulates and controls the receipt by charities in India of funds from overseas. Each charity must apply for FCRA accreditation and once approved open an FCRA accredited account with the State Bank of India. With FCRA accreditation or exemption the charity can receive funds to be disbursed in line with their accredited purposes. **RCEL last sent funds to our Member Organisation** the Indian Ex-Services League (IESL) Delhi in April 2019. There are complex reasons why all our India Member Organisations have been unable to secure FCRA accreditation (or exemption) where other charities in India who receive funds from overseas have been able to.

and Tim first met with IESL Delhi
President, Brigadier Katar Singh,

Singh Yadev and other executives.
Sadly, it became clear despite letters

of support from RCEL, India CDS and others to the India Ministry of Home Affairs, IESL for one reason or other would not receive FCRA accreditation or exemption.

The meeting at the India Ministry of Defence in New Delhi was to resolve the FCRA issue by the signing of a prepared Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) by Mitch Mitchell for RCEL and the Indian MOD so RCEL could recommence payment and distribution of welfare funds via the Indian MOD's veterans' agency, the Kendriya Sainik Board (KSB). Sadly, at the meeting, the Minister (Secretary) of the Ex-Servicemen's Welfare Department (ESW) and Secretary of KSB were unable to sign the MoU and no grant payments would be made via the KSB. However, the Minister outlined how all Indian old age pensioners now received (from their home State Government) an annual pension of between INR72,000 - INR120,000 (some £720 - £1,200pa). The RCEL annual welfare grant to India beneficiaries is £561. If RCEL grants were to resume, the state pension would be withdrawn.

Whilst unexpected and disappointing not to sign the MoU, the good news is that RCEL beneficiaries in India now receive a state-paid old age pension and will have their needs met.

KENYA26 – 30 May 2022

The last visit to Kenya was conducted by Controller Welfare & Grants, Tim Burt, in June 2019 shortly after the start of the FCDO Programme. Kenya has the second highest number of SCOWP beneficiaries after Pakistan with 289 veterans and 234 widows.

Accompanied by Col (Ret'd) John Steed, a former DA in Kenya and now Chairman of British Legion Kenya (BLK), David travelled to Machakos to visit the Defence Forces Comrades Association (DEFOCA) County Branch. They were joined by the County Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary. In addition, Col Jonathan Makau, the Managing Director of DEFOCA and some of his HQ team travelled from Nairobi for the visit.

DEFOCA provided details of an extensive tour of the county, something not undertaken by the previous committee, resulting in several new potential beneficiaries requesting support. During his visit, Controller Finance, David Thompson, explained that globally RCEL was already supporting a higher number of beneficiaries on the programme than had been either forecast or budgeted for and that the funds available were finite. It was on this basis that we had had to take the very difficult decision to cap numbers in Kenya where numbers had already increased considerably since the start of the programme.

Whilst in Kenya, David met with ten veterans who had all served in WW2; four of the veterans were in their 90's and the remaining six were 100 or over with one aged 108. The majority were still able to communicate clearly and enjoyed telling David their

history and experience during the war. Most of the veterans served in Somalia and Abyssinia during the war, but a couple had been in Burma as part of the East African Division.

Whist in Kenya, David met with a number of the BLK Committee. He reviewed the grant payment transfer system to DEFOCA from BLK and looked at samples of the county beneficiaries lists matched to payment requests. The lists are reviewed at each Joint Committee meeting and Proof of Life checks are conducted by the county branches. The Joint Committee oversight and grant payment process are working well. BLK echoed the concerns of DEFOCA re the cap on beneficiary numbers.

David spent useful time with Brig Ronnie Westerman, Defence Advisor (DA) and Lt Col Ash Wiseman, Deputy Defence Advisor (DDA) at the British High Commission. He was able to thank them for their support of the Joint Committee in Kenya. The DA explained that the team was under resourced and would not be able to provide any assistance with oversight of the TPDF in Tanzania.

This was a busy and productive visit. The joint Committee of DEFOCA and BLK works well, and the oversight and grant payments are efficient.

Secretary General **LESOTHO** 3 – 5 April 2022

This was the first trip to Lesotho since 2019, when the Secretary General last visited. For the last 19 years the ex-servicemen and widows have been looked after by Lt Col Jurie vd Merwe, supported by African Pioneer Corps National Secretary, Julia Puseletso Maratholi. Jurie is a previous President of the South African Legion and as a result of his dedication to the veterans and widows of Lesotho, the Basotho Legion is on a firm footing, well organised with the needs of beneficiaries well met. Since the last visit, Jurie's son-in-law, Hano Du Toit, a qualified accountant agreed to assist Jurie and the RCEL. He and Julia undertake the work required for the timely completion of the quarterly reports and returns.

On the first day, the Secretary General met with the British High Commissioner, HE Anne Macro who was very interested in RCEL's work. Later that day, Chris was met by Colonel Mohale who had arranged for him to see Pte Lekane Tabo and Sgt Rakhare, both of the African Pioneer Corps and WWII veterans. Also present was the widow of Pte Molete, Mrs Mapablw. Chris had met the veterans in 2019 and was saddened to see they had aged considerably with a marked reduction in mobility. It was a great privilege for him to see them again.

Chris also visited the African Pioneer Compound (APC) where he was able to check records and bank statements. RCEL investment in IT training for Julia and Hano's ongoing CPD has meant that resilience is far stronger than in previous years. Julia can create spreadsheets and undertake internet banking. This is vital as in January the Lesotho banking system ceased accepting cheques; all beneficiaries are now paid online.

Whilst at the APC, the British High Commissioner and the Home Affairs Minister arrived for an arranged visit. The Minister was very interested in RCEL's work, promising Government of Lesotho support to the pre-independence veterans and widows at Remembrance.

A timely visit and great reassurance that with Hano Du Toit overseeing quarterly reporting from information provided by Julia, the resilience built in will allow support to continue for the duration of the FCDO Programme.

* Lt Colonel Jurie vd Merwe is a Former President of the South African Legion. For over 20 years Jurie has been a committed and tireless supported as our Honorary Adviser to Lesotho for which he was awarded the Deputy Grand President's Certificate of Achievement. Jurie died on 25 November 2022.

Since the last visit by Nigel Dransfield, (then Controller Finance) the Kings African Veterans Trust (KAVT) has settled into a good grant distribution and reporting routine in line with RCEL reporting requirements. The focus of this visit was to ensure the more stringent verification requirements for pre-independence widows was being correctly observed.

Controller Welfare & Grants, Tim Burt's first meeting was with KAVT Honorary Advisor, Denis Lewis; this provided an opportunity for Tim to better understand the practicalities of life in Malawi for veterans and widows and the work of KAVT.

The same day, Tim met with the rest of the KAVT Committee and later visited the Memorial Homes in Zomba. Some 50 houses are located opposite Cobbe Barracks of the Malawi Defence Forces with about two dozen occupied by RCEL veterans and their widows. With the assistance of WOI (Ret'd) Chiwengo and Debora, his daughter, some 26 widows made individual Form B applications for welfare support, providing whatever identification and eligibility paperwork they could in support.

Tim also met with two veterans of 1Bn Kings African Rifles who live at the homes: former Corporal, Gideon Labani, 91, and former Private, Byson Ngkhuni, 88.

During his visit, Controller Welfare also met with KAR and Zambia Regiment WWII veteran Colour

Sergeant Maxmos Ketulo who was born in 1921. Maxmos explained, 'I am a Second World War veteran, who got wounded during combat in Burma. I was serving under 21st Brigade, 11th (East African) Division. I was shot in the mouth and the bullet came outside to the left of my neck, damaging two teeth in the process. I got

treated in India.' Former Colour Sergeant Ketulo now receives a SCOWP grant of £612 a year for which he is most grateful.

Tim had several more memorable meetings with widows during a visit to Balaka. Sadly, many were unable to provide the necessary paperwork for verification; without this their applications cannot be approved.

A productive and timely visit which provided great opportunities to meet with veterans and widows and re-enforce the good relations with KAVT.

Controller Finance & Compliance MALAYSIA 28 February – 3 March 2023

Kuala Lumpur was the venue for the successful RCEL Conference in 2016. Prior to that, the last visit was in 2014, so a visit was overdue. In addition, Malaysia was the last country in the FCDO Commonwealth Veterans Programme (CVP) which required a Monitoring and Evaluation visit as outlined in the Accountable Grant Arrangement.

There are just two surviving SCOWP beneficiaries in Malaysia, both widows. Most of the work undertaken by the Malaysia Ex-British Army Association (MEBAA) is the disbursement of Agency grants on behalf of the various UK service charities. Whilst there are beneficiaries supported both by the Royal Navy and Royal Air Force, most served in the British Army in either the Royal Signals, the Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers or what is now the Royal Logistic Corps.

The main purpose of this visit was to meet the MEBAA Committee to discuss its resilience and future plans, and to meet veterans and widows.

Accompanied by the President of MEBAA, Abdul Rahman Ahmad and Treasurer, Joe Scully, David visited two veterans and three widows. This included Sergeant Jalil, aged 80, who served in the Royal Signals Corps in Singapore between 1957 and 1969. He initially attended the Army Boys Trade School in Singapore. Sergeant Jalil subsequently served in 18 Signal Regiment, which were seconded to the Royal Air Force mainly in Singapore, but he also visited Hong Kong and Gan Island during his service. In addition, he attended his technical Class 1 Signals Course in Catterick for 6 months in 1962 – he remembers it being very cold and a considerable contrast to the weather in Singapore & Malaysia!

After his discharge, he worked for 5 years in the Oil Fields in Brunei and subsequently worked for Ericsson Communications for many years until his retirement. He has been married twice and had 6 children.

David later attend a MEBAA Management Committee meeting in which they conducted their standard business including a review of both income & expenditure, MEBAA membership numbers and beneficiaries including caseload by Service Charity, application renewals and pending approvals.

MEBAA is a very well-run Member Organisation; excellent individual records are kept of each beneficiary which include their records of service, grant applications, payment dates of grants together with amounts and any verification details. Currently MEBAA has a finite life span of around 2 years unless volunteers can be found to replace the existing committee. Discussions with the UK Service Charities will need to be arranged to agree plans to support beneficiaries if MEBAA ceases to exist.

Controller Finance & Compliance MAURITIUS 22 - 27 February 2023

As directed by the Mauritius Government, the dissolution of the Mauritius Ex-Services Trust Fund took place on 27th December 2021 and all responsibility for RCEL's beneficiaries was transferred to the Ex-Services Association of Mauritius (ESAM). Due Diligence was completed on ESAM as the new Member Organisation in early 2022. With the new organisation in place, this was an important visit to review how ESAM was operating.

Further, this visit provided an opportunity to meet veterans & widows in receipt of SCOWP & Blind Veterans UK grants, to visit beneficiaries on Rodrigues Island, which had not been previously visited by RCEL and to see the impact of the Libor grant on the completed museum in Mauritius.

ESAM is a private association which has been in existence for 75 years. It is managed by a committee composed of 13 veterans with the

assistance of Mr Naden Armoogum, RCEL's main point of contact, who was appointed as the Manager of the organisation.

Controller Finance, David Thompson, and Naden met with the Acting British High Commissioner, Mrs Sally Harrison and briefed her on the Commonwealth Veterans Programme. The next day, David visited Rodrigues Island, a small volcanic island in the Indian Ocean, east of Mauritius.

On Rodrigues Island, there are four widows in receipt of SCOWP grants and two veterans who receive Blind Veterans UK grants. David met with all six beneficiaries who live in a variety of conditions, ranging from a tin and wood-built shack to more modern concrete structures. The beneficiaries included André Casimir. Mr Casimir served for two tours in the Royal Pioneer Corps from 1946 to 1949 and subsequently 1949 to 1952. He served in Cyprus, Egypt, Benghazi (Libya) and Palestine. He is 102 years old and can't remember much about his service other than the countries he visited, and his Army Number. When he returned to Rodrigues he was employed as a labourer mainly working in agriculture. His wife died some time ago, but they were married for over 50 years and had 17 children of which only 3 are still alive.

On his final day in Mauritius, David visited the museum, which pays tribute to the 3,000 and 35,000 Mauritians who served during WW1 and WW2 respectively, in the British Army. The exhibits are excellent and very informative. RCEL's Libor contribution is displayed prominently on the list of donors in the gallery. These funds have been spent productively and a fitting tribute has been created.

The trip concluded with a meeting with Mr R Sonea, one of the Permanent Secretary's in the Prime Minister's Office who is responsible for Veterans affairs in Mauritius. David was able to thank Mr Sonea for the support provided by the government to all our RCEL beneficiaries, the government funding provided for the museum and the leading role in Remembrance each year.

A timely and productive visit; ESAM is a well-run Member Organisation with good governance and excellent records.

Secretary General & Honorary Legal Adviser SIERRA LEONE 26 - 31 January 2023

The last visit to Sierra Leone was in March 2020 when David Thompson, Controller Finance and Compliance was accompanied by our West Africa Project Officer, Derrick Cobbinah. Sierra Leone is a high maintenance country, requiring greater oversight and visits than many other countries. This is due to the security situation, changing personalities and a very complex political situation following the 10-year civil war.

At the time of this visit, there were 147 surviving beneficiaries - 55 veterans and 92 widows. Secretary General, Chris Warren and Hon Legal Adviser, Toby Case were accompanied in Freetown by the Secretary General of Sierra Leone Ex-Serviceman's Association (SLESA), Lt Col Fatorma Gottor and Sam Sahr, a former British NCO and our Honorary Adviser for Sierra Leone.

Chris and Toby spent considerable time with SLESA officers and staff in their office in Cockerill Barracks auditing paperwork, checking bank statements, and checking veteran and widow eligibility by dip testing a number on the lists of those supported. This proved to be a lengthy process as the filing system has room for improvement, something discussed and encouraged. On several occasions during time spent with SLESA, many widows arrived seeking a grant who sadly did not meet the eligibility criteria.

Whilst in Sierra Leone, Chris, Toby, Sam and Fatorma met the British High Commissioner, Her Excellency Lisa Chesney. The Secretary General was able to brief her on the RCEL global, FCDO and SLESA situation.

The High Commissioner highlighted the poverty in Sierra Leone and that the country was the 6th poorest in the world. With national elections on the horizon, she voiced her concern about civil unrest.

During a visit to Waterloo, Chris and Toby were greeted with a local song and introduced to many veterans and widows. These included Joseph Arunu who lost a finger when a mortar fuse detonated in his hand and Capt. Foday Kamara who was recruited in 1961 and joined 1st Bn Royal Sierra Leone Regiment. He is the Tribal Chief of the western area and Waterloo. He attended the Mortar Course at the Support Weapons Wing; Warminster and his happiest memory is of Calor gas heaters in his billet at Netheravon during his course. He remembers the instructor as Captain 'Terror' but is unable to recall his name.

Sierra Leone remains problematic, principally due to the political situation creating tension between SLESA and the MoD. However, SLESA continues to run well with Lt Col Fatorma Gottor at the helm.

The support of Sam Sahr is invaluable. RCEL is grateful to SLESA for continuing to ensure that veterans and widows in Sierra Leone receive our support.

Secretary General SOUTH AFRICA 1 - 3 April 2022

At the time of the Secretary General's visit, RCEL was providing support to 18 SCOWP beneficiaries and 57 Agency cases (on behalf of UK Service charities). The South African Legion National Headquarters conducts casework and ongoing reporting for compliance of the FCDO Commonwealth Veterans Programme, and we are grateful to them for this valuable support.

Whilst in South Africa, Secretary General Chris Warren had a productive meeting with the British

Defence Adviser, Colonel Stan Harris. They were joined via Teams by the National President, Lgr Brian Smith and the National Secretary, Lgr Riana Venter van Zyl where Chris was able to brief the DA on the role of RCEL globally and with the SA Legion. The DA agreed to assist with Poppy distribution from the UK to the SA Legion.

The Secretary General later met with the National Executive Committee and separately, the National Office Bearers (NOB) for useful meetings. This was a timely visit to the South African Legion. The National President and National Secretary are committed to providing support to RCEL SCOWP and Agency beneficiaries and this remains their focus.

TANZANIA24 - 26 May 2022

The last visit to Tanzania was by former Controller Finance, Nigel Dransfield in November 2018, just prior to the start of the Commonwealth Veterans Programme. Unfortunately, in early 2019, while compiling the due diligence required for the FCDO Programme, it became apparent that the Tanzania People's Defence Force's (TPDF) were not able to provide the necessary documents and assurance needed to satisfy the increased requirements. Therefore, no funds have been sent to Tanzania since 2019. A planned visit by the Secretary General in March 2020 to try and resolve the issues was postponed due to the Covid pandemic.

This visit by David Thompson, Controller Finance, aimed to explore the suitability of the TPDF to restart grant payments to beneficiaries with an increased level of oversight and to meet representatives from the Tanzania Legion & Clubs (TLC) to ascertain their suitability to make payments either in tandem with, or instead of TPDF should the latter be unable to meet the necessary criteria. The goal was to resume payments to the estimated 128 veterans and widows in Tanzania.

David met with the TPDF Chief of Reserve Forces, Brig Kadawi. He appeared in principle keen to assist with the disbursement of grants but was keen to gain official approval at Ministerial level before

moving forward with the more detailed discussion/ negotiation.

Whilst in Tanzania, David met with the British High Commissioner, David Concar, for a short but focused meeting. He was keen to help RCEL move forward and confirmed that he would push a formal bid for support from the TPDF through the right diplomatic channels to get to the Minister of Defence.

A meeting with the TLC revealed they would not be able to comply with the due diligence requirements and therefore would not be able to disburse grants to beneficiaries.

Despite this visit and subsequent exploratory discussions with various parties, it has not been possible to arrange the necessary governance and oversight of TPDF and sadly RCEL remains unable to disburse grants to Tanzania.

Secretary General & Honorary Legal Adviser UGANDA 2 - 6 February 2023

The Uganda Ex-Servicemen's Association (UESA) has one of the largest numbers of beneficiaries with 455 (365 veterans & 90 widows) at the time of this visit.

This visit began with a meeting with the DA, Lt Col Toby Barrington Barnes and the Assistant DA SSgt Raj Chandrock in the British High Commission attended by Secretary General, Chris Warren, Honorary Legal Adviser, Toby Case, David Robers Senoga (Secretary General UESA) and Herbert Kamyuka, the Treasurer of UESA. The DA had agreed to facilitate the Remembrance and wreath

laying service at Jinja the next day. This event took place in Jinja, some 2 hours out of Kampala at the Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery. Several veterans and widows attended the moving service and the lunch that followed, and Chris and Toby were able to spend time meeting many of them. Lunch was greatly appreciated by the veterans and widows, and it was very good to witness them interacting with each other and enjoying the occasion.

Whilst in Kampala, Chris and Tony met the Chairman, Secretary General, Assistant Secretary General and the Treasurer at the UESA offices in Kampala.

This Committee currently meets twice a month and provided a full update on UESA, methods of payments to veterans and widows and funding UESA to effectively deliver the grants whilst meeting the demanding reporting requirements.

Chris and Toby were able to undertake a short audit. They concluded that the accounts were well maintained and that financial returns to RCEL

during the quarterly reporting process was effective. Following this, they met WWII veteran E68142 Cpl Wiza Keberro who is 102. He was recruited in Uganda in1943 and discharged in Nanyuki, Kenya following service with No 5 Company the East African Engineers. He was discharged in Kenya because his role had been guarding Italian POWs held in the Nanyuki area.

Later in the visit, Chris and Toby attended as observers a meeting of The Joint Veterans Committee (Uganda) which took place in the Department of Veterans Affairs in the MoD. During the meeting, Toby was again able to explain the importance of the Widows Policy and UESA and the Uganda MoD agreed that the eligibility criteria were clear, and they

would continue to use this for assessing new widow applications, of which there are many.

The trip concluded with visits to more veterans and widows in remote areas, requiring long drives; very few live in Kampala as it is too expensive. All expressed their gratitude for the support they are given.

This was a successful visit. Relationships with the British High Commission and the Uganda Department of Veterans Affairs have strengthened. It is clear the veterans and widows are well cared for and receive their grant in a timely manner. It is likely numbers will increase soon as pending widow applications are reviewed.

Finance & Welfare Officer **ZAMBIA**19 - 21 October 2022

Zambia was last visited by the Secretary General in 2016, so this was a timely visit. Camilla John, RCEL Finance & Welfare Officer was fortunately able to visit Zambia in October 2022 on the way back from a trip to neighbouring Zimbabwe.

At the time of the visit, there were two surviving veterans and 36 widows. Captain Geoff Thomas, Chair of the Zambia Poppy Committee is RCEL's main point of contact. Despite working full time, Geoff undertakes this role in a voluntary capacity with exceptional care and enthusiasm. He works alongside The Ex-Serviceman's League of Zambia (EXSELZA), liaising with the surviving veterans and widows, ensuring they receive their grants and completes all reports and paperwork for RCEL.

During her visit, Camilla spent time with Captain Thomas looking at paperwork, finances and running verification checks. She later spent an afternoon at the Burma Memorial Hall where she met with ten widows for an enjoyable lunch. She was joined by Brigadier General Joyce Puta, Chair of the NEC and Colonel Mwamba, Zambia Director of Veterans.

Camilla had the opportunity to meet ten widows individually; they were happy to share their stories and some were able to recall details of their husbands' service. All emphasised their gratitude for the grants received. (For the individual story of Elizabeth Fane Mbati see Case Study on page 17).

This was a short but very productive visit. Captain Geoff Thomas is fully committed to the cause and doing an excellent job of supporting the remaining veterans and widows in Zambia.

RCEL Centenary Conference

The RCEL Centenary conference took place in London between 24-28 September. Attended by over 100 people, the conference was the first full overseas meeting since Malaysia in 2016. Delegates from 39 Member Organisations were represented at this important conference. The welcoming address by the Grand President set the scene for what would be a hugely successful and memorable conference:

"We are here to celebrate and commemorate 101 years of a quite remarkable history. Very few military charities survive this long, and the bedrock has been you, our Member Organisations. Most of you represent organisations that did not exist in 1921 but Founder Members with us today from Australia, Canada, England, Wales and Northern Ireland, New Zealand, Scotland and South Africa have been unflinching in their support for this great cause. I pay tribute to you, however long you have been a member of the League and on behalf of the veterans and widows you quietly support every day I thank you most sincerely. For those who have travelled thousands of miles to represent your country a very warm welcome on behalf of Conference and indeed the City of London. I do hope you and your wives, husbands and partners are able to enjoy excitement and buzz of the greatest multi-cultural and diverse city in the world."

A key focus of the Conference was the Commonwealth Veterans Programme which began in April 2019 following the award of £12.3M of UK aid funding over a five-year period from FCDO (Foreign Commonwealth & Development Office). The objective of the Programme is to provide sustained nutrition of two meals per day, strengthening resilience and lifting Commonwealth veterans and widows out of absolute poverty.

Resolutions concerning the future of The League were discussed and voted. Importantly, there were wide ranging and open discussions about widows' eligibility criteria. All agreed the criteria were sensible and crucial to the effective and appropriate delivery of welfare grants.

In addition, the following two resolutions were supported by Conference.

- ◆ That a formal application to the UK Government Foreign Commonwealth and Development Office, for an extension to the Commonwealth Veterans Programme for up to 5 years from 1 April 2024, be submitted on behalf of all Member Organisations.
- That work in parallel be undertaken by RCEL to secure support for eligible beneficiaries in the event of no Programme extension by the UK Government, with a view to a possible merger with the Royal British Legion or the ABF The Soldiers' Charity.

In addition to two busy days of productive Conference business, delegates and guests enjoyed a moving Remembrance service at the Guards Chapel with wreath laying. The traditional group photograph was taken outside the Chapel on a sunny autumnal day. A cultural day with a river cruise and lunch on the Thames was very much enjoyed. Conference concluded with a reception in the splendid surroundings of St James's Palace hosted by HRH Prince Edward.

2022 was another busy year and RSL Australia remains committed to delivering a diverse range of programs and initiatives which enable the RSL to better serve our current membership and the next generation of veterans and their families.

Throughout this year, we have been deeply involved with the Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide - attending hearings around the country and making extensive, detailed submissions and comments on behalf of the veteran community. We will continue to take a prominent position and implement projects to address some of the known issues as the Royal Commission continues into 2023.

Acknowledging the important role of Ex-service Organisations (ESOs) in the ongoing care of our veteran community, this year the RSL facilitated an inaugural National ESO Forum aimed at driving better coordination within the ESOs sector. The group established collective agreement on some key issues. A report and action plan has been published.

The RSL is consistently advocating for veterans. Our website demonstrates the extent of commentary on current issues as diverse as early calls for government assistance for Afghanistan interpreters, to demand-driven funding, mental health support, and proactive medical treatment for our veterans.

RSL Australia welcomed the release, in June, of the 2021 Census data which provided new insights into the nation's veteran population and revealed the regions with the highest populations of current and former serving Australian Defence Force personnel. These insights about the Defence and veteran population and their needs will enable the RSL to provide targeted support resources across the country.

This year, the passing of our Patron, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, was a significant event felt by all members who particularly valued her association and patronage of the League for more than 70 years. Her Majesty's passing was a moment of great sadness, but it was also a time to reflect on her unstinting service and contribution to Australia, Great Britain, and all the nations of the Commonwealth. I was honoured to represent the RSL and our members at Her Majesty's funeral. We are now seeking the support of King Charles III to succeed his mother as the RSL's National Patron.

Along with our major observances of ANZAC and Remembrance Day the RSL supported many other anniversaries and commemorations including the 80th anniversary of the Kokoda Campaign. We continued to support our veteran community through a range of national programs and services, including the RSL Veterans' Employment Program, and RSL Active.

The primary goal of The Royal Canadian Legion's RCEL Committee continues to be the support of veterans and widows in the Caribbean countries whose organizations and governments are unable to provide full care for their needs. Legion programs are focused on the provision of individual assistance as veterans and widows in need are identified.

Our ability to meet the needs of the veterans and widows in the Caribbean region is directly attributable to the generosity of Legion branches that continue to donate to the fund on an annual basis. In 2022, our branches and members donated \$259,469.90 CAD which is commendable as typically income received on non-convention years is much lower. The income received in 2021 was \$348,289.05.

In 2022, we provided \$135,159.09 CAD in direct benevolent assistance to Commonwealth veterans and widows in the Caribbean. RCL also took on the full support to Antigua beneficiaries whereas in previous years, RCL's contribution to Antigua was 50% of the 22% RCEL responsibility. In addition, the Legion provided \$19,647.79 CAD in Poppy and Remembrance material (plus \$23,276.34 CAD shipping) to assist the various organizations in conducting their own Poppy fundraising campaigns

National President B.J Clark stood down in October

and was recognised in the New Year Honours with

Sir Wayne (Buck) Shelford KNZM, MBE was elected

Sir Wayne served in the Royal New Zealand Navy

for over a decade and is perhaps best known for

his time as Captain of the All Blacks from 1987

and to coordinate their Remembrance Day ceremonies. The requests for poppy materials for 2023 are also in line with these figures.

The Legion continued its annual grant of \$5,500 to the Curphey Home in Jamaica. Also, a one-time grant of \$7,622.52 was awarded to RCEL to assist with the purchase of IT equipment for member organizations in the Caribbean.

The Covid 19 travel restrictions lifted in early 2022 which meant site visits could be resumed. Visits to the Bahamas, Antigua, Barbados, St. Lucia, Grenada, and St. Kitts were conducted in April 2022. We continue to have regular contact and correspondence with the agencies in Tobago, and Trinidad and Tobago where a site visit is being planned for 2024. Site visits have continued in 2023 with more to come in 2024 as well. It is extremely gratifying to see the continued loyalty and dedication of these veterans to the Commonwealth and to personally experience their appreciation for our assistance.

The Royal Canadian Legion, its leadership, our branches, and members, are proud of our continuing support of the RCEL and the assistance provided to Commonwealth veterans and widows in the Caribbean.

The RNZRSA, along with the other veterans and the people of Aotearoa New Zealand celebrated the life of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. The Queen had a significant role with the RNZRSA and had been our Patron since the year of her accession.

This year has highlighted:

- Our support network needed to be reinforced and work with Government to financially support our efforts has resulted in a pilot project supporting veterans into employment.
- The recognition of challenges to veterans and their families wellbeing, identified in a Veteran's Affairs report, in which along with the RNZRSA a wide range of New Zealand's veteran organisations provided input. This policy level report provides a blueprint for Government agencies to better support veterans and their families.
- The need for the RNZRSA to strengthen its advocacy and activism in improving the conditions of service for those who currently serve within the New Zealand Defence Force, and to improve eligibility of support within the current policies and regulations within our veteran legislation.

• The need to reinforce our core pillars of Remembrance, Support and Advocacy.

This year, Anzac Day services, reinforced the nation's commitment and acknowledgement of those who paid the ultimate sacrifice, we must however pay more attention to our living veterans and their families.

The RNZRSA continues to focus on our core purpose. "Ka mua, ka muri" is a whakatauki (Māori value or metaphor) that means "walking backwards into the future" - the idea we should look to the past to inform the future. We have realised that we need to redefine our purpose and look toward the type of national organisation we want to be by 2030 providing relevant services for our veterans and their families.

points of contact with veterans and their families and helped 200 veterans directly with practical support and signposting to other organisations. Our staff and volunteers have worked tirelessly to ensure we are combating isolation and loneliness across Scotland for those who require our assistance.

It was also a busy year for our Pensions & Advocacy Department with staff presenting appellants at 99 appeals and the successful outcomes resulted in more than £769,000 in financial benefits for those veterans.

With the rest of the Nation and wider Commonwealth our members were devastated by the news of the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in September and across our Areas and Branches the period of mourning was marked with respect and poignancy. We had the privilege of sending representatives to the funeral at Westminster Abbey and to represent on behalf of the organisation here in Edinburgh for the Proclamation of the King. Like many other organisations we are currently awaiting confirmation of our new Patronage.

It remains our pleasure and privilege to be part of the wider Royal Commonwealth Ex-Service League community and for our National Chairman to be invited to attend meetings in London throughout the year to contribute to discussions and to hear regular updates on the dedication and support of the organisation for those overseas who have given their lives in support of the British Armed Forces.

Founded by Earl Haig in 1921, RCEL has 52 Member Organisations in 46 countries, covering the Caribbean, West, East and Southern Africa, the Indian sub-continent to South East Asia, the Pacific and Australasia. RCEL provides support in the form of welfare grants to provide the equivalent of two meals a day. The key objective is to ensure that no eligible ex-service man or woman shall be without help if in need.
