Grand President's Remarks DEC Meeting <u>26 November 2017</u>

Thanks very much Comrade Chair and good morning Comrades. I know we have a full agenda; in fact, we have a particularly full agenda today so I will keep my remarks brief.

I like to begin once again by expressing my personal congratulations to all newly installed members of the Dominion Executive Council. I know you have many years of dedicated service to the Legion and that each of you bring and great deal of experience, wisdom and valuable insight to the senior leadership council of this great national institution. I look forward to getting to know you better and to working with you. I would also like to express my personal appreciation and a big bravo Zulu to your predecessors. It was a real privilege to work with them.

You arrive at a time of great challenge as well as significant opportunity for the Legion. Thanks to tremendous effort by many and all levels in the Legion including all of you. I believe that an impressive progress had been made in the past decade in a number of important areas. However much remains to be done to address a few particularly difficult issues including membership. In my view, the progress essential to the survival of the Legion as we know it will only be achieved if this DEC works together as a team in a clear, forthright and transparent manner to tackle the really difficult issues and then implement your council decisions from coast to coast in an open unified and respectful manner. And I do mean this DEC because the next few years will be extremely important to determining the future of The Royal Canadian Legion.

Since Dominion Executive Council last met in April, I have had the honour and pleasure of participating in a number of memorable events including the official opening and participating in the 53rd bi-annual convention of Nova Scotia/ Nunavut Command. A wonderful event yet once again underlined for me why the Legion matters so much to the Veterans and their families and to communities and citizens of all ages in Nova Scotia / Nunavut and right across this vast country.

Participating in the Canadian Institute of Military Health Research Forum held concurrently with Invictus Games in Toronto in late September was another highlight. Both of these stellar events dramatically underlined the critical importance of today's Legion, to the care and well-being of Veterans and their families. Both also, show cased the progress being achieved as a result of a remarkable research combined with the courage and resilience of modern veterans to rise to the daunting challenges confronting them. Invictus was particularly moving and memorable and caused me to add Prince Harry on my list of personal heroes. He was everywhere and connected with all the wounded warriors in an amazing and very personal manner.

Just a few weeks ago, the Dominion President hosted a very informative and successful Veterans Consultation Group meeting, which brought together the leaders of 15 veteran's organizations at Legion House. The Veterans Ombudsman, Guy Parent also attended and updated the group on his most recent efforts and concerns. A letter signed by Comrade David on behalf of all the leaders was subsequently sent to the Minister noting a number of priority issues requiring action by VAC. In particular, the letter reminded the Minister that the next budget represented a critical time for visible government action and that veteran organizations were anxious to see further substantive progress made in Budget 2018 for the betterment of veterans including their financial security.

Veterans weeks and veterans week events in Ottawa were a great success this year and culminated in an outstanding National Remembrance ceremony impressively organized and led by Dominion Command of the Royal Canadian Legion. Apparently that was mentioned in the CBC Coverage because a number of folks that told me subsequently that they were not aware of the Legion lead role in this annual ceremony. Happily they now are.

Canada was also blessed to have an amazing woman and inspired choice as Silver Cross Mother, Diana Abel. And her contributions as well as those of the Canadian Armed Forces, local Legion volunteers and other key partners were also essential to the success achieved. As I watched the young poster, poem and essay winners and best cadet in the Junior Ranger contingent assist in the wreath laving portion of the ceremony, I was reminded how important the work of the Legion is to the youth of this country. This had been reinforced a few weeks earlier when I received a note from an old friend and former chief petty officer maritime forces Atlantic earl horn who is now National President of the Navy League of Canada. Earl is a huge fan of the Legion and extremely grateful for the4 essential support that sea cadets and navy league cadets, indeed all cadets received from the Royal Canadian legion across the country. He had written to me following a recent visit that he made from Drumheller, Alberta during which he discovered that the local Sea Cadet Corps RCSCC Furious had included the emblem, he emblem of Legion Branch #22 on the reverse side of their corps presentation coin because the generous support of this local Legion branch has been essential to their success and the corps wanted to acknowledge their close relationship with the Legion in a meaningful way.

Just one more reason why we all need to work together to tackle some more of the challenging issues confronting this great national organization. In order to ensure the Royal Canadian Legion continues to flourish and to serve Canada and Canadians in the manner that our founders intended.

That includes my comments thanks very much Comrades.

DOMINION PRESIDENT'S REMARKS TO DEC MEETING 26 NOVEMBER 2017

Good morning Comrades,

As Larry alluded to, we came here together today as Comrades and a team. I welcome all the new provincial presidents and some of the old.

I want to reiterate that we came here together today as a team. There is going to be a lot of deliberations today because as Larry said we are in a time of change and we have to change. So I ask everybody to be respectful, respect the opinion of no matter who it is, give them respect as everybody can have their own opinion as we can't be all of one option.

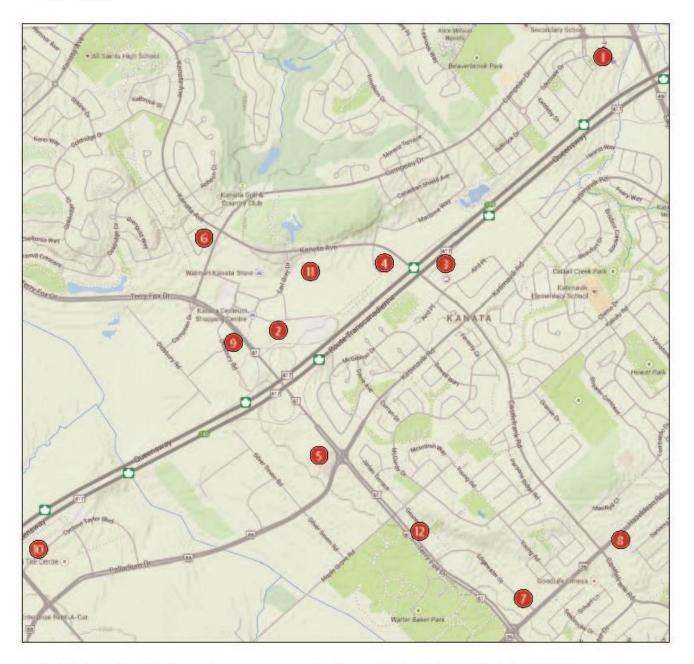

ITEM 7: 2017 SUMMARY - DOMINION TREASURER'S REPORT

FINANCIAL RESULTS AND FORECAST

OVERVIEW

Although we budgeted for a \$55,345 surplus, a balanced year-end position is forecasted for the 2017 year. The primary influences on the forecasted year-end position are as follows.

Forecasted Revenue Increases- \$330,002

- Investment Income increased income based on trending data during the first nine months of 2017 in the amount of \$10,000.
- Service Bureau increased income in the amount of \$44,869 to fund 90% of actual forecasted Service Bureau expenses.
- Supply Sales increased income in the amount of \$250,000.
- Royalty Income increased income in the amount of \$ 25,133.

Forecasted Expense Increases/Decreases- \$385,347

Salary increases/decreases are as follows:

- Administration decreased salary expenses in the amount of \$ 37,575.
- Information Technology increased salary expenses in the amount of \$3,958.
- Membership increased salary expenses in the amount of \$23,384.
- Marketing & Communications increased salary expenses in the amount of \$52,670.
- Finance increased salary expenses in the amount of \$ 72,229 due to duplication in Director of Finance salary costs and recruitment costs.
- Service Bureau increased salary expenses in the amount of \$ 58,221 as mentioned to the DEC at the April 2017 meeting.

• Legion House – decreased salary expenses in the amount of \$820.

Non-salary increases/decreases are as follows:

- Membership increased telephone, postage and printing costs in the amount of \$18,500, increased permanent membership card costs in the amount of \$22,000 and increased membership pack out costs in the amount of \$11,000.
- Supply increased Cost of Goods Sold in the amount of \$ 101,635 due to increased sales.
- Marketing, Advertising & Promotion increased photography and promotion costs in the amount of \$20,000.
- Committees-decreased costs in the amount of \$ 29,855 primarily due to lower than budgeted sports committee costs.
- Other Program Expenses increased legal and charitable foundation establishment costs in the amount of \$70,000.

ITEM 8: 2018 BUDGET – DOMINION TREASURER

OVERVIEW RE: SEO APPROVED BUDGET

Total revenues are expected to increase by \$ 229,080 over 2017.

The major influences on the total revenue increase are as follows.

- Per Capita Tax revenue will increase by \$104,170 based on the assumption that total annual membership numbers will fall by 7500 members and the 2018 Per Capita Tax will increase by \$1.25 over the 2017 rate.
- Investment income is expected to increase by \$58,500.
- Cost reallocation of Service Bureau costs will increase by \$ 150,410.
- Supply sales are budgeted to decrease by \$100,000 over 2017.
- It recoveries will increase by \$16,000.

Total expenses will increase by \$ 244,346 over 2017.

The salary cost influences on the total expense increase are as follows.

- Administration salary expenses will decrease by \$80,158.
- IT salary expenses will increase by \$ 27,171.
- Marketing & Communications salary expenses will increase by \$ 116,213.
- Finance salary expenses will increase by \$ 29,189.
- Service Bureau salary expenses will increase by \$123,289.
- Supply salary expenses will increase by \$ 20,779.
- Legion House salary expenses will increase by \$ 610.

The non-salary cost influences on the total expense are as follows.

- Service Bureau expenses will increase by \$52,200 primarily to fund convention costs.
- Finance expenses will increase by \$ 9,501.
- Legion Magazine Subscriptions will decrease by \$ 10,000 due to a reduction in the total number of memberships over 2017.
- Marketing expenses will increase by \$4,000.
- IT expenses will increase \$ 3,000.
- Supply expenses will decrease by \$90,982 primarily due to a \$90,000 reduction in the Cost of Goods Sold estimate and a general expense reduction of \$ 982.
- Membership expenses will decrease by \$65,516 as plastic 2017 membership cards will not need to be replaced in 2018.
- Marketing, Advertising & Promotion expenses will increase by \$ 83,000.
- Committee expenses will increase by \$18,250 largely due to an enhanced commitment to engage serving members included within the President's engagement budget.
- Other Program expenses will increase by \$ 22,700 primarily due to an enhanced allocation for legal fees in the amount of \$20,000.
- Depreciation and Employer Pension Contribution expenses will increase by about \$9,000 over 2017.
- Legion House expenses will decrease by \$27,900 primarily due to the elimination of a \$30,000 transfer to the building reserve.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the SEO approved 2018 Budget as outlined in Annex A and the following amendments:

- Increase Service Bureau cost recovery from 90% to 95% (\$49,190)
- Add Canvet interest expense \$36,000
- Add membership credit card processing fees \$25,000 (Note 1)
- Decrease Employer Pension Contribution due to a reorganization of the Finance department and a reduction in the employer contribution rate (\$25,000)

be approved as the Final 2018 Dominion Command Budget.

Note 1: Membership credit card processing fees will increase over a 5 year period to a maximum annual cost exposure of \$400,000 if all members purchase their memberships via credit card payments processed via Dominion Command.

Trip Report Ontario Command Provincial Convention <u>May 13-16 2017</u>

I spent a great deal of time with the delegates and officers of Ontario Command, speaking one on one or answering questions from the floor.

I arrived in London on the 13th and was met by Comrade Sharon at the hotel who explained that she was my convention contact and started to give me the lay of the land and what was expected of me for the next few days. I thank comrade Sharon for her patience for always having to track me down, she was a wonderful host.

Sunday May 14, brought the Parade & Wreath laying ceremony along with the Opening Ceremony after the parade.

I had the pleasurable duties of laying a wreath on behalf of Dominion Command, bring greetings from the Dominion President and DEC as well as officially opening the convention. I would be remiss not to mention the pride I took in taking the salute on the reviewing stand for the parade. I have taken the salute a few times in my career but this one touched my heart seeing all the generations of veterans and members of the legion parading together.

Once the Opening Ceremonies were finished they called to order and went straight to work with several reports and procedures as we are now doing at Dominion Command.

Ontario Provincial Command Branches & Ladies Auxiliaries Charitable Foundation reported that they had collected \$145,959 with \$100,000 coming from District "F".

During the Membership Reports a concern was given that membership information on Facebook was not that accessible as they would like and for the RCEL Report, the delegates asked to see an up to date video or presentation on our charges in the Caribbean. I stated that their concerns would be addressed to the proper persons.

Tuesday May 16, brought the rest of the reports, election and installation of officers, presentations and closing.

There were 520 Accredited Delegates, 717 Proxy Votes for a Total voting strength of 1237. There were 60 Observers and 29 guests.

I have never seen such a disruption at any Convention before. We found out later that this Veteran suffers from Severe PTSD, so he had to be handled with kid gloves. Other than that, the Convention was very well organized and the end result Elected 5 Veterans to their Senior Elected Council. My wife and I were treated with nothing but the best of hospitality and respect and enjoyed it immensely.

The summer brought many experiences for us all but also brought some very disconcerting events. Activities that have occurred in BC and AB have spurred an exceptional increase in Constitution and Laws activity. In total, there have been 10 appeals and 8 complaints that Dominion Command has had to deal with. While there are some real issues at hand, it is also evident that the General By-Laws are not well understood, utilized or respected. In my close to 20 years at Dominion Command, I have never seen this unprecedented increase in activity. Thanks to the Chairman of C&L and the Committee's secretaries we have managed to process all this activity on time and on target. I will state however that this has taken away time from all other regular duties that we normally have here.

Despite the absence of sales from Canada 150 Medals October sales were very strong. Sales from our new online <u>www.poppystore.ca</u> and wholesales have bolstered our results. Since the new online store launch at the beginning of October we have handled over 2200 online orders generating \$134,668 in sales. Feedback from the new <u>www.poppystore.ca</u> has been excellent. Sales from these new channels continue to replace those lost through traditional methods.

ii. In terms of trademark administration 2017 has been the busiest year in recent memory. Literally hundreds of trademarks inquiries are now being handled. These range from simple inquiries and the provision of graphics to our branches to serious violations. A number of fraudulent online stores and Facebook pages have been and are being created. These violations range from use of our name, use of our trademarked badge, logo, and Poppy, copying of copy write protected materials, to all out representation of our organization. Strategies to address the importation of trademarked violating product and to address application platform providers are being developed. These activities have been very taxing on our resources but we cannot allow our trademarks to be systematically violated.

Two name violations, "Legion of Sound" and "Legion Construction" have been referred to our legal representation for action.

iii. Sales of Legion Lager continue to accelerate. As of the end of September 48,000 units have been sold. The royalty kicks in as the volume exceeds 50,000 units so we will receive a royalty following the fourth calendar quarter. Legion Lager has been aggressively promoted with over 8000 samples provided at this summer's Army Run. Distribution continues to widen with the product now offered in many Brewers Retail locations, Legions, restaurants, and grocery stores. The Ontario LCBO has now been approached about offering it. Draft is now also available.

Distribution in BC is expected to commence in January of 2018 with the intention to follow with other provinces over the next 18 months.

iv. A number of new products are in the development and production stage, for release in 2018. Of note are products to commemorate the Battle of Medak Pocket and products incorporating imitation CADPAT material.

v. Supported committee activities continue to be a major focus for supply, most notably promotional materials for the Poppy Campaign, the production of Poppies and Wreaths, Track and Field and Legion Sport materials, and gifts for the Defence & Security Committee's support to Operation Santa Claus and Canada Day.

vi. Wholesales of Legion product continue to be an area of sales growth. Products appropriate for public consumption are increasingly available through gifts stores, CANEX locations, and now our Poppy birdfeeder through Home Hardware locations. YTD Home Hardware has purchased from us 9640 feeder units. YTD wholesales at the end of

October were \$170,182. Provincial Commands do receive 5% on the margin achieved from all supply sales.

RCL Foundation Update

Comrades, I am pleased to report that the Foundation held its first meeting on 23 November. A further verbal report will be forthcoming at DEC.

Membership

I would like to share with you the membership weekly stats that were effective as of 14 Nov:

POINTS OF INTEREST:

- To date we have processed 263,985 2017 memberships, down approx. 9,000 members or 3.3 % to the same time last year (95 % of our 2016 final total)
- To date we have received 23,529 new/reinstated members up 6.4% over the same time last year
- 71,700 renewals have already been processed for 2018 compared to 59,000 renewals last year at this time
- We received approximately 5,000 pieces of mail last week, down 46% compared to the same week last year. In addition, we had 6,339 members processed through the portal.
- We received a record 635 phone calls during the week, up 127% yr over yr (355 additional calls)

PROCESSING WEBSITE UPDATE

- 6,000 members have now registered their memberships on line (providing us with their email addresses and phone numbers)
- 954 Branches (68%) have at least logged on to the new system.
- 451 Branches (32%) have processed at least one member on the portal since our launch
- 562 Branches (40%) have now provided their branch rate allowing their members to renew on line in the future.

GOOGLE ANALYTICS STAT OF THE WEEK

- We have had 12,000 visits to our membership site in the last month.
- 58% of visitors are over the age of 55
- 52% of visitors are Female and 48% of visitors are Male

Marketing

I will ask Comrade Dion to provide an overview of his marketing report, which follows. DEC will recall that this is the first full year implementation of a five-year plan.

In November of 2016, DEC approved a 5-year marketing plan for the organization. With that came the approval of an additional \$1.25 million dollars from reserves over the course of 5 years, over and above the existing marketing operations budget. The additional funding became known as the Hearts and Minds budget allocated to increased advertising aimed at winning the Hearts and Minds of Canadians with respect to

becoming a member of the Legion. The approved marketing plan, designed with a focus on membership, sees us generating year over year membership growth over five years.

2017 was the first year under this newly approved plan and I am happy to report that we have seen success to date. As of November 1, 2017, new membership acquisition is up 6% year over year. While overall membership is down 8150 members year over year, by end of year it is likely to be closer to 6-7K members down. While still a decline, the rate of decline is half of the 10-12K membership drop we have seen annually for 30 plus years. We have slowed the rate of decline for the first time in decades, and the 5-year marketing plan is just getting started! This is a very good sign.

As 2017 is coming to a close, marketing and communications has worked hard over the year to ensure The Royal Canadian Legion is in the hearts and minds of millions of Canadians across this country. By end of year, the full budget allocation will be leveraged and each of the marketing strategies outlined in the plan executed. Here are just a few highlights:

- National TV and Radio spots multiple National broadcasters have agreed to and are airing our TV and radio commercials, many of which are doing so during the Poppy Campaign. This alone equates to tens of millions of dollars in free advertising for the Legion.
- 2. The Legion's revamped Legion.ca website, with new branding and navigation, was launched in July and is seeing increased traffic to targeted pages, primarily through organic search, direct search and social media.
- 3. Significant growth in our social media platforms including the introduction of Instagram. Daily posts promoting all aspects of Legion activity and programs are being seen by hundreds of thousands monthly, and we have seen significant growth in positive commentary from those who engage on our social media platforms.
- 4. Other marketing elements such as direct mail, online banners, and print ads are increasing the exposure of the Legion and are being seen by hundreds of thousands of Canadians.
- 5. Communications to our members has increased with our ongoing member newsletters, keeping members up to date and appraised of Legion activities, initiatives, and advocacy efforts.
- 6. Maximizing our Invictus Games sponsorship Branches across the country came forward to host Flag Relay events, building Legion exposure and engagement as the Games ramped up. With the dedicated support of Ontario Command, we had a Legion presence at all major events during the full week of the Games. We met with many Team Canada athletes, their families and other competitors, and interviewed several Team Canada athletes for social media. Our presence throughout the Games built relationships, awareness and credibility with a very crucial segment for the organization. In total over 5,000 Legion information kits including membership applications where distributed to an audience very interested in Veterans during the week of the games.

This first year has met our expectations to reduce decline and see growth in new acquisitions. It was understood from the start that when the plan was developed, it came with caveats that other improvements would be required in order for us to be successful. These included:

- 1. Adopting a more inclusive organization culture
 - a. From a marketing perspective, work on improving organizational culture started this year with a targeted speech developed for SEO presentations at Conventions that highlighted the crucial message of inclusiveness and customer service to branches. Changing culture will be a process, no doubt, and our message of change needs repeating at every opportunity we present to Branches and Commands.
- 2. Implementation of the membership portal
 - a. A long awaited and very important member acquisition and renewal system was implemented this year – a step necessary to make joining and renewing easy and convenient for our members. Launched in June, there are currently 5K members registered, and only 40% of branches that have entered their membership rates into the system. It is vital for branches to come on board, allowing us to simplify the process of renewals for our members.
- 3. Adopting a rolling anniversary based membership model vs calendar year model
 - a. Moving to a rolling anniversary membership model where the month you join is the month you renew each year will significantly improve our ability to sign up new members later in the year as well as ease the burden on membership processing, allowing for a smoother and timelier renewal process. To date, this has yet to be implemented, but it is something that should be reviewed and discussed as it will only further our ability to generate membership growth.
- 4. Strong communication strategy
 - a. A 5-year communications strategy has been developed and approved and a new communications manager hired to execute the strategy and generate positive earned media to compliment the marketing efforts. While efforts are in full force in this regard, we still require the support of the SEO's to ensure the message remains positive. The annual Public Relations workshop at DEC supports this aim. It is vital that we are all on the same page with both our external and internal communications; otherwise, we are divided and not focused on our mission.

As you can see, we are at various stages with the improvements that are needed in order to be truly successful in achieving membership growth. While the 5-year marketing plan positions the organization to promote the great work we do and the benefits of membership, these overlying concerns impact marketing and communications ability to fully achieve objectives for membership growth. It is crucial these concerns be addressed.

As we move into 2018 with a solid plan, a committed team, and early evidence of success in our first year, we are confident the next four years will build on our accomplishments.

GENERAL

The VSS Committee last met on 22 November 2017 via teleconference. Since the last report, we have another new Minister of Veterans Affairs; Seamus O'Regan replaced Kent Hehr last August. Comrade Dave sent a letter to the new Minister congratulating him on his appointment and an invitation to meet at Legion House soonest for an introductory conversation to discuss our respective goals and mandates. A letter was also forwarded to Kent Hehr, thanking him for his work on the Veterans file and wishing him well in his new appointment as the Minister of Sport and Persons with Disability.

LEGION ADVOCACY

Advocacy efforts have focused on ensuring that all Veterans and their families are treated with fairness, dignity and respect such that they are afforded the same benefits and services irrespective of when and where they served. It is important that all Legion Branches continue to welcome all Veterans, that Branch Service Officers receive their annual training such that they are knowledgeable on programs and services available for our Veterans and that we continue to support programs.

The Dominion President / VSS Chair and Committee continued to address key issues affecting Veterans and their families:

a. On 18 September 2017, we met with Dr. Remington Nevin and a group of Mefloquine advocates for a general awareness discussion on this controversial anti-malarial drug. The Advocates told their own personal battles with mefloquine and Dr. Nevin emphasized the importance of funding for research on mefloquine. The group were very pleased with our advocacy to Government requesting research and we confirmed that we would continue to advocate on their behalf so that research will be conducted so that we can get a better understanding on the side effects of mefloquine.

- b. On 5 October 2017, The PM issued a new mandate letter to the Minister of Veterans Affairs. The mandate letter included all of the old commitments and included commitments already made in Budget 2017, these commitments are due for implementation on 1 April 2018.
- c. On 5 October 2017, the Minister of National Defence and the Minister of Veterans Affairs released the joint CAF-VAC Suicide Prevention Strategy. This is a step in the right direction, there are many recommendations and to implement this strategy will be difficult, we will closely monitor over the next few years.
- d. On 4 November 2017, a Veterans Consultation Assembly meeting was held at Legion House. We hosted 14 Veteran organizations and received presentations from John Dowe, International Mefloquine Association, from Simon Coakeley and Andrew McGillivary, National Federal Association of Retirees and from Guy Parent, the Veterans Ombudsman. All veteran organizations agreed to continue to advocate to the Government until all of the PM's commitments are completed.
- e. On 7 November 2017, we hosted the annual RCL-VAC Bilateral meeting. In attendance from VAC were the DM, the ADM Strategic Policy and Commemoration, the ADM Service Delivery, the ADM Strategic Oversight and Communications and the Director General, Commemoration.

RCL VETERANS HOMELESSNESS ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The meeting scheduled for 23 September 2017 was cancelled due to conflicts with the Invictus Games and CIMVHR schedules. On 30 October 2017, ESDC hosted a Homeless Veterans Roundtable and the Legion was in attendance, no reports have been received to date post the roundtable.

<u>CIMVHR</u>

Comrades Larry, Dave, Tom, Brad, Charls and Ray attended the CIMVHR Forum in Toronto, ON from 24-27 September. Comrade Dave presented the fourth Legion Masters Scholarship to Ms. Kelly McDonagh-Chen who will be researching PTSD and Service Dogs. In his brief presentation, he highlighted the support and programs that the Legion provides to Veterans and their families and advised the attendees that all would be welcome as new members in The Royal Canadian Legion. The forum is also a great opportunity to network with the academic, CAF and Veterans Affairs Canada researchers.

DEC approved to fund the cost of a Master's Degree Scholarship specializing in Military and Veteran Health Research for the years 2017-18, 2018-19 and 2019-20. Support of this initiative demonstrates the Legion's history of supporting Veterans research while also building interest and momentum for the next generation of researchers.

Recommendation: Although DEC approved the scholarship for 2018/19, in accordance with Poppy Fund regulations, the approval must be ratified for each year. It is recommended that DEC ratify the fifth scholarship for 2018-19.

OUTREACH AND VISITATION INITIATIVE PROGRAM

The current contract will end on 30 April 2018. In the last 18 months, there have been 494 taskings to visit 11, 048 Veterans in Long Term Care (LTC), our volunteers completed 9,290 visits to date. The delta between the number of taskings and the number of completed visits is due to Veterans moving or passing away. This is great work by our volunteers and bodes well for its continued success. VAC is pleased with the contract and after they brief the new Minister, will announce plans for the next contract due in May 2018.

SERVICE DOG STANDARDS

The sixth meeting of the Canadian General Standards Board (CGSB) met on 20-22 September to review the comments from the first Public Review. They agreed that the Standard must address human rights concerns and action must be taken to consider existing industry certifications that many Guide and Service Dog users have obtained. Regarding this, a companion document will be drafted to provide information to users, stakeholders and regulators and will speak about the ability to recognize equivalencies regarding certification, as there is no intent for this Standard to introduce duplicate certification requirements in Canada from existing recognized international schools.

Prior to the second Public Review period, the Canadian Human Rights Commission, as well as the Human Rights division of Justice Canada will be reviewing the next draft document for any concerns. The companion document will be included with the second draft at the Pubic Review period with the purpose of providing guidance to anyone reading the draft and an explanation for all stakeholders. This will be held prior to the end of the year and allow all stakeholders 60 days to comment on the second revised draft National Standard. The seventh CGSB Committee meeting is scheduled to be held in early 2018, for the purpose of reviewing the comments received during the second Public Review period.

SERVICE BUREAU - REGIONAL COMMAND SERVICE OFFICER TRAINING

Western Command Service Officers attended the Western Region Command Service Officer Training in Winnipeg in September 2017 and the Eastern Command Service Officers attended the Eastern Region Command Service Officer Training in Saint John, NB in June 2017. Thank-you to both Manitoba/NWO Command and NB Command for hosting these events. The Service Officer Professional Development training is scheduled from 23-25 October 2018 in Charlottetown.

DOMINION COMMAND SERVICE BUREAU ACTIVITIES

Dominion Command Service Officers continue to experience a significant increase in the overall number of applications received. Statistics for 2017 will be reported at the next DEC in April 2018.

The next Service Officer training course is scheduled from 6-8 March 2018 at Legion House.

PROVINCIAL VSS REPORTS – RESPONSE AND HIGHLIGHTS

The VSS Committee reviewed the Provincial VSS Committee Reports on 13 September 2017. All Commands reported they conduct Branch Service Officer training and visits to the Integrated Personnel Support Centres, Military Family Resource Centres and conduct Second Career Assistance Network (SCAN) seminars. The reports were very informative on LTC and Homeless Veterans programs.

One highlight from the Command reports was that Ontario Command established a second Homeless Veterans Dental Program at Algonquin College in Ottawa. The first program is at George Brown College in Toronto. The Dental programs are for Homeless Veterans only. Ontario Command is paying for all dental work, noting the Veteran must register through VAC and have a Case Manager. There is an obligation to the Veteran to continue the complete program as the students are graded on each client. They are also expanding the Dental program to London and North Bay.

2017 has been a very smooth campaign from a fulfillment perspective. #20 wreaths have run out with their demand unexpectedly increasing beyond previous levels. Their

shortage quickly resulted in a run on #24 wreaths. Production levels will be adjusted for the 2018 campaign.

In the next few weeks meetings will be held on the production of promotional materials for the 2018 campaign. Long lead-time items need to be on order by year's end so design criteria needs to be established.

As part of the 2017 Poppy Campaign programs such as the Wreaths for Parliamentarians, support for international embassies and consulates, support for international ceremonies and missions, National Ceremony wreaths, Poppy & Wreaths components to RCEL supported programs, were managed. VAC orders for wreaths were challenging to manage as distribution did not commence until well into October. VAC initially limited the number of wreaths for each parliamentarian but quickly changed course when negative feedback was received.

THE POPPY CAMPAIGN

Dominion Command assisted with the arrangements for the First Poppy Presentation to the Governor General which is the ceremonial launch of the campaign. The First Poppy Presentation for 2017 was made to Governor General Julie Payette at Rideau Hall on 23 October 2017. The 2017 Poppy Campaign officially began on 27 Oct 17.

Although the 2017 Poppy Campaign was just finishing at the writing of this report there were several problem areas noted:

Corporate Agreements: On 20 Sep 17 an all-branch was sent out that contained the Poppy Campaign's Corporate agreements. These agreements were constructed based upon the mutual needs of both the Legion's Poppy Campaign as well as our corporate partners.

Over the campaign there were issues with several branches who had taken it upon themselves to berate certain corporations locally (i.e. Costco, Dollarama and RBC) for not conforming to their belief of how a store/outlet should act in regard to their wishes on how they would like them to accommodate the distribution of poppies. This was done through the local media who by the way did not check all the facts before they went to air. As such companies who in good faith made arrangements to accommodate the Poppy Campaign were being ostracized in the press. Additionally volunteers were showing up at corporate outlet locations at the wrong day/time causing further friction with the companies involved. .

Distribution of Poppies: Many communities, businesses and organizations wanted to be involved in the Poppy Campaign but were not approached or supplied poppies. The reasons for this have yet to be studied in detail however on the surface it seems to be attributable to a lack of volunteers, the absence of a Legion in that community or areas that are too big to be covered by a branch.

Misuse of the Poppy Logo: There were many instances where the poppy image was being used without permission and in some cases improperly. This ranged from a bakery making poppy cookies, to improper versions of the poppy be displayed at a mall to Corporate misuse.

In the latter case a major corporate infraction was conducted by TELUS who was using the poppy for a major fundraising campaign for Wounded Warriors. By way of background TELUS approached the Legion in 2016 with the idea to list Canada's war dead on a specific page hosted by them using the poppy symbol. It was approved by the committee but it was late in the campaign and they decided to only run it on 11 Nov 16. Everything that was visible on their site in 2017 was what was used in 2016. Telus was advised of the use of the trademark at that time.

Telus did not reach out to the Legion at all this year but rather changed the recipient to Wounded Warriors. TELUS was contacted reference the unauthorized use of the poppy symbol which is a copyright trademark of the Royal Canadian Legion. It was again explained that one of the purposes of the poppy is that it is used during the remembrance period to raise funds through donations to the Poppy Fund which supports veterans and their dependents. That the poppy is the symbol for the Poppy Fund and for the two weeks prior to and including 11 Nov annually it is used to raise funds for the purpose stated. As such the Legion does not authorize the use of the Poppy Image with the aim of raising funds for any other purpose than the Poppy Fund. This has been the case since 1926 when the Legion adopted the poppy as a symbol of remembrance and granted the copyright by the government of Canada in 1948. TELUS apologized profusely.

They were given the options to either remove the poppy symbol from the ad or change the beneficiary. TELUS chose to change the beneficiary with the promise to ensure Wounded Warriors received the full amount of the \$25,000. The Legion was also to be given \$25,000.

Non Legion Veteran Groups: In a few instances in QC the group Veterans Canada were manning poppy tables in major malls wearing their uniforms and advertising their group with banners. There was no Legion logos on display with perhaps the exception of the collection trays. QC Command was asked to investigate.

Thefts: There were reported thefts of poppy boxes across the country. There is no immediate statistics available.

Non Legion Equipment: There are several instances of individuals, companies and branches advocating for or using non authorized equipment or equipment in poor repair. Examples are:

• A person in Calgary is advertising collection boxes that can be secured. In order to substantiate the need he was using inflated data or incorrect information. Again the media picked up on this and reported using his incorrect information. There were also some Legion branches buying these boxes.

- Some branches continue to use old collection boxes that were in disrepair so much so that the poppy symbol missing and the boxes were literally taped together.
- Poppy centre pins are springing up all over the country with some branches selling them on their Poppy Campaign.

The committee will be looking into these problem areas (and others) at their next meeting.

NATIONAL REMEMBRANCE DAY CEREMONY

The Legion again organized and directed this national ceremony on behalf of the People of Canada. For 2017, an estimated 40,000 spectators attended the Ceremony. The Silver Cross Mother for 2017/2018 is Mrs. Diana Abel from Brampton, ON. Her son Cpl Michael Abel was killed while on duty in 1993 during Operation Deliverance.

LOCAL CEREMONIES

Local remembrance ceremonies were carried out across the country. For the most part it seems that these were well done and followed Legion protocol however there have been some reported complaints that include poorly organized, too commercial and were not non-denominational.

POSTER AND LITERARY CONTESTS

The 2017 prize winners for the Poster and Literary Contests are: Senior Colour, Ms. Hye In (Grace) Park, Langley, BC; Senior Black & White, Ms. Keyu Chen, Vancouver, BC; Senior Poetry, Ms. Beth Kirby, Cornwall, PE and Senior Essay, Ms. Megan Miller, Moncton NB. These Senior Winners were present at the National Remembrance Ceremony on November 11th, and presented a wreath on behalf of the Youth of Canada.

NEVER SUCH INNOCENCE

The Royal Canadian Legion is in partnership with Never Such Innocence (NSI) based in London England. All Poster entries from the Junior, Intermediate and Senior levels as well as all Poems submitted to Dominion Command from those levels were sent to NSI for judging under their process. These entries provided six winners for the NSI contest from the entries submitted by the Legion. The successful winners were: Jude Brian Derla, St. Brieux, SK., Grace Gao, Ottawa, ON, Yiwei (Susan) Ni, Vancouver BC, Ivy Shi, Calgary AB, Jiade Guo, Scarborough, ON and Jennifer Boadway, Viking,AB. It is anticipated that the Legion will partner with NSI for one more year (2018) before that initiative is discontinued.

2017 PILGRIMAGE OF REMEMBRANCE

The 2017 Pilgrimage of Remembrance was conducted from 8 to 22 July 2017 with Vice President Angus Stanfield as Head of Mission. This Pilgrimage was very successful with

a total of 42 Pilgrims on this tour including our tour guide, John Goheen. Comrade Goheen was recommended and approved by the committee to be the tour guide for 2019.

CONCLUSION

The next Poppy & Remembrance meeting is scheduled for Legion House on 27 Nov 17.

ADDENDUM TO POPPY & REMEBRANCE REPORT – 26 NOV 17

 During the recent poppy campaign, there have been issues with products, specifically poppy collection boxes with locks, that are being offered and in some cases being used by some branches in lieu of Legion generated poppy boxes. The funds collected for these particular boxes are used to benefit the producer and not the Legion or the Poppy Fund. This is not the first time or the only example of materials being provided to branches for use on the Poppy campaign.

The problem with this scenario is that funding that would otherwise go to the Poppy Fund (i.e. branch, provincial, national) is going to an independent for profit.

In order to rectify this situation and prevent branches from independently choosing to purchase such items the following recommendation to the Poppy Manual is made:

RECOMMENDATION:

Current: 402. The following are approved uses of Poppy Trust Funds. Prior permission may be required in some cases, when unsure you should contact your Provincial Command for guidance.

i. Campaign

a. the purchase of Poppies, wreaths, canvassing supplies and promotional material for the annual Poppy Campaign.

Modify 402.i.a: the purchase of *Command approved* Poppies, wreaths, canvassing supplies and promotional material for the annual Poppy Campaign.

2. The incidents of Poppy centre pins being produced and distributed at many locations across the country is reaching epidemic proportions. These items are listed on-line, being distributed to Legion branches, being sold as part of the Poppy campaign by some Legion branches and being sold for and by other agencies In the past the Legion has challenged the sale of these items with one person ceasing the practice and the other continuing to produce and sell them. The legal opinion on this matter states:

"The Legion's trademark rights also do not extend to pin centres per se. In the past we have challenged the promotion and sale of the pin centres on the basis of the trademarks used in association with the pin centres. In this case, we could justifiably request that the other side cease all use of the trademark POPPY in association with the pin centres since Dominion Command has registered the trademark POPPY for services that include fund raising services. We also could justifiably request that the other side cease use of the mark LEGION in association with its fund raising services. However If the other side removes reference to the

trademarks POPPY and LEGION from its promotional materials, we have no legitimate basis upon which to request that it cease all sales of the pin centres. "

RECOMMENDATION: That the Legion design a Poppy Centre Pin that can be trademarked that would afford it the same protection as that of the Poppy Image.

<u>GENERAL</u>

This report covers the period from April 12, 2017 to November 16, 2017. During this period, the Membership Committee convened 4 times via conference call including a call specifically discussing a Branch Hospitality Program.

MEMBERSHIP UPDATE

As of November 06, 2017 we had processed 263,359 2017 memberships, down approximately 8,200 members or 3.0% to the same time last year (94% of our 2016 total). We have received 23,199 new/reinstated members up 6.1% over the same time last year. Over 57,000 renewals have been processed for 2018 compared to 47,000 2017 renewals at the same time last year.

NEW MEMBERSHIP PROCESSING WEBSITE

The membership processing website launched late June of 2017. As of November 06, 2017:

- 943 branches (67%) have logged on to the system
- 422 branches (30%) have processed members
- 546 branches (39%) have entered their branch rates allowing their members to renew on line
- Since launch, over 37,000 processing transactions have occurred through the new website representing over \$1.3 million.

The numbers indicate a highly successful start to a more efficient process for all associated with Legion membership.

NEW 2018 MEMBERSHIP CARDS

The new plastic cards were distributed to all branches in late August. Each card included instructions on how to register a member profile, which provides the members phone number and email address and allows members to renew their memberships on line. The ability to offer renewal payments on line and the collection of member contact information will positively affect member retention moving forward.

To date, 5,200 members have registered their profiles on line. We now have 30,000 member email addresses, which is a start to addressing our member communication shortcomings.

MEMBER RETENTION EXIT SURVEY

Environics, a third party research firm, conducted a non-renewing member survey during the Spring of 2017.

We received 479 total responses from our email survey (323 men vs 156 women including 224 Ordinary members) which provided a margin of error of plus or minus 4.5 points, 19 times out of 20. The key findings were:

- 1) 40% of non-renewing members did not receive a renewal reminder call/notice from their local branch
- 2) 41% of members stated they would renew today if they could do so on line
- 3) 25% of members found the branch experience unhospitable and 37% stated it was somewhat hospitable.

The results of this survey further support the direction of the committee's 5-year business plan, which focusses on improving the member renewal experience by introducing new renewal payment options, improving member contact information and developing a branch hospitality program.

The ability for members to renew on line while capturing member contact information through the registration process directly addresses items #1 and #2 above.

The committee has attached a Branch Hospitality Program to address the third key finding of the survey. This program to be released along with the full survey findings to the Provincial Commands pending DEC approval.

TEAM CANADA INVICTUS GAMES DINNER

The Membership Committee and Marketing hosted the Team Canada Invictus athletes in Kingston Ontario on Friday June 16, 2017. Ontario Branch 560 was highly recommended by Ontario Command and was an excellent venue for the event.

Special thanks to Comrade Al Jones (Past Branch President) and his team for assisting with an inspirational evening in which all athletes were thanked, provided best wishes and received the offer of a 1-year complementary Legion membership.

PROVINCIAL MEMBERSHIP CHAIR CONFERENCE CALLS

The Chairman and Vice-Chairman continued with their commitment to improving internal membership communications across the country and hosted 2 conference calls with the provincial membership chairs over the past 6 months. Representatives from 9 of the 10 Commands were on both calls.

These calls primarily focussed on the new membership system, new cards and changes to the membership initiation process.

Membership goals of reducing declines to under 8,000 members year over year were shared with all provincial membership chairs.

These calls continue to be a great two-way communication tool for all participants.

SUMMARY

The membership committee is pleased with the initial progress of our extensive change management exercise focussing on numerous elements including membership processing, membership renewals, new membership cards and streamlined member enrollment / initiation processes.

The current challenge remains to further educate, assist and convert branches and members to the new options now available and to encourage increased participation.

The year 2017 has been a pivotal year and a period of major accomplishment for Legion membership. With our new membership administration foundation firmly in place we now have the tools available to positively influence our member renewal and retention efforts moving forward. We recognize the considerable work ahead but we remain encouraged and optimistic on achieving our goal of stabilizing the future of legion membership.

GENERAL

This report covers the period from 29 April to 25 November 2017. The Committee last met as part of a countrywide member sports teleconference on 15 February 2017.

2017 NATIONAL TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 2017 Legion National Youth Track and Field Championships took place 9 - 15 August in Brandon, MB. The total attendance was 326 Legion sponsored athletes, 35 chaperones and 25 coaches representing all 10 provincial commands. In addition, there were 330 open category athletes and 98 open coaches. There was approximately 5000-6000 spectators/officials/volunteers from all parts of Canada in attendance over the three days of competition which included veteran's both retired and serving covering all branches of service.

The program continued to consist of, for Legion athletes, instructional clinics, practice sessions, social activities and the actual meet. For 2017 a remembrance theme of the 100th anniversary of the battle of Vimy ridge was prominent throughout. As well the 41st anniversary of these games was acknowledged.

The Dominion Sports Chairman of the Legion, Comrade Angus Stanfield attended the opening ceremonies and was the official guest of honour. In attendance as well was the MP for Brandon-Souris Larry Maguire, MLA Reg Hewler, mayor of Brandon his Worship Rick Charest, Base Commander for CFB Shilo LCol Dave MacIntyre and Base CWO D.E. Askeland. Immediately following the ceremony Dominion Command hosted a reception on-site at the Brandon Sportsplex Further receptions were held at Branch #3 Brandon for the chaperones and coaches on Saturday and Sunday respectively. The closing banquet was hosted at Brandon University in the main dining hall on Sunday evening.

As is the custom within this event the message of veteran recognition and remembrance, which is the perpetual message of the Royal Canadian Legion, was reinforced throughout. This was done through event publications, local and national media outlets, event paraphernalia sporting the 100th anniversary logo (i.e. volunteer t-shirts, event bags, bibs, event booklet, etc) and formal recognition of veterans who were invited guests to the games, acted as chaperones, volunteered their services and formed part of the games medal presenters. Other areas of remembrance were the medals presented which used the Vimy Ridge memorial located in France as the basis for the design, the laying of a wreath by the Dominion Sports Chairman and the two minutes of silence during the opening ceremonies. During the final banquet the playing of the Battle of the Somme, Scotland the Brave and Amazing Grace by the Sports Chairman on his grandfather's (a WWI veteran) bagpipes, which were present at the Battle of Vimy Ridge was an especially poignant moment.

The meet was held on 11 - 13 August under perfect weather conditions. The facility at the Brandon Sportsplex was in excellent condition and enhanced the overall competition. In fact the community of Brandon had just invested over a million dollars to upgrade the facility and the Legion Nationals were the first to compete on its surface. The meet itself was carried out over a full three-day period under the excellent organization of the meet director Jim Murray. Nine meet records and four national records were broken. The top Legion female athlete receiving the LeRoy Washburn trophy (for the second time) was Trinity Tutti from ON and the top male athlete receiving the Jack Stenhouse trophy was Jamal Miller from ON as well. Logistically the caterer provided good meals on site with a nutritionally designed menu developed in concert with a nutritional sport expert. The quarters used to house the Legion teams were in good condition. Transportation for staff and Legion teams was excellent.

For 2017 an extensive social media campaign was conducted which included Facebook, Instagram and Facebook live – the latter to broadcast the event to outside audiences. Additional promotion prior to the event was provided through advertisements at the OFSAA T&F Championships, CFB Shilo's and 17 Wing's base newspapers and TV spots on the PBS Station Prairie Public. Extensive coverage of the event was provided by the Brandon Sun prior to, during and post event. During the games, the event was broadcast on Facebook Live and Instagram.

Overall, the live feeds were very well received by the audience with a total of 50,686 views over the three days, 2,497 comments, 3,623 reactions (i.e. likes), and 278 video shares. 176,456 Facebook users also saw the video posts! On average, there were 72 viewers at a time, with the highest number of live views at 139. Once the audience understood what Facebook live was all about, they were extremely receptive and grateful for the opportunity to feel as though they were at the Legion Nationals themselves, cheering on the athletes. Instagram Live does not measure the stats in the same way as Facebook, but after the competition, it was calculated roughly 1,000 total live views over the three days with an average 300 comments per day.

The Brandon community led by the LAC Chairman Barb Andrews of Branch #3 and Brandon First CEO Jackie Nichol were instrumental in organizing the event on the ground. The entire Brandon community rallied around the program providing the volunteer base of over 300. CFB Shilo was a strong supporter as well providing logistical support in the form of modular tenting and hosting the Legion athlete contingent on the Monday following the games.

To sum up, I want to convey the importance of this event. It is another of our "Best Kept Secrets " and we must continue to do all we can to get the word out. It is truly life changing for many Canadian Youth. No one else does it and the RCL does it extremely well.

I had a gentleman, an official who officiates all over North America approach me and say every governing body could learn from the Legion - he specifically pointed out the treatment of the coaches and officials. There were many parents and spectators with tears in their eyes thanking the Legion - " I had no idea the Legion did this ! " echoed around the event.

The Legion support staff under the leadership of Danny Martin - Angela Keeling Colkitt, Leroy Washburn, and John and Helen Ladouceur are special individuals; they deserve much of the credit for the success of this event.

As you know, this is not a cheap event to stage and I feel obligated to remark on the financial aspects of it. There is no fat to cut - no fluff. Our membership must have confidence that we are maintaining the standard of excellence expected at the lowest possible cost. We must continue to seek sponsorship; opportunities will likely come with the greater exposure that live streaming offers.

I would encourage every member to try and attend at least one Legion T&F Championship - you will be hooked and even prouder of this great organization

COMMITTEE ACTIVITY

The Ritual and Awards Committee last reported to DEC April 28-30, 2017. Since that time the Committee has held four teleconference meetings, and two meetings at Legion House. Applications for major awards are reviewed in a timely manner and all matters pertaining to Ritual, Awards, Insignia and Protocol are attended to. There is no backlog of applications and all enquiries received concerning Ritual, Awards and Protocol are atdended in a timely manner.

COMMEMORATIVE LAPEL PIN

Through the approval of DEC, authorization for the wearing of the Vimy 1917 Commemorative lapel pin was given to be worn on Legion Dress along with the We Support Our Troops lapel pin for the period of April 1, 2017 to December 30, 2017. This pin was authorized to be worn on Legion Dress to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the battle of Vimy Ridge. It is worn on the right lapel of your Legion Dress directly below the We Support Our Troops lapel pin. We remind everyone that as of December 30th of this year, the Vimy pin is no longer authorized for wear on Legion Dress. After this date, the only lapel pin authorized for wear on the right lapel of your Legion Dress will be the We Support Our Troops lapel pin.

VETERANS SCROLL

At the November 2016 DEC meeting a motion was approved for a sew on scroll to be produced and made available through our Supply Department for wear on Legion Dress that would simply state "Veteran". A change to our Ritual, Awards and Protocol manual has been made to now allow this new Veteran scroll to be worn on Legion Dress on the left breast pocket immediately below the Legion Crest or Life Member scroll. The new Veteran Scroll is available through our Supply Department and an all-branch mailing was sent in June introducing this new sew on scroll.

RITUAL, AWARDS AND PROTOCOL MANUAL

Due to the elimination of Life Membership from our General By-Laws, the Committee has made housekeeping changes to our Ritual, Awards and Protocol manual to further expand upon the application process required. Further changes have also been made to Chapter 4 of our manual with the updating of a revised optional Member Initiation Ceremony. A new updated cover photo was also included and an all-branch memo advising of the manual changes was sent out in July.

SOVEREIGN'S MEDAL FOR VOLUNTEERS

As was mentioned in our last DEC report, the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers was introduced in the spring of 2016 and is now a part of the Canadian Honours System. This program replaces the Governor General's Caring Canadian Award that had been created in 1995. It is a Canadian decoration that recognizes the exceptional dedication and commitment of volunteer achievements of Canadians from across the country in a wide range of fields. The Committee continues to promote this new National Award available to all Legion members. The good news to pass on to the members of DEC from the office of the Governor General, is that the application for our Dominion President, Dave Flannigan, was approved this past June. The application had been submitted on behalf of our Committee and Dominion Command, and the presentation of this medal to Comrade Dave took place in September at the Newfoundland Provincial Convention held in Stephenville. Congratulations Comrade Dave.

In September, at our regular monthly Committee meeting held at Legion House, we had the Manager of the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers Program, Anna Laperle, attend our meeting. She explained that she has in fact received several applications from members of The Legion, but the processing of such applications has been taking longer than normal through this office. She advised that members should be made aware that their office is currently dealing with a significant volume of files, and as a result, it should be expected that generally it will take a few months to completely process an application. They have also suggested that it would be most helpful to ensure that our members review the information provided in the FAQ section of their website so that they have a good understanding of the information that should be included in their nominations. The application process may be found at <u>www.gg.ca/nominate</u> and click onto Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers under the medal section.

LIFE MEMBER PER CAPITA

At the regular meeting of Dominion Executive Council held at Legion House on November 23, 2016, approval was given that the reference to "Life" in subsection 201. b be removed from the General By-Laws and at this same meeting, approval was given to have Section 206 (Life Members) removed in its entirety from the Membership Categories in the General By-Laws. This change has therefore made a Life Membership redundant as a Membership category, and the Ritual, Awards and Protocol Manual has reflected this change in the Honours and Awards Section of the manual by referencing it as a Life Membership Award.

There has been a noticeable decline in Life Membership applications in the past few years due to the required amount of Dominion and Provincial Command per capita tax requirement when making application for a Life Membership. Dependent on the age of an intended recipient, the amount payable at the time the application has been approved is a minimum of five years and a maximum of 15 years of per capita tax. With Branches struggling financially, this has become a deterrent for Branches to recognize their members with such an award. Since it is highly recommended that 5 years should have lapsed between the awarding of a Life Member Award and an MSM or MSA, there has also been a significant drop in the number of applications being received for these higher wards.

RECOMMENDATION: That the Dominion and Provincial per capita tax payable for all new Life Member Awards be changed to being paid annually utilizing the current number of years that the per capita tax is to be paid for a Life Member Award as per our Ritual, Awards and Protocol manual. All existing Life Members are to be grandfathered regarding the per capita tax required.

I would ask a voting member of DEC move this recommendation.

LEGION BLAZER CREST

Legion Blazer badges for wear on Legion Dress and Ladies' Auxiliary uniforms are to identify each of the various Legion membership categories. However, Life is not considered as a Membership Category and we have been attempting not to differentiate as to the various categories of membership. Just as a Veteran is a Veteran is a Veteran, a member should be classified and identified as a Legion member and not by certain categories. We have already introduced the Veteran Scroll to identify a Veteran, and our

Committee feels that we should not segregate our membership under various membership categories through the wearing of a Legion Blazer Crest.

RECOMMENDATION: That all Legion Blazer Crests that categorize a Legion member be discontinued and that the only Legion Blazer Crest made available for Legion members for wear on the Legion Blazer is the Legion Crest that simply states Legion. All current Associate, Affiliate and Life Members be grandfathered regarding the wearing of their current Legion Blazer Badges.

I would ask a voting member of DEC move this recommendation.

FLYING AND SPECIALIST SKILLED BADGES

At our November 2016 DEC meeting, a draft of a resolution was presented and agreed upon in principle for allowing the wearing of a Canadian Armed Forces embroidered or metal Flying and Specialist Skill Badge on Legion Dress. Minor suggested changes to the resolution were addressed at this meeting and included in the draft of the resolution.

The Committee has continued to work on the drafting of such a resolution, but decided to present a motion at this meeting regarding this subject matter rather than presenting a resolution for presentation at our 2018 Dominion Convention.

RECOMMENDATION: That the wearing of one embroidered or metal Canadian Specialist Skill badge of choice that has been earned by the individual while serving in the CAF, RCMP or as a First Responder, be authorized for wear on the left side of Legion Dress centered immediately above Service Medals/Undress Ribbons. It is further moved that the wearing of one embroidered or metal Specialist Skill badge of choice that has been earned by an individual who has honourably served in the Commonwealth or Allied Forces, also be authorized for wear on the left side of Legion Dress centered immediately above Service Medals/Undress Ribbons. Section 105 of the Ritual, Awards and Protocol Manual is also to be revised accordingly.

I would ask a voting member of DEC move this recommendation.

INITIATION CEREMONY

Chapter #4 of our Ritual, Awards and Protocol Manual is currently headed "Initiation of Members". Discussions have taken place in the past including at our previous DEC meeting, that we should possibly be looking at changing this wording of "Initiation of Members" to something that is not so intimidating to new members. And since this ceremony is now an optional process to membership, our Committee proposes the following motion.

RECOMMENDATION: That the current Chapter 4 heading of "Initiation of Members" in our Ritual, Awards and Protocol Manual be changed to read "Welcoming Ceremony". It is further moved that wherever the word "initiation" appears in Chapter 4 of the manual, that it be changed to welcome or welcome ceremony. Similarly, it is moved that all reference to "Initiation" in the manuals Table of Contents be changed to reflect the wording of welcome. The membership application form would also require a change to eliminate the words "initiation" and "initiated".

<u>GENERAL</u>

The committee last met by teleconference on 28 March, which was a joint teleconference with every Provincial Command C&L chair. Members continue to review and respond to Constitution and Laws questions by email and telephone as necessary.

PROVINCIAL COMMAND / SPECIAL SECTION BY-LAW AMENDMENTS

Since the last meeting, the committee reviewed amendments to the By-Laws for NL and PE Commands. Currently under consideration are amendments for NS/NU Command and OSI Special Section.

The proposed OSI By-laws notes the intent to incorporate; it was questioned if this is permissible given that the Legion is federally incorporated by its own special Act of Parliament. This may require an enabling provision in The General By-Laws to permit OSI regulations/policy so specific operational matters could be addressed outside of the By-laws. Alternatively, the OSI Special Section could follow a two-tiered approach as is the case with TVS, which has a parallel existence in TVA (also a special Act corporation). DEC guidance will be sought.

AMENDMENT – GBL 401.C

The following amendment is brought forward for DEC consideration and approval to reflect the current composition of DEC:

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended that GBL 401.c be amended to include reference to the OSI Special Section, to read, "One representative from each Special Section, the Tuberculous Veterans' Section and the Operational

Stress Injuries Section, for a total of two representatives."

MANUAL AMENDMENTS

Two manuals, The General By-Laws and Rules of Procedure for Legion Meetings, were updated and placed on-line in July 2017.

I would ask a voting member of DEC to move approval of this report.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS

The RCL RCEL Committee met on 24 November 2017 to discuss the needs of the Commonwealth veterans and widows in the Caribbean as part of our accepted mandate. In all, 16 countries are supported with a total of 62 veterans and 106 widows being supported. Donations from branches and individuals continue to be received on a daily/weekly basis at Dominion Command to meet the needs of those in need.

PROBLEM AREAS

Belize

Governance issues continue to plague the Belize Legion with a legal challenge before the courts. At this point the current executive and secretary have been relieved of duties although the secretary continues to act as an administrator. Funds are being delivered to their Veterans and widows in need.

Disaster Relief

Several of our Caribbean countries were adversely affected by recent tropical storms/hurricanes. Communications have been difficult at best and some (Antigua and Dominica) may be applying to the RCEL HQ for assistance with the cost of repairs.

EVENTS

Site visits conducted in 2017 by the President and the Dominion Secretary included Guyana, Trinidad & Tobago and Barbados. These visits which are conducted every two years provide an opportunity to account for the grant monies and to visit with the local authorities and of course our Commonwealth veterans and their widows. This year's visits were hugely successful, it is felt that these countries are being run effectively and should be in good standing moving forward.

In addition our assistant secretary conducted a site visit in November 2017 of Bermuda, who were officially granted membership status in 2016. He assisted them in getting up to speed with annual grant applications, reviewed and streamlined their processes and met with authorities and Veterans. His report will be forthcoming.

FINANCIAL NEWS

The committee continues to use the Libor Grant funding which was distributed to multiple organizations underneath the RCEL umbrella to provide additional grants/assistance to the veterans and widows of the Caribbean. We will continue to use these funds as mandated until the end of 2018. The grant has essentially provided our fund with a two year hiatus from using branch provided donations which have remained strong on an annual basis. This has ensured our fund would be in good standing in for the foreseeable future.

CONCLUSION

In closing, also attached are the Presidents site visit report and an RCEL Canada Committee business plan for the period of 2018-2022.

<u>GENERAL</u>

This report covers the period from 24 March 2017 to 24 November 2017. The Committee held a teleconference on 8 June and met on 3 November 2017, on the same day that it attended the Vimy Dinner at the National War Museum in Ottawa.

It should be noted that the Committee has a new member, Comrade Bob Cléroux (a former CF CWO) who has replaced Comrade Buster Brown who was on the Committee for 20 years. Our new secretary at Legion House is Comrade Carolyn Gasser. Some interviews were conducted to recruit a new member (Army and female) but the search is still ongoing.

COMMITTEE BUSINESS

The Committee continues to monitor defence and security issues as they arise. Each member has been requested to pay a particular attention to a given element (RCN, CA, RCAF and RCMP). The following are updates on various issues, without providing the level of detail available in the Committee minutes that were distributed to DEC.

NEW DEFENCE POLICY

Canada's new defence policy "Strong, Secure, Engaged" is now out and the Committee Chair was in the "lock up" for the initial release. This policy will be the object of the first round of comments to be obtained from D&S Provincial Representatives. Collecting such feedback from commands will help the Committee continue the monitoring of the policy implementation.

RCMP LEADERSHIP CHANGE

Commissioner Bob Paulson has retired in June 2017 and the government has agreed to extend the application process to April 2018, in an effort to broaden the search.

Meanwhile, Deputy Commissioner Dan Dubeau is serving as interim RCMP Commissioner.

2017 NIJMEGEN MARCH

Comrade Kim Peters, from Branch 530 Waterloo, Ontario Command was selected as the RCL 2017 Nijmegen representative and participated at the event in the Netherlands from 18 to 21 July 2017. Comrade Peters was last year's alternate and Comrade Leonard Block, Branch 276 Slocan Valley, BC/Yukon Command was the alternate for the 2017 Nijmegen, implying that he should be considered favourably for the 2018 event. A letter requesting nominations for the 2018 event will be sent out once the CAF guidelines are received (no word has yet been received).

Grand President Larry Murray represented the Legion at the Departure Parade on 11 July 2017 and spoke eloquently to all participants.

Comrade Peters has sent short messages and photos to Marketing and Communications, which were shared on Facebook. A summary of these messages and an article posted on the RCL website are attached.

OP CANADA DAY

For Canada Day, the RCL sent 2450 packages to deployed personnel across the world. There were no particular issues related to this operation, except perhaps some coordination difficulties to obtain the right number of packages, which is normal because of the operational planning process. Internal financial planning adjustments now allows for quicker reaction by our supply department when changes in numbers suddenly occur, as the DEC has decided to allow \$15 (including freight and tax) for each package.

OP SANTA CLAUS

This year, the RCL will send 2425 packages to deployed CAF and RCMP members. This year package includes Legion pens, Lanyards and Bandanas, healthy snack items such as Kirk Trail Mix and Made Good Granola, miscellaneous personal items such as floss and lip balm, and the customary playing card deck.

D&S COMMAND REPRESENTATIVES (CR) – TOR

The Committee developed draft Terms of Reference for D&S Command Representatives, which were included in the Committee Business / Action Plan, and submitted to DEC in April 2017. They were approved, and Commands are reminded that this responsibility should be accepted on a voluntary basis. It is assumed that this voluntary basis has had an impact on the response, as only three Provincial Commands (Ontario, Saskatchewan, and Nova Scotia/Nunavut) forwarded names of their D&S CR.

At the last Committee meeting, the situation was discussed again and it was agreed that a new approach was required. The Secretary will approach the Provincial Command Executive Secretaries with a summary of the Terms of Reference, various questions of current events, reports, and any other problematic issues that fall under the mandate of the D&S Committee, with the aim to obtain from them relevant and timely feedback from across the country. The questions are currently in development by the Committee members. It should be noted that Commands who will want to use a D&S CR to forward feedback through their Executive Secretaries will be able to do so.

CDA AGM and CDA – CDAI Conference

CDA and CDAI have a new CEO in the person of BGen (ret) Matthew Overton.

The CDA AGM will be held on 21 February 2018 and the Ottawa Security Conference will follow from 22-23 February. Both are being held in Ottawa.

A CDA representative (Sean McGrath) will be invited to participate in our Committee deliberations at our next meeting to be held in the week from 26 February to 2 March 2018. We will discuss how our two organisations could mutually support each other in our attempt to foster interest in D&S issues.

COMMITTEE COORDINATION

The committee continues to maintain a presence (through the Chair) at the Veteran's Consultation Assembly and VSS meetings (through Secretary and Assistant-Secretary) to ensure coordinated understanding and efforts.

Each member of the Committee is now responsible to follow the activities of a group of RCL committees to improve global awareness and potential coordination. The attached matrix reflects the informal pairing arrangement.

CONCLUSION

<u>21 July</u>

Yesterday was Day 3 of the Nijmegen Marches. Kim Peters, Legionnaire and marcher on the VIP contingent of Canada's Joint Task Force Nijmegen reported back...

"Day 3 was a mental challenge as members on the team were starting to struggle and hit road blocks. We walked 38.9km today with all hills. The morning challenge was the rain and the afternoon was the heat and hills. Besides a couple of superficial blisters and sore muscles and joints, I was feeling pretty good.

One of the highlights of my day was meeting members of The Royal Canadian Legion in the Netherlands and their Branch President, Gerald Hendrik. It was interesting how there are many similarities between the Legion in the Netherlands and in Canada. Their colour party did an excellent job during a ceremony at the Groesbeek Canadian War Cemetery honoring Fallen Canadians. I was very touched as I walked through the rows of headstones. Every single one of them had a maple leaf on it."

As the Canadian contingent marches on their fourth and final day of the Nijmegen Marches, the Legion salutes you and thanks you for your service.

<u>25 July</u>

The 4-day Nijmegen Marches have come to a close and we welcome Canada's Joint Task Force Nijmegen and our very own Legionnaire, Kim Peters, back home.

We were pleased to share Kim's updates along the way. In her last email, she offered a glimpse into their daily routine, and highlights of their last day...

"The last day of the four day Marches has finally come! We were up again at 3am for a 445am start. Each morning began with a March Off, saluting the Canadian Reviewing Officer before hitting the road. The team sang songs along the way, waved to the locals camped out along the route, and talked with other country's teams as we passed. Every 12-15km there was a military rest stop and members had a chance to tend to sore feet. Evening activities following a day of marching consisted of soaking feet, stretching, packing and weighing your kit bag for the following day, staying hydrated and getting as much sleep as possible.

On our last day we walked 47km which culminated in a 5km military march along Via Gladiola, past the reviewing stand with dignitaries from the Dutch military, the Mayor of Nijmegen and the President of The Royal Canadian Legion in the Netherlands. As we approached the end, I felt an overwhelming sense of relief and happiness, although my body was screaming at me to stop walking, as I couldn't feel my feet or anything below

my knees! The final day was hard mentally and physically for the entire team, but we all successfully completed the march. At the finish line, we were greeted by local citizens as they handed out beer and gladiolas to the marchers. The crowd was cheering, giving hugs and congratulating us. Let's just say it was quite the party on the street. At that moment, I felt very proud to be a Canadian, and to have participated in and completed the Nijmegen Marches."

We are so proud of Kim and the Canadian team, and we know you will cherish your memories of the Nijmegen Marches for a lifetime.

D&S Committee Report Supplement

D&S Command Representatives

The D&S Committee considers that the fulfilment of its mandate is an important vector that will prevent the RCL from the risk of "fading away into obscurity", as it was once mentioned. Issues related to defence and security are on the news every day and the RCL should seize the opportunity to publicly express its opinion on these subjects that affect the lives of serving and retired members of the CAF and the RCMP, and their families. While remaining apolitical, the RCL should be seen as an organization that has at heart the monitoring of the development and implementation of Canadian defence and security policies. Fostering interest in defence and security matters among Legion members and the public at large should be seen as a legitimate aim that needs to be organized in a more systematic way than it has been in the past.

This document aims at clarifying how this could be done.

TERMS OF REFERENCE

DOMINION COMMAND DEFENCE AND SECURITY COMMITTEE

a. With inputs from Command Representatives (CR), foster and support the care, welfare and morale of the Canadian Armed Forces, the RCMP and their respective families by:

i. encouraging the Government of Canada and the respective leadership to ensure that these organizations men and women are properly trained, equipped and compensated;

ii. encouraging the Government of Canada and the respective leadership to ensure that these organizations are properly structured, equipped and staffed to carry out their roles and tasks and to fulfil Canada's obligation to international alliances; and

iii. monitoring and contributing to the positive morale of the Canadian Armed Forces and the RCMP.

- b. Through feedback from CR or other sources, monitoring the development and implementation of Canadian defence and security policy.
- c. Foster interest in defence and security matters among Legion members and the public at large.
- d. Provide participation as the Legion's representative to the Conference of Defence Associations.

COMMAND REPRESENTATIVES (CR)

DEC previously agreed to have Commands nominate D&S CR and the following draft TORs were promulgated:

- 1. The D&S CR should:
 - i. be a volunteer, preferably with military or RCMP experience;
 - ii. be familiar with the Committee TOR;
 - iii. be familiar with D&S issues at the national level but even more importantly in the regions covered by his or her command;
 - iv. consider, in coordination with his or her Command authorities,
 - liaise with CAF and RCMP members at local levels;
 - seek to stimulate the interest of RCL members in D&S issues; and
 - seek to stimulate the interest of the public at large in D&S issues.
 - v. be ready to reply promptly to specific requests for feedback from the Committee member assigned to his Command;
 - vi. use his or her own initiative to provide feedback or recommendations to the Dominion Command D&S Committee on any D&S issue stemming from his Command, sectors or branches; and
 - vii. ensure that his coordinates are up to date on the list of D&S CR that the D&S Committee Secretary will control.
- b. The D&S CR is not a member of the D&S Committee but he or she might be invited to join a particular meeting to support the deliberations on a given item.

PROCESS

As a matter of routine, the D&S Committee would forward questions or points to Commands in advance of DEC meetings in the Spring and in the Fall. They would be sent out in mid-September for November DEC and in mid-February for the April DEC. Commands who want to use D&S CR can certainly do so but communications should go through Provincial Command Executive Secretaries to D&S Committee permanent staff (Secretary: Comrade Carolyn Gasser, cgasser@legion.ca, 613-591-3335, ext 231). Once the feedback has been collated, the D&S Committee will determine which feedback should make its way to the three departments that are most likely to be related to the received material, that is DND, VAC or Public Safety. The Committee will then prepare an appropriate correspondence and submit it through Legion with info copies to all Commands.

SAMPLE QUESTIONS

As this is the first pilot series of questions, Commands are asked to consider the following list and to provide feedback in writing before **1 Feb 2018**, with "NIL return" having to be sent so that we do not have to enquire about missing returns. There is no need to provide comments necessarily on all questions. Commands can "pick and chose" what they want to comment on and the last question is very generic in nature to accommodate any issue that they find particularly relevant.

- NAVY
 - The Navy is in the process of modernizing ships and Naval trades. The amalgamation of the Weapons trade has already occurred, and the Marine Engineer Electricians and Hull Technicians are being amalgamated into one occupation. Combat trades are being reviewed and will be next for amalgamation. How is this being received by current personnel? How is it affecting training, excellence at sea, and morale, including retention?
 - To what extent do Sailors feel adequately supported by Morale and Welfare services, including SISIP (Service Income Security Insurance Plan) and SOT (Support out Troops)?
- ARMY
 - Our government has announced "The Elsie initiative" or Women in Peace Operations Pilot and other innovative training activities that will meet systemic UN needs. An Advisory Team is also offered with a contribution of police and up to 600 military personnel. While tactical Airlift Support and an Aviation Task Force have been identified, it is not clear what the Quick Reaction Force will look like. How is the Army rank and file reacting to this situation? What are their recommendations on aspects related to training, equipment, compensation and morale?
 - A major Canadian newspaper has reported that more than 70 Canadian military members and veterans who were deployed on the Afghanistan operation have committed suicide after returning home. Another six ended their lives while on tour, and are counted among the 158 mission deaths. How is the new Joint Suicide Prevention Strategy received in the rank and file of the Canadian Army which appears to have been particularly affected by this terrible situation following the Afghanistan campaign?
- AIR FORCE
 - The RCAF is in the midst of replacing a number of fleets and introducing new fleets to service. At the same time, it is trying to maintain operational capability in the missions concerned without an increase in personnel. What factors

should be considered when trying to maintain the current capability while preparing for the future, without burning out our current personnel?

• To what extent is the current Op Tempo sustainable, or not sustainable?

• RCMP

- To what extent will the implementation of a Civilian Oversight Board, recommended on the Brown Report of 2007 and still awaiting federal government action, assist the RCMP in its efforts to reduce harassment, increase diversity, and equality of representation?
- What is your assessment of the implementation of a new system of labour relations (possibly unionization), awaiting action by the federal government, that could help/hinder its membership in negotiations regarding compensation, benefits, mental health programs, and staffing levels?

• GENERAL FEEDBACK

 What are the other issues that affect the care, welfare and morale of the CAF and the RCMP and their respective families in the geographical area of your Command ?

GENERAL

The last meeting of the Consultation Group was held on 4 November 2017 at the commencement of Veterans' Week. More than 35 persons attended representing 14 veterans' and other organizations.

PRESENTATIONS TO THE GROUP

While the Minister of Veterans Affairs was to attend the meeting, his urgent surgery caused him to cancel out. Three presentations were made to the Committee:

Mefloquine. Veteran John Dowe, an advocate, provided the group with a detailed briefing on the affects of the anti malarial drug Mefloquine and its affects on the body. He highlighted the need for research and the Legion has already advocated for further research to Veterans Affairs, National Defence and the Health Minister.

National Association of Federal Retirees. Mr. Simon Coakley from NAFR provided the group with the interim results of the town halls that they are conducting with Veterans across the country. Their findings are similar to those already known: lack of outreach and communications, access to and knowledge of programs, and recognition. NAFR will continue to update the Legion on their findings.

Veterans Ombudsman. Mr. Parent provided the group with and update on the recent Continuum of Care Study conducted by his office. It is interesting to note that the condition of frailty is becoming more pronounced as the Veteran community ages. Frailty is ill defined by VAC and not a gateway to benefits.

ADVISORY GROUPS

Participation in VAC Advisory Groups was discussed. There was a general consensus that the groups do allow engagement but not all are content with the outcomes. In particular the Veterans' community is anxiously awaiting the Budget 2018 announcement and the resolution of a life long pension option. In addition, the group discussed the new

mandate letter for Minister O'Regan which highlights progress to date and basically provides no new direction to the Minister.

ROUNDTABLE ISSUES

As is customary with the Consultation Group, a roundtable discussion ensued and the following points were noted:

Frailty. Frailty was often mentioned in the OVO Continuum of Care Study and has been an ongoing point of advocacy for many. There is no accepted definition of frailty that would assist Veterans in obtaining benefits. This needs to be rectified as access to VIP would allow Veterans to remain in their own homes longer.

Veterans' ID Card. Collectively the group supports the introduction of a Veterans' ID card. The CAF One card issued by Morale and Welfare is not an ID card but rather an access card into the CANEX system.

Research. It is fully agreed that more directed and meaningful research needs to be conducted into the use of anti-malarial drugs and cannabis based therapies for Veterans. Research continually needs to be updated to take into account the evolving Veteran community.

Advisory Groups. The advisory groups are useful to continue the broad range of consultation with the Veterans' community. As the groups progress, there is also a need for better communications to the community which at this time appears to be lacking. As well, the advisory groups are waiting to see if their efforts will deliver results for the betterment of the Veterans. As stated by Brian Forbes: "there is an expectation that proposals from the advisory groups will be addressed in a positive manner". In general, all acknowledged that positive steps are occurring but it is the big, costly issues that now need to be addressed positively as well. Budget 2018 will be a critical time for continued consultation within the advisory groups.

CONCLUSION

The meeting was well attended and informative. All participants agreed that letter highlighting the above points will be sent to the Minister VAC. The Legion was thanked by all for hosting the meeting and brining everyone together.

REPORT OF THE DOMINION COMMAND PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE TO THE DOMINION EXECUTIVE COUNCIL 26 NOVEMBER 2017

OVERVIEW

The Public Relations department underwent a significant change this summer, with the hiring of a new Communications Manager. We are looking forward to reactivating our committee and holding our next meeting in early December. Our manager has been getting up to speed on our organization and its processes and we have accomplished significant public relations work over the past few months.

A lot goes on behind the scenes to make sure we are responding to the public, media and colleagues across the country in a timely way with appropriate information. Over the past months we handled daily calls and emails in this way. By doing so and by preparing our spokespeople for presentations and interviews with appropriate speaking notes and background, we were able to both educate our key audiences and help protect the Legion's reputation.

<u>HIGHLIGHTS</u>

- We have established new connections nationally with Provincial Secretaries and Public Relations Officers. We would like to be a resource for our provincial colleagues, for both immediate help and longer-term advice. This interaction allows Commands to remain aware of issues that may be brewing and could directly affect them, and allows them to share tools and information that could help their branches. This sort of regular exchange will become increasingly important as we change and grow as an organization and move forward together as a collective unit.
- We have been reaching out proactively to media outlets to pitch many interesting stories. One such result is the publication of a significant article in the latest issue of Vanguard magazine, which has a vast reach within Canada's defense community. The context was the Remembrance period and the piece focused on the Legion's bi-annual Pilgrimage of Remembrance. This allowed us another way to showcase our important work in this area.
- We proactively handled numerous national media requests and stories over the past few months including from high profile outlets like Macleans, The Walrus, CTV National, and Global National. This sort of handling often required a lot of

information exchange and digging to find out what was really at the root of a request, and then required careful preparation. Beyond topics related to Remembrance and the National Poppy Campaign, we saw interest in membership composition, suicide prevention, and trademark violations.

- Notable higher profile public relations issues handled included: the decision of the federal government to compensate Omar Khadr, the future of the Legion, and the internal situation involving the BC/Y Command leadership. In these cases, Dominion Command also assisted our regions with communications support as needed. Timely and proactive handling of these issues resulted in significantly curbing excessive and unwanted media interest.
- Related to this, was our proactive handling of complaints on our social media channels; we noted a significant decrease in the number of complaints coming to us this way. We found that as people became more educated about our work, they became less negative, and other citizens regularly corrected misinformation on our behalf. We are also seeing significant growth in our social media audiences.
- This summer, we showcased the Legion's investment in the Invictus Games in Toronto. This included working with numerous media to help facilitate their stories
 including stories with Legionnaires. Taking the time to help media with their inquiries and stories helped build good relationships, and further set the stage to create an environment whereby the Legion is top of mind and a "go-to" for expertise in matters relating to Veterans.
 - While at the Games, Dominion Command ensured a daily public presence through a well-positioned information table and through the production of short video spots shared on Facebook, which highlighted Veteran athletes. These pieces were supplemented by related social media posts.
- Over the past months, our department worked with colleagues and partners to help plan several key events. In all cases preparation included the creation of media advisories and/or releases.
 - The National Youth Track and Field competition. We proactively pitched stories about participants, resulting in several news pieces, and fielded numerous media calls.
 - VIA Rail Canada's distribution of at least 30,000 poppies on their trains during the Remembrance period.
 - The Legion's Virtual Poppy Drop on Parliament Hill. We reached nearly 400,000 viewers with Facebook live.

- The Governor-General's First Poppy presentation and Remembrancerelated activities. This included the creation of a set of speaking notes for Commands and Branches to tailor and use during their events.
- The National Remembrance Day Ceremony. This included extensive handling of numerous interview pitches and requests related to The Silver Cross Mother, the meaning of Remembrance, the Pilgrimage of Remembrance and handling many questions about the logistics of the ceremony itself. We reached nearly 280,000 viewers with Facebook live.
- Also of interest, we have begun a series of meetings with journalists who are interested in, or report on Veterans-related affairs. The first one took place in October with a national news organization. Other meetings are actively being scheduled. Their purpose is to better educate media as to what we do at a national and local level, and how we can be an ongoing information resource for them.

MOVING FORWARD

Our PR committee would like to begin working on some very tangible tools that can be tailored for use within Commands and Branches nationwide. This includes items such as speaking notes, fact sheets, templates, Q and As and the regular sharing of intelligence. To that end, we would like to begin a monthly PR committee information bulletin for select internal audiences so that we can build upon – and learn from – our individual efforts across the country.

RECOMMENDATION: Is to issue a monthly PR committee information bulletin.

Reinstitute the practice of facilitating "Dominion/Provincial PRO teleconferences" on an every other month basis starting in December.

ITEM 16: CANVET PUBLICATIONS

INTRODUCTION

This has been Canvet's most successful year since it was incorporated in 1972. The revenue from the government subsidy, advertising and design and production has continued to grow.

<u>SUBSIDY</u>

Over the last three decades, federal subsidies have saved Canvet almost 12 million dollars. The largest, the Canada Periodical Fund (CPF) is vital to Canvet's survival. The rules and regulations governing the receipt of the CPF are clear and must be honoured. *Legion Magazine* must be a separate and independent publication. Any periodical "that primarily report on the activities or promotes the interests of the organization" will be declared ineligible. The government reviews each application carefully. This year the Department of Canadian Heritage awarded the corporation \$861,578 or \$78,384 (10 per cent) more than last year. This is the highest amount of subsidy in the history of Canvet and a very welcome influx of capital. Last year's grant was \$783,194. Eligibility is decided annually and this year's application has just arrived. All of Canvet's operating budgets are based on receipt of the subsidy.

Last June, Canvet also applied for a grant from the Ontario Media Development Corporation (OMDC) to increase newsstand distribution beginning with our Fall 2017 Special Interest Publication (SIP) and to continue this effort for the next five SIPs. The OMDC approved the application and in August awarded Canvet \$74,950, to be paid in three parts over three years. The maximum grant offered is \$75,000.

ADVERTISING AND DESIGN AND PRODUCTION

Canvet sold more advertising in 2017 than any other time in its history. The second best showing was in 1993, when Canvet published 10 issues annually and had 530,000 subscribers. Design and production is a new revenue stream created in the last few years. It too is performing.

STAFFING

Even in the best of times there is sadness. This year, Canvet lost a member of its staff. Adam Day passed away on July 5, 2017. Freelance Editor/Staff Writer, Stephen Thorne has taken up Adam's duties.

At present, Canvet has a permanent staff of 12 and approximately 65 contract and freelance contributors.

MEMBER BENEFITS PACKAGE

HearingLife Canada is the newest partner in The Royal Canadian Legion (RCL) Member Benefits Package (MBP). The MBP offers discounts on specialty designed travel insurance packages, retirement living, cell phones, eyewear, funerals and much more. The other MBP partners are Arbor Memorial Services Inc., Canadian Safe Step Walk-in Tub Co., Carlson Wagonlit Travel, IRIS Eyewear, Medipac Travel Insurance, Revera Inc., SimplyConnect and MBNA Canada Inc.

Each of the nine partners contributes to the Legion and its members in a different way. Some provide funding to Dominion Command programs while others continue to offer their discounts to both the member and their immediate family. It is one more reason to join the Legion.

AWARDS

In September, Canvet was nominated for two Canadian Online Publishing Awards. The first for *Our Journey to 150* a short video narrated by Mike Myers and the second for *Cold Comfort*, an interactive video of the Newfoundlanders who rescued crews from two sinking American ships. These latest kudos are tremendous for staff morale and bring our award nomination and wins to 22 national and international awards.

Brian Watkins - RBL Representative Report to DEC <u>26 November 2017</u>

2 weeks ago as your mandated delegate, I attended the first ever Special Conference of the Royal Commonwealth Ex-Services League which was held at Canada House in London.

Although the RCEL is, of course, a Commonwealth wide organization, it's a registered British charity and subject therefore to British Charity Law. 2 years ago, the Charity Commission which oversees charities in the UK, decided that it would be a good thing if all charities, or most of them anyway, were to become incorporated organizations. The RCEL like some other British charities is not incorporated, hence the need for a Special Conference in order to pass two resolutions. One; to dissolve the existing organizations and secondly; to pass all its assets, such as they are, to the new organization. And that new organization which has a constitution now in the form of Articles of Association will come into being on the 1st of January 2018.

The constitution, although it is now termed as the Articles of Association was approved at the conference in Kuala Lumpur in June of last year which Comrade Dave and Comrade Tom Eagles attended

In terms of the member organizations of the RCEL, there's virtually no change. They are of legalistic differences but virtually no change at least in terms of the member organizations. The form of governance is broadly speaking exactly as it is now. The council which consists of representatives of all the member organizations will continue.

The Executive Committee which has 3 Ex-Officio members, 6 Elected and 6 Founder members, which one of course is The Royal Canadian Legion, also continues although it is renamed twice. The Board of Directors because being a company now limited by guarantee it has to confirm with British Company Law, and stroke the Board of Trustees because being charities it has to conform with British Charity Law. The conference as such does not continue and yet in a sense it does because it is now a company. The RCL like you have just done, has to hold an Annual General Meeting. That Annual General Meeting will be again, just as yours, I suspect will be a meeting of the council. But every 5 years that council meeting will be a conference. The next one in fact is due in 2021 and will be held in Cape Town, South Africa which marks the 100 anniversary of the foundation of the league by Haig and Smuts in 1921.

What of the future I have been asked because of the changes? And indeed a few others which were talked about at Kuala Lumpur and other places. It is no secret that there were some people who believe that when the last pre-independence Veteran past away the organization should become a subsidiary of the Royal British Legion. That was steadfastly fought by certain people, one of whom is present today and consultation throughout the Commonwealth made it abundantly clear that an independent Commonwealth Veterans organizations was what was wanted. That was particularly true of the smaller countries of the Commonwealth. That view was very firmly endorsed at the Kuala Lumpur conference, so that the RCEL will continue. However, that does raise a problem. All organizations need

money. And it was the view of some that with the passing of the last Commonwealth preindependence Veteran, it will be very difficult to raise charity money. Not entirely true, because two thirds of the work done even now by the RCEL is what is called "agency" work. That is to say, other military charities use our network throughout the Commonwealth in order to pass over welfare monies. Normally it is British military charities but in fact, there was certainly one instance this year where our facilities were used to pass money to a Canadian Veteran. The real problem however, remains that even though we have an agency role which recognizes we are charitable, and although we may be able to raise some monies there may be some remaining difficulties. Those I am glad to say have been overcome. Some of you will know, the RCEL which only has a paid staff of 4 has office accommodations, telephones, IT, postage, provided free of charge by the Royal British Legion. They also make a donation of course towards charitable work. Just as you make an enormous contribution towards charitable work in the Caribbean. The Royal British Legion makes a direct grant to the RCEL for that work and the rest of the Commonwealth. Hitherto it has been £120,000 pounds a year and I am very delighted to say they just signed an agreement with the RCEL to provide £240,000 pounds per annum. That is twice as much over the next 5 years and that takes us at least 1 year beyond the next Commonwealth conference.

If I may, I just have three more points that have nothing to do with the Special Conference or the future of the league. The first, is that on the 9th of November in company with the Canadian Deputy High Commissioner and Defence Advisor, I attended in uniform, at the Canada Plot in the Garden of Remembrance at Westminster Abbey when it was opened by Prince Harry. Now I only mention this because all Commonwealth countries have a plot at the Garden of Remembrance and were attended by representatives of the relevant high commission. However to the best of my knowledge, the only Commonwealth Legion which was recognizably present on that occasion at that event was the Royal Canadian Legion.

The second thing I wanted to say was in February, my wife and I took a cruise to the Caribbean and we took the opportunity to visit a number of our Veteran organizations in the Caribbean and in two instances we were actually able to go and visit the Veterans in their homes. In Grenada there were a couple of problems one of which we were able to solve directly with RBL Headquarters in London and the other I was able to have a discussion with and see a way forward to their problem with the Governor General of Grenada.

And finally, on the 8th of August next year, there is to be a major celebration as it were, a commemoration. Ypres at the Menin Gate. Royal Commonwealth Ex-Services League will parade its standard through that gate. It is hope that many other Commonwealth Legions will attend. And in particular, the Royal Canadian Legion with its standard given what happened in and around Ypres in and around Canadians in the first world war.

In May 2017, at the Provincial Convention of Ontario Command, our guest speaker, was Natacha Dupuis, MCpl. Ret'd and Co-Captain Team Canada for the Invictus Games.

Comrade Natacha advised The Canadian Track and Field Championships had agreed to accept injured Veterans, including those suffering from invisible wounds such as PTSD, as competitors, in the Para category of the Championships to be held in July, 2017 at Ottawa. Comrade Natacha shared the cost for 14 athletes to compete was an estimated \$6500.00, funds the team didn't have available. A motion was put to the convention floor to sponsor those 14. The vote to support was unanimous!

This competition provided a warm up for our Canadian athletes to the Invictus Games held in September. Our athletes did Canada proud! The next Invictus Games are being held in Australia. Travel expenses will prevent many of our athletes from participating.

The competition provided such a benefit to the mental and physical well being of those of our injured Veterans able to compete, that Comrade Natacha has founded the 'Invictus Legacy Project', and is reaching out to the Royal Canadian Legion to help sponsor the team comprised of 46 Veterans, from across Canada, in the 2018 Canadian Track & Field Championships.

The total funds requested for 46 athletes is \$35,000.00 and is broken down by Province (please see attachment). Under section 403 ii. 1. We are into our 9^{th} year, what a journey ! We said at the start that if we can help one succeed – it would be worthwhile. Our initial thoughts were 1) we've got to start somewhere

2) a roof over your head, a safe haven

must be the start. We have many success stories. I will share two with you in a minute.

As I said, what a journey. Our program has constantly evolved with the help of many dedicated people like : - Dr. Cheryl Forchuk – UWO

- Jan Richardson- City of London
- VAC people like Kathy Darte, Regional Director Bridget Preston, many Case Workers and Nurses
- OSSIS peers like Phil Quesnelle
- Many people that have worked on the HPS file have offered their expertise
- Royal Canadian Legion for donations that have been the primary funding to date
- Too many volunteers to count

We have learned from them all.

Without a doubt in my mind - the Housing First Model works.

Our network of professional resources has continued to expand – a necessity. Also we have, for the last 2 years, had a live-in manager, a veteran himself – this really works, there is a bond between all who have served and Veterans Helping Veterans is an ideal to foster.

Funding continues to be our major concern, our major battle. The Legion has led the way, many service organizations continue to help – The City of Colwood has been a staunch backer – but Provincial Gov't – 0, Federal Gov't – 0, sad but true.

Every VAC Minister for the last 8 years, some Deputies, Opposition MP's, Ombudsman etc. have visited – glowing reviews, accolades, praise – but never a cent. Disheartening, but we are not about to give up.

I believe that collectively we have made progress lessening the stigma of homelessness.

We believe that the most accurate estimate of the number of homeless that have served in the Military or RCMP is 10 % of the homeless population. It is a difficult number to pin down because most studies involve shelters etc. – our guys and gals are less likely to use them , indeed even be in an urban environment.

In summation, I said that I would share two success stories. Both gentlemen have offered these testimonials in the hope that they will help others, both agreed to let us their names:

When we first met John in the fall of 2009 he was living on the street. He moved to Saltspring Island in 2011, and now lives on Saturna Island :

" I was living a life of isolation and despair. As I was brought into Cockrell House I realized for the first time that I wasn't alone. From the vet who found me to the one who drove me to Cockrell House I realized that I had a great lifelong network of friends who are veterans that are ready to drop what they are doing to aid others. Today my future is bright and the friends that I made at Cockrell House are still by my side today, we continue to help each other as best we can. Cockrell House and the people involved saved my life so it is my turn to help others.
